Alexander Reynolds being duly sworn deposes and says: I reside at No.26 Cornelia Street in the City of New York. I am a car-driver on the Chambers St road. On the night of June 2nd I left Grand Street Ferry, nine minutes after eleven, at about eleven minutes after eleven I heard a shot in Cherry street between Corlear and Jackson, and heard somebody halloping, "murder, watch and police". I came up through Cherry to Jackson, and on the south-west corner of Jackson and Cherry, stood a man. He was going over towards the north-west corner and on the north-west corner was a man with a pistol in his hand. He fired one shot at the man in his shirt sleeves and bare-footed and bare-headed. The distance between these two men was about twenty-five or thirty feet at that time. - I heard the first shot but did not see it. The man in his shirt sleeves was following the man with the pistol (this was after the first shot), then he went about fifty feet up Jackson towards Monroe, stepped out in the middle of the street and stood there until the man in his bare feet and bare head, got in front of the building - a wooden structure in Jackson Street - he fired another shot at him there - they were about twenty

feet apart then. The man that had the pistol retreated to the north-east side of the street, and the man in his shirt sleeves followed him up, and as he got on the north-east side of the railroad track, I stood there with the car, and right alongside of the mare I was driving, the man who had the pistol and who fired the shots, stood still, at the hind-quarter of the mare I was driving and fired another shot. He was about nine feet distant and about fifty feet from the corner of Cherry street. When he fired the last shot he ran towards Cherry street. It appeared to me that the deceased, whom I afterwards learned was Capt. John Hussey, the man who was shot, was in the act of pursuing Hahn in order to overtake him, - I saw altogether three shots fired by the defendant Hahn at the deceased Hussey.

Joseph Meehan, being duly sworn deposes and says; I reside at 358 Madison Street. I know the defendant Hahn by sight. Know him to speak to him, having seen him doing patrol duty in uniform. I knew the deceased John Hussey in his life time. I did not see the homicide. But after it occurred I heard of the shooting and went along Jackson Street and saw the deceased Hussey standing at the corner, with quite a crowd around, and officer Duggan was there. I did not see him strike or attempt to strike Duggan.

Timothy Deasy, being duly sworn deposes and says; I reside at 657 Water Street. On the night of the 2nd of June, I was coming home with my wife from the Academy of Music. I reached the corner of Madison and Jackson Street I heard a pistol shot, and heard screaming. We kept on down until we got about thirty feet of the corner of Jackson and Cherry street, I saw a man standing on the right-hand side of Jackson Street, as you go down, he had on a gray suit. I took particular notice of him standing there. When all at once there was a car came up. There was about a dozen of people on the opposite side from Hahn, - we did not want to hurry through the crowd. And all at once this man in the gray suit, made a spring out in the street, and cried out: "stand back" and fired (bang) Mr. Hussey was close by, but I did not see him at the time. While you would be counting four, a second shot went off. I stood at the curb-stone looking at him. When he fired he was in the middle of the Street - I seen both shots fired. I do not think there was a half-minute between each shot. I did not notice Hussey until after the shots were fired. Officer Duggan at this time came up and I saw the defendant standing in the middle of the street, with the pistol still in his hand.

The defendant jumped from the other side of the street to the middle of the street, and between the railroad tracks, and then fired the two shots in the direction of

Michael Lally being duly sworn deposes and says: I reside at 266 Monroe Street in this city. On the night of the 2nd of June, about 11 o'clock, I stood on the corner of Monroe and Jackson Streets. I heard a shot fired in the direction of Cherry and Jackson Streets and ran down to see what was the matter. I saw the defendant Hahn standing on the corner of Jackson and Cherry Sts. with a revolver in his hand. I went up towards him, and he said: "take a walk down the street young fellow", I am going to shoot; I don't know what way the shot will go; you might get caught". I crossed to the opposite side of Jackson Street and continued along Cherry towards Grand for about ten or twelve feet. I stood there for a moment and returned to the corner, and I stood there. I saw Hussey standing leaning against a wagon, and then he started to walk across the street towards where Hahn was, and Hahn walked up the street about twenty-five feet, I think. Hahn turned around and fired one shot at Hussey, who was about twenty or twenty-five feet away from Hahn. Hahn started to walk across the street and Hussey kept coming along. Hussey continued his walk towards him. A car of the Madison Street line, came down the street thus for a moment separating them.

Then Hahn stood on the sidewalk of the opposite side, and Hussey was in the middle of the street. This was about opposite No. 40 Jackson Street. He turned around and fired a second shot, and immediately Hussey put his hand to his side and said: "I am shot." Hussey walked over then to the side where Hahn stood when he fired this shot. Hahn then walked down the street with the revolver in his hand. Hahn walked back to the corner of Jackson and Cherry St. He said: "take him to the hospital; he is shot". He said this when retreating down the street. I stood quite near to Hussey while he was leaning against the railing for support. Officer Dugan, whom I know, came up in uniform and made a remark to Hussey. And Dugan said to Hussey "If you strike me, I will blow the roof of the head of you." I was around the deceased shortly after he was shot and while Dugan was in his vicinity, and walked with him as far as the hospital, and Hussey did not attempt to strike anyone in my presence. He appeared to me to be too weak to do anything of the kind, and a man who was very seriously injured.

They simply drank, and seemed to be very friendly and went out. I saw no quarrelling or shooting. I did not see this homicide.

I know the defendant Hahn having seen him on patrol duty in that neighborhood at different times previous to the second of June. On or about the night of the 2nd of June, about 11 o'clock I heard a shot and a scream, I was then standing at the corner of Monroe and Jackson Streets, I ran down Jackson St. towards Cherry in the direction from which the sound came. When I got down there I heard another shot, but did not see who fired it. I saw two men running down the street and recognized them, one as the defendant Hahn, and the other as the deceased Hussey. I saw the defendant fire a shot at the deceased Hussey, and the latter put his hand up to his breast and said something about being shot. I do not remember what he said.

James Downs being duly sworn deposes and says:
I reside at 356 Cherry Street, this City. I was on the night in question standing on the corner of Monroe and Jackson Streets about eleven o'clock, outside of a liquor store talking to some friends. I saw the deceased Hussey his daughter Julia and a man by the name of Loughlin coming down the street, I crossed the street just before they came up to me, and the party who was talking to me a man by the name of Ahern went into the store. After I crossed to the opposite side Hahn was standing there at the side door on the Jackson Street side of this liquor store, kept by a man named Fink.. In a few minutes afterwards, at the time I crossed over, shortly after Hussey, his daughter and McLoughlin had passed down the street, Hahn went down to the opposite side of the street. I walked across the street to where I was before. Shortly after this I saw Hahn cross over at Jackson and Cherry Street. I saw him speaking to Hussey and McLoughlin, and in a moment or two they went into this liquor store (Lillinthals) on the corner of Jackson and Cherry streets, and remained in about three or four minutes. In a few minutes they came out and appeared to be friendly, Hahn having his arm around Hussey's neck, appearing to take him home.

James Kennedy being duly sworn, deposes and says:
I reside at 72 Jackson Street, this City. On the evening of the 2nd of June, 1887, at about eleven o'clock while standing of the liquor store kept by a man named Connaught on, I heard a shot and went in the direction of it, to wit, Cherry and Jackson Streets, when I reached there, I saw the defendant Hahn, whom I knew from having seen frequently in uniform patrolling in the neighborhood. He was standing on the north-east corner in citizens clothes, and deceased Hussey was standing on the south-west corner, the distance between the two was about twenty-five or thirty feet. While on the south-east corner, I saw Hahn with a pistol fire a shot in the direction of the deceased John Hussey. Then a car came through Cherry Street dividing these two men, or rather went between them. After this shot Hahn went around the horse to the east side of the car in the direction of the deceased, and while on the east side of the car, he fired a second shot. I saw the second shot fired. Hussey put his hands to his stomach and walked over toward the railing, and Hahn then backed down and went into the square with the pistol still in his hand, and back over until he got on McAvoy's corner again, which is one of the corners of Jackson and Cherry Streets. While Hussey leaned over the railing I started over towards him, and while there he seemed to be in much pain, and said: "Oh my belly"

Officer Duggan, whom I also know, and who was in uni-

form, was also standing there. Duggan says to Hussey: come on we will go the hospital. The deceased said: "give me my coat". Dugan says: "if you strike me Jack, I will knock "the top of your head off", or something like that. I didnot see see the deceased r ise his hand or in any way attempt to strike anybody, nor officer Duggan. The deceased was too weak and seemed incapable of assisting himself.

The Petition of Edward Hahn by William F.
Howe his Counsel shows:

That at a Court of General Sessions of the Peace
of the City and County of New York on the
day of July 1887, an indictment was presented
by the Grand Jury of said County against
your petitioner was charged with having on the
day of June 1887, at the City of New York, ~~as~~
committed the felony of murder in the first degree.

That your petitioner was actual custody
on said indictment.

That at a Court of General Sessions of the
City and County of New York, your petitioner
was arraigned on said indictment, and pleaded
"Not guilty" thereto and demanded a trial
thereon.

STATE OF NEW YORK,)

That your petitioner is charged with having shot and killed one "John Hussey," and petitioner while not denying said shooting, claims that the same was justifiable and committed in self defence.

That your petitioner has fully and fairly stated the case herein to William F. Howe his counsel, whose offices are at 87 and 89 Centre Street in the City of New York, and that he has a good and substantial defence on the merits to said indictment after such statement made as aforesaid, and verily believes the same to be true.

On the trial of said indictment very many most intricate novel and perplexing questions of law will arise, as he is advised by his said counsel, after such statement made as aforesaid which together with the facts and circumstances constituting the defence of your petitioner to said indictment and the facts and circumstances above set forth renders the removal of the trial of said indictment from the said Court of General Sessions to the next Court of Oyer and Terminer expedient necessary and proper.

And petitioner says that an indictment, like the present, involving on the trial as it will, perhaps the most novel ^{and} intricate questions of law ever presented - should certainly be tried

in the Court of Oyer and Terminer, the highest criminal Court in the State.

Body well-nourished Size 5 ft 9 in Vigor mortis marked
Governor's Hospital Chest 60 inches June 21. 1884
Inspection: Bullet Wound (entrance) 5 inches below the right
nipple and 1/2 inch to the left.

Track of bullet: Inward downward backward & outward
lodged in the muscular structure in the back, 6 inches
below a line drawn around the body from the umbilicus.
A sinus had formed at exit of bullet about 6 inches deep,
infiltrated with purulent matter. Another sinus had formed
from the point of incision, extending downward, inward &
forward forming an abscess cavity between the abdominal
muscles & the Gluteus, which had ruptured into the
abdominal cavity, causing an intensely acute peritonitis.
Amount of Pus: about a pint.

Lungs: Hypostatic congestion on both also pleuritic
adhesions.

Heart: hypertrophied, otherwise normal.
