STATEMENT WITH REGARD TO THE PUSH-CART SITUATION.

I am advised that there is considerable unrest among the push-cart peddlers of the lower East Side and that it is their intention to march in a body, with their wives and children, to the City Hall to petition me to afford them some relief in this matter. I take this method of stating that the push-cart peddlers and their friends can be assured that so far as the Mayor is concerned, their interests will have the fullest and most careful consideration, and that no action will be taken by the city authorities which could, by any fair-minded person, be deemed oppressive or unfair. The peddlers, however, should remember that they have not a vested right to use the streets for the purposes of trade, that the streets are highways and are intended solely for that purpose, and that the city and its citizens have rights in the streets which must also be fully protected.

The conditions which have resulted in recent years from the larger use of the streets by push-cart peddlers, especially in the crowded tenement districts, have seemed to me so important, that some time ago I appointed a committee of citizens to investigate this subject from every point of view and to report to me their recommendations as to what measures should be adopted to bring about a better condition of affairs. I appointed on this commission, in addition to citizens who would have at heart the interest of the peddlers, a number of the heads of departments whose work brought them into touch with this subject.

I am advised by the Chairman of the Push-Cart Commission, Mr.
ance Veiller, that the commission has made a very careful inquiry
during the past year into all facts connected with this subject, and that
it will be ready to submit its final report in the near future, probably
before the end of next month; that this report will recommend the adop-
tion of ordinances which will greatly remedy the existing conditions and
will protect the push-cart peddlers in their legitimate rights, without,
however, infringing upon the rights of other citizens. I feel sure,
from the outline of the recommendations of this commission which has been
given me, that its recommendations will prove satisfactory, both to the
peddlers and to the public generally. I would ask, therefore, that
the peddlers and their friends be assured that their interests will not
be endangered and that they ^{may} await the recommendations of this commission
with a feeling of confidence.

We, the undersigned, officers, commiteemen,
and members of THE EAST SIDE PUSH CART PEDDLERS' ASSOCIATION
most respectfully and humbly apply to your Honor for
your aid and assistance in this, our venture.

For the last two years and a half, we, the
peddlers of the East Side, about four hundred (4 0 0)
in number, were organized, for the purpose of helping
each other in case of need, poverty, or distress, and
for doing other such acts, as to help our fellow-members.

In order to carry our purpose into effect, we
necessarily must have the means with which to do so, and
it is at this point that we apply to YOU.

Your Honor surely cannot overlook the fact
that the four hundred members are peddlers, and that
about three-quarters of these members are refused the
license or written permission required by law in order
earn their livelihood.

Your Honor, surely, cannot overlook the fact,
that the four hundred members of this organization, are
all fathers of many small children dependent upon their
support.

If your Honor, will please recollect, Your
Honor will recall that last year, before election time,

the politicians promised to give us licenses immediately after election, and to strengthen our faith in this promise, our names were taken, but our licenses were never given us.

We are aware that the license question is now under discussion,

THEREFORE we beseech you in the name of ourselves, our organization, our wives, and our children, that YOU have mercy on us, that YOU give this your DUE consideration and deliberation, and give to us YOUR permission to peddle, by license or otherwise.

DEAR MAYOR, please do NOT forget that we are poor people, that peddling is our ONLY means of earning our bread, and that unless YOU will grant us this right to peddle, we will fall burdens to the City and to the Charitable Institutions.

WELL KNOWING, that Your Honor will not permit of such hardship to go unnoticed, we remain, thanking you most earnestly for your past favors and help, we sincerely hope that YOU will not slight us this time,



Now, Dear Mayor, we do not know what cause we have given you to treat us in this way. Surely you are not made of stone, or without any humane feelings?


The members of our Association are a poor and miserable lot, and if you will not grant us our little privileges in order to make a living for ourselves and our families, you will drive us to desparation.
