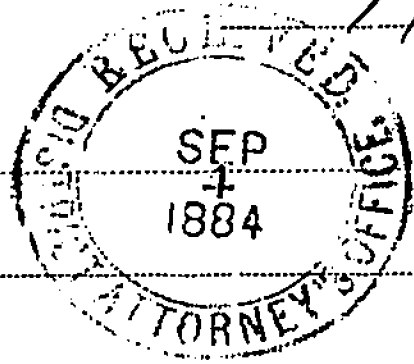

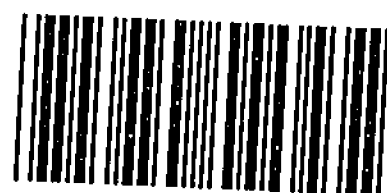

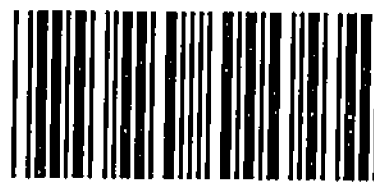

Peter Ehlers sworn and examined I live on board the boat and am captain of it which was lying at Pier 38 East River on the morning of the 17th of August, I went to go down on that pier about one o'clock, I went across the street to Market Street and the prisoner says, "Where are you going?" I said I am going down to the pier. He says I am a watchman and you cannot go down there, you can go down on the other pier and go across the canal boats; he followed me, he kicked me in the chin and snatched the watch, I had it in a vest pocket attached to the chain and the chain was in the button hole, it was a silver watch and worth ten dollars; he took the watch and ran, I ran after him and holleaed for an officer; he broke the chain; the officer arrested him on the pier head, he ran about seventy or eighty feet on the pier and the officer arrested him on the bulk head, I saw him from the time he took the watch until the officer arrested him; there is no light on the pier only on the bulk head, this was on eo'clock in the morning.

Cro s Examined. I am captain of a lighter, I had not been drinkging that night, I came from Brooklyn; the lighter was on Pier 38 which is covered, I do not know whether there is an Electric light on the pier or not, there are large lights, my lighter was upon Pier 38; I do not know the watchman on that pier and never saw him, I might have seen him afterwards that night but did not take notice. Did not he follow you down that pier in order that you might safely go on the boat and that you would not fall in the river? No sir.

0398

William S. Beam sworn. I am police officer attached to the 7th precinct and arrested the defendant on the morning of the 17th of August last.

Peter Ehlers recalled. Did I understand you to say you do not know the private watchman on that pier? He is dressed up now, it looks to me he was different that night he is not in working clothes. I did not see this watchman the night before on that pier and I was not drunk. I was talking to him the night I lost my watch and I walked outside round the pier; that is the first time I had seen him.

William S. Beam recalled. On the morning of the 17th about ten minutes to one I stood on the corner of Market and South Streets, I heard the cry of police and watch and started across the street, I saw two men clinched together apparently in an altercation of some kind and in a moment they separated; the defendant ran up the dock and it being perfectly light at the head of the dock, I intercepted him and arrested him there, I asked what the trouble was and the complainant came up and said that this man had taken his watch and his chain was then hanging without any watch on it. I arrested the defendant and on the way to the Station House he said to the complainant, I will pay you for the watch if you will let me home, I don't want to be arrested, I will pay you for the watch and pay you for all the time. There was no one else on the pier that I could see, the pier is lighted by an Electric Light; from the time of this altercation until I arrested him the defendant was not out of my sight. I did not find any watch. The complainant was apparently excited but was not under the influence of liquor.

0399

The Case for the Defence.

Thomas parsons sworn and examined. I am private watchman on Pier 38, I know the complainant, he came there with a load of cotton, he had spoken to me and I to him, not very often but enough for him to know me as well as I did him, I saw him the night before this alleged larceny, he was very much intoxicated, I did not feel it my duty that night to look after him for the pier was open and probably sixty or eighty men working there, that was the night before, Friday evening, I saw him the night of this alleged larceny. What was his condition as to sobriety that night? he was so drunk that I took the trouble to follow him down the dock and to watch him as he went around outside the pier, I was uneasy about the man for fear he would fall into the water, but he went around safely and nothing happened to him. Nobody can go on the pier without my permission, I am there every night all night, I go on at six in the evening and go off at seven in the morning.

John S. Murphy sworn. I live in 66 Madison Street, I know the defendant since he has been five years of age and know other persons whom know him, his general character for honesty is good, I always knew him to be an upright good boy.

George Meek sworn. I live 290 Front Street. I know the defendant ten years and his character for honesty is good.

Mary McKeon sworn. The defendant is my son and he worked seven years since his father died, he keeps a newspaper stand near the Rosevelt Ferry, he has always been a good son.

Bernard McKeon sworn. I work in the paper business and was arrested by the officer a little after one o'clock at night, I was going home from a meeting ^{and} at the complainant ^{my}

grabbed me and I ran away from him, I did not want to get arrested by this officer, he caught me and searched me and he fetched me to the station house, he charged me with taking his watch but I did not, there was no property found with me. When I was arrested I told the complainant that I would rather pay for the watch than get disgraced.

The jury rendered a verdict of guilty of petty larceny with a recommendation to mercy from five of the jurymen.

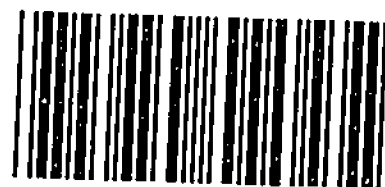



I know the general reputation of the defendant Mc'Laughlin, which is very bad. He is a notorious ruffian and thief. He was indicted for robbery in the first degree on the 14' day of June, 1882, and gave bail but the indictment has not yet been tried. Officer John Mc'Cauley of the 13' Precinct informs me that some time ago Mc'Laughlin made an assault upon a man with a knife with attempt to rob him; that on their way from the Court Mc'Laughlin's mother attacked the plaintiff, re-opening the wound, from the effects of which the complainant died. On August 16', 1884, Mr. Hess, of No. 68 Goerck street, was assaulted and beaten by Mc'Laughlin, and on the night of the 20' Mc'Laughlin came to Mr. Hess's house and said that he had come to cut his belly out. Hess saw an open knife in Mc'Laughlin's hands at the time, and went in his house to avoid him. I can produce further facts, written out, relative to Mc'Laughlin's record, to which I refer.



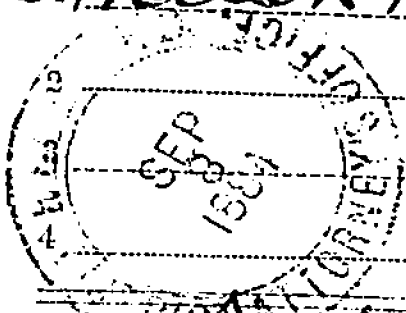
