



of the CRIME OF GRAND LARCENY IN THE *First* DEGREE, committed
as follows :

The said *Matthew Quinn,*

late of the City of New York, in the County of New York aforesaid, on the
Third day of *July* in the year of our Lord
one thousand eight hundred and eighty-~~seven~~, at the City and County aforesaid, in the

night time of the same day, with force and arms, *one pocket*
book of the value of one dollar,
two promissory notes for the
payment of money of *the value* a
number, kind and denomination to the
said *Quinn* aforesaid, *and* for
the payment of and of the value of
nine dollars, and *two* promissory notes
of the value of *nine* dollars each,

of the goods, chattels, and personal property of one *Thomas Fagan,*
on the person of the said *Thomas Fagan,* then and there being
found, from the person of the said *Thomas Fagan,* then and there
feloniously did steal, take and carry away, against the form of the Statute in such case made
and provided, and against the peace of the People of the State of New York, and their dignity.
