





Meeting in Toronto, Ont., July 18th to 25th

The Pan-American Congress of Religion and Education will meet in Toronto, Canada, July 18th to 25th, 1895. The Congress will be divided into sections for the discussion of Education, Philanthropics, Temperance and Women's Work, Editors, Publishers and Authors, Sunday Schools, Missions, Young People's Societies and Internal Economy.
