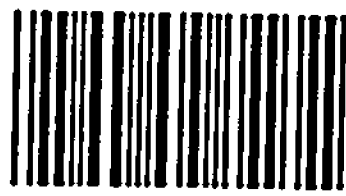

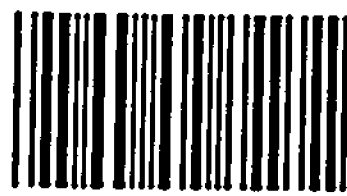

At an Examination in the above matter held before
Justice Marcus Osterdorn on the 6th day of March 1872

Meyer Newfield being duly
sworn and examined in presence
of the defendants testifies
as follows: - Passing through
Ridge Street between the
hours of three and four o'
Clock in the afternoon
of March 5th 1872; the
defendant named Cooper
seized me by the throat
with one hand, and put
the other hand in my
pocket, then he threw me
down upon the street, kicked
me into my face and upon
my head; then some people
came to my assistance, there-
upon ~~and~~ I ran into a
butcher store, and gave the

lady; I landed there, my
 watch for safe keeping —
 she closed the door and kept
 it closed and prevented his
 coming in, he had followed
 me to said butcher store —
 he attempted to force open
 the door, and thereby
 broke a pane of glass
 in said door, thereupon
 an officer came and
 arrested him.

Q Have you stated every
 thing that took place there?

A I have —

Q Did you have any word
 with the defendant Cooper
 before he seized you?

A No Sir.

Q How far away from you
 was he when you first
 saw him?

A I did not see him until
 he had held a gun

Q Was any body else any friend

2. Did you speak to anybody?

A. I had just spoken to a man with the name of Salomon when the defendant seized me. Salomon was standing there alone - other people, were passing there, quite a number of people were passing there - I had a watch on my chain. The watch was in my pants loose watch pocket; covered by my vest I have never before seen the premier - He first took hold of me and then knocked me down - with his fist - with the right hand - he held my throat with his left hand - the right hand he put in my vest pocket - I had nothing in that vest pocket. After

2. Did any body besides the defendant Cooper take hold of you? when the people came to your assistance and you were separated?

3 A. I was struck at my back

when I got up - I could
 not tell who struck
 me - I have now marks
 upon my face where
 was kicked and beaten -
 The butcher store I saw it is
 about twenty five feet
 away from the place where
 I was beaten - There was
 quite a large ^{number} of people
 about when Cooper showed
 me to the butcher store
 the defendant Cooper
 was arrested in a stable yard
 that stable yard is about
 a hundred feet distant
 from said butcher store -
 I pointed the two other prisoners
 out to ~~an~~ officer who had
 hold of them as the men
 who had assaulted me
 and struck me - ~~and~~ the
 defendant Franklin was also
 in the ~~stable~~ stable yard, where

 Mr McMahon and Mr Bruce
 were then with me; when
 there Mrs Brown's daughter
 my attention was then called
 to a crowd assembling at
 the stable door, on next block
 I then left the house and went
 to where the crowd had collected
 Mr McMahon, and Bruce went
 with me, I left the house
 first, at the time when
 I left Mr McMahon and Bruce
 were still in the house
 behind me — When I arrived

at the stable door I saw
 Mr Conklin and Mr Cooper
 under arrest in custody of an
 officer, whom I do not know,
 while Conklin and Cooper were
 led to the Station I together
 with others followed; When
 I came back from the Station
 house I saw Mc Mahon
 arrested in Ridge street right
 opposite said stable door.
 I was in the Station house
 when Mr Bruce was arrested

I remember Sunday the 5th of March last, I was on the sidewalk with a friend in Ridge Street opposite my residence; I saw Cooper and the complainant; starting a run, and strike each other the complainant slipped and fell down, - and Cooper kicked ^{at} him but did not reach him; the complainant got up and ran away into a butcher shop - I saw his hand in his pocket, take a watch and hand it to a lady

in the butcher shop —

After that he turned to go out; Cooper walked across the street into an alley way — then the Police came and arrested Cooper, and then they came for the complainant to the butcher shop —

I saw Cawklin there — Cawklin went between Cooper and the complainant, trying to make peace. I know Cawklin's table at 3rd Ridge Street where the fight took place — I ~~had~~ did not see the prisoner named Price there — I do not know O'Brien —

By the Court — I saw Cawklin arrested — ~~When the fight occurred~~ I saw Cawklin come over from his table to where the fight took place — After Cawklin had tried to make peace he walked back toward his table. I live one door ^{away} from the butcher shop — about 25 feet away — I remained on the sidewalk when the complainant

went into the butcher shop

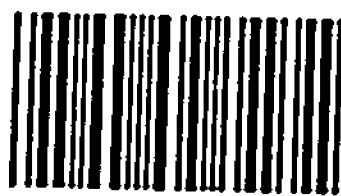

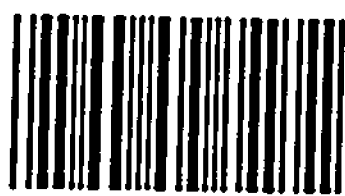

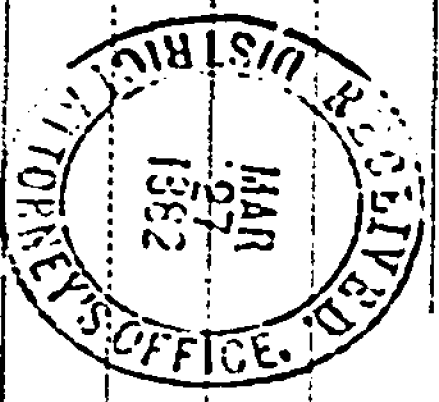
