

DEAR SIR,

We enclose herewith a card of admission to the work now being done by this Company for the foundation of the sixteen story JOHNSTON BUILDING, on the corner of Broad Street and Exchange Place in this City, to be presented on the afternoon of Thursday, the 18th inst. when special arrangements will be made to have one or more caissons in process of sinking.

This process, which has never before been used for the foundations of buildings, is the recent invention of our general manager, MR. WILLIAM D'H. WASHINGTON, and consists, briefly, in sinking open steel cylinders by the use of water jets issuing from hollow castings bolted to their lower edges. The cylinders in this case are about 27 feet long and from 6 to 13 feet in diameter, according to the load which the contained foundation has to support. They are heavily weighted and sunk through a stiff quick-sandy soil to rock, 40 feet or more below the sidewalk, in from 2 to 10 hours each, the contract requiring the full number of 44 caissons to be sunk in 50 working days. The interior of each is then excavated, a concrete bottom put in, and the remainder filled with brick masonry to the level of the grillage supporting the column.

The total weight on the foundations is nearly 30,000 tons varying from 342 to 1044 tons per column, and the cylinders are proportioned to give a pressure of about $13\frac{1}{2}$ tons per square foot on the brick work and about 15 tons per square foot on rock. A fully illustrated description of this work will be found in the Engineering Record of this date, of which we should be pleased to send you a copy on application.

We claim for this process that, on sites adapted for its use, it is quicker, cheaper and more reliable than any other method, and we trust it may receive your careful scrutiny as specially adapted to treacherous soils and heavy buildings.

The JOHNSTON BUILDING is being erected by Mr. CHARLES T. WILLS, as builder, under the direction of Mr. JAMES B. BAKER, architect, to whose judgment and enterprise the first trial of this new process is due. His decision was based on the favorable opinions of the following well known engineers, JOHN BOGART, GEORGE W. McNULTY, ROBERT L. HARRIS and H. WALLER BRINCKERHOFF, all members of the American Society of Civil Engineers. Mr. BRINCKERHOFF has been retained by this company as consulting and supervising engineer on the work.
