



THE MAY WALK.

The annual parade of the Eastern District Sabbath School Association will take place on June 3. The parade, as usual, will be largely attended, and of especial moment to those interested in the home side of Brooklyn life. The Eastern District parade embraces a feature not enjoyed by the Sunday Schools that participate in any such display in the world. The churches of the Eastern District are, in a measure, concentrated. The parade ground is Bedford avenue, which is one direct strip of asphalt pavement, running from Division to Flushing avenue, without any interruption of cobbles or Belgian blocks. The concentration of the churches and the adaptability of the avenue for the parade make it possible to bring together into one marching body all the Sunday School children of the northern half of the city. There is special pride in this on the part of all our citizens, and they represent a population of nearly 400,000 people. There have often been as many as 30,000 children in the line of march. The Western District schools are scattered into several smaller parades, and do not show this glorious front. The Times is in receipt of the following letter, which is self-explanatory:

Bernard Peters.

SIR: Invitations have been extended by the Brooklyn Eastern District Sabbath School Association, to Gov. Frank S. Black, Mayor William L. Strong, Lieut.-Gov. Timothy L. Woodruff, and the Hon. John Wanamaker, to be present and review their annual parade on Thursday afternoon, June 3, 1897.

It would confer a favor on the Association, if you would kindly write these gentlemen, urging their acceptance of the invitation. Yours respectfully,

Should these four public-spirited men find it convenient to accept the invitation of this Association, which we sincerely trust they will, they would not only lend great interest to the parade, but at the same time they would largely benefit themselves, for nowhere in this broad land can such an exhibition be seen as is this annual parade of Sunday School children. It aptly illustrates the church characteristics here prevalent. On no other occasion during the entire round of the year is an outsider better able to clearly see the religious side of this city. The appearance of the parade is always one of deep and lasting interest. Thousands upon thousands of small children, from the ages of 4 to 15, gayly attired in bright spring colors, the houses along the line of march richly and heavily decorated with bunting, every Sunday School vying with the others in its display of banners and flags, bearing religious mottoes, all these make a scene far more impressive than any military display. It is an encouraging view of the aspirations of the present plodding and working generation.

To this scene the association has invited the honored gentlemen named in the letter herewith printed. It will be a privilege for them and it will add increased interest, if such is possible, to the festivities. The Times appeals to Gov. Black, to Mayor Strong, it is needless to appeal to Lieut.-Gov. Woodruff, as he has a local interest in the matter, and especially to ex-Postmaster General Wanamaker, who is, or has been, at the head of one of the largest Sunday Schools in Philadelphia, to accept this invitation. Besides, Mr. Wanamaker has but recently identified himself with a part of New York just west of that section of Brooklyn which now invites him to review this parade.

The heading of this article is "The May Walk," although the day selected is June 3. This inconsistency is easily explained: It was discovered that better days were more liable in June than in May. So June days of recent years have been selected, although the old name has clung to the occasion.


