TESTIMONY.

Patrick J. Brown being sworn says, I live at 1066 Third Ave. & am cigar packer at Plumbeds 22 Bowery. I work at middle table in packing room. Owen worked on my left in the corner & Scullin on my right in other corner. We worked at the front window & 3 packers and about 14 cigar makers worked at back window & in the room which was on the top floor. All was going on quietly & my eyes were intent on my work, when about 11:40 A.M. on Nov. 24/83 I heard a pistol shot and felt something whiz by my face. I thought I was shot and exclaimed, "Owen, I am shot." As I turned round I saw the prisoner with a pistol in his hand and smoke coming from the barrel of it. He had his hand raised over the table. I turned and ran to the middle of the room, when I looked around and saw the prisoner fire another shot. He had the pistol pointed at Owen Plumbedt when he fired. I turned again and ran down stairs as I was afraid he would shoot at me again. I have never had any quarrel with John Scullin. Every one around the place seemed to do all they could for him whenever he asked any favors from them. John Scullin always acted strangely while at work, never speaking to any of us unless he wanted us to put his cigars in press. Owen about a week or two before the shooting made the remarks that we had better look out for ourselves as Scullin would some time or other fix us.

W^m A. Conway M. D. being sworn says,

On November 26th/83 I made an autopsy on the body of Owen F. Plunkett and found on external examination of the abdomen a ^{pistol} shot wound just above the crest of the ilium or hip bone, & about, 9 inches from the median line. On opening the abdomen there was found an extensive collection of blood & serum, showing that hemorrhage had taken place from the wounding of a large blood vessel. Following the track of the ball it was discovered that the intestines had been perforated and the abdominal aorta wounded, causing shock and hemorrhage. The other organs of the body showed no special changes.

In my opinion the cause of death was shock from internal Hemorrhage and Perforation of the Intestine caused by a pistol shot wound of the Abdomen

Court of General Sessions Part I.
Before Judge Cowing. Dec. 26. 1853.

Hugh O'Neill, sworn and examined, testified:
I live at 149 West Twentieth St.; on the night of the 14th of this month myself, my wife and children occupied the house and servants. (It was conceded that the premises were in the 16th ward) I retired that night about ten o'clock and at that time the house was fastened; the servants discovered a breaking in the morning. I went down and found that the basement door had been forced open and the glass broken. A person by standing outside of that door and reaching the hand into the broken pane and reach the bolts and the lock; the two bolts were broken off, so that the door could be and was opened from the inside. Property was taken from the house consisting of silver ware - goblets, spoons, butter plates &c worth between three and four hundred dollars. I have since seen some of the property in the station house and in the rooms occupied by Stevenson, a few doors below where I reside in Twentieth St. on Tuesday afternoon. I think it was Monday the 14th when the house was

0389

entered the property I saw in Stevens's room I think was a coat, some sashes and a silver napkin ring. I identified that as a portion of the property taken in this burglary. Officer Price was there and two other officers. I saw at the station house a tea box, a goblet, a spoon holder, two overcoats and some sashes belonging to the servants; this was the next day after the burglary. I saw a man running away from my house at 2 1/2 o'clock Monday morning. I could not identify him. I could not see his face. I saw him disappear in a house. I judge it to be about the location of the house where Officer Price saw the property. Now I come to see him the bell rang very violently. My wife and I looked out of the window; he was next door opposite, running down and disappeared. I thought it was some one for a trick rung the bell I halloed after him, "What did you ring the bell for?" The bell was over the basement stairs, and going down stairs I suppose he struck the bell. He had an overcoat on his arm when he was running down Twentieth St. That was 2 1/2 o'clock. Because my wife going to bed remarked the time. Cross Examined. I don't know it was the defendant's room only by what Officer Price told me.

0390

James K. Price sworn. I am an officer of the 29th on special service on detective duty. I arrested Stevenson on the 18th day of Dec. about one o'clock in the afternoon, the day following the burglary at 161 West Twentieth St. in the hallway. O'Neills is 149. I arrested Smith up stairs in the room in the same building. I saw Stevenson coming out of a pawn shop on Seventh Avenue near Twenty fourth St. I immediately went in the pawnshop and asked the man what he had pawned. He said, an overcoat. I knew the burglary had taken place. He walked down Twentieth St. to Seventh Avenue; he walked into the house 161; he shut the door behind him. I rapped at the door and he opened it. "Are you living here now?" I said. He says, "yes." I said, "I thought you were a man I knew, I am mistaken." He says, "my name is Jackson." "Where do you live?" "I live up stairs." "What have you been doing out in the street?" "What is that your business?" "I am a police officer." "Where have you been?" "I have been up the Avenue; I have been in a pawn shop." "Are you sure? Give me that ticket." He said, "I have been pawning my own overcoat." I told him it was no

0391

offence, and I took that ticket from the prisoner. That ticket purported to be issued by J. Levy 338 Seventh Avenue. That is the pawn shop from which I saw him coming. I found a coat stolen from O'Neill's house which was represented by that ticket. I showed it to O'Neill who identified it as part of the proceeds of the burglary. The prisoner told me he lived at 161. I went up stairs in the room and found between the mattress three ladies sacques, a new overcoat worn by O'Neill and under the bed I found in a valise a portion of the silver stolen that night. On the afternoon of the day of the burglary I found another portion of the silver pawned in this same shop where I saw this man coming out of. I showed the property to O'Neill and he identified it as being the proceeds of the burglary. Cross examined. The pawn broker is not here. I do not mean to say that the other portion of property found in the pawn shop was pawned by the prisoner. I found Smith, who pleaded guilty to this burglary in the room. Smith said to me that was his room. After I told him I was an officer he told me that that coat he had pawned belonged

to him. The name on the pawn ticket was Jackson. I made enquiries and found Smith had hired a room and had been living there a week. I asked the woman if she saw him enter? She said sometimes he did not come in till late at night. She said she never noticed Stevenson. I searched Stevenson up in the room then I took the mattress up I said, "This is a very serious matter. This is burglary in the first degree. I suppose you know the grades of burglary." He says, "yes." The other man said he (Stevenson) did not do the burglary. There was another man in the house with him and he put away the stuff. Alfred Stevenson, sworn and examined testified in his own behalf. I was arrested by detective Price on a charge of breaking into Mr. O'Neill's house. I did not have anything at all to do with the burglary. Smith gave me the overcoat to pawn. I went to his place about twelve o'clock. Smith was in bed. I was going over to Brooklyn to see some friends of mine. That was sick. I asked Smith if he would not go over with me, and he said he had no money. Hold on, said he, there is an old overcoat of mine, you take that and pawn

it and I will have money enough to go over. I pawned it and came back and had the money and pawn ticket in my hand. When I got in the hall and started to go up stairs, I heard a knock on the door once or twice and I turned around and opened the door. Price asked me where I had been. I says, "I have been up the street." "Did you pawn the overcoat up the street?" I says, "yes." "Whose was it?" "It is a friend of mine, lives up stairs. I am going up to his room now." I says, "I would like to go up with you, I want to see him." He said, "All right." It is up two flights of stairs. I knocked at the door. Smith was at the door, and when he got into the room Price says, "Smith, that overcoat has been stolen." He had some other talk, anyway, he went and searched the room and found a lot of things hidden under the bed. That was not my room. I never slept there. I live in 41st St. between Broadway and Seventh Ave, it is a four story brick house I live with my wife and lived there three weeks. I was never arrested before in my life. Cross Examined. The officer took the money and the pawn ticket out of my hand.

It is not true what the officer says that I told him I had been to pawn an overcoat of my own. He asked me if I had pawned an overcoat. I said, yes. He did not ask me if it was mine. He did not ask me my name. I did not tell him the name Jackson. It is not true what the officer said that he found that name on the pawn ticket, that he told me I had a right to pawn that overcoat and if he found out it was all right he would let me go. That conversation never took place. I did not know the other man's name was Smith. I knew him by the name of Jackson. I was not well acquainted with him. I knew him about five months. I knew nothing about any goods being in that room. The detective can tell you there was nothing in sight in the room. I had been arrested for assault and battery. The first place I saw him was in the penitentiary. He had the nickname of Boston, but he is called Jackson by everybody who knows him. He gave me his name as Jackson. William Smith sworn. I was arrested with Stevenson and pleaded guilty to the charge of breaking into the house of Mr.

0395

O'Neill Brown is my right name. I have gone by different names. I gave Stevenson an overcoat to pawn which was in my room; the prisoner did not live with me; that was my room alone and he knew nothing of the proceeds of the burglary being there. I told him to go and pawn that overcoat for me. I did not tell him it was stolen. I told him it was my coat. Cross examined. No one helped me to commit that burglary. I got off with the property myself - clothing and silverware. I told the officer somebody helped me, but I am telling the facts now. I told him my name was Smith. I struck against the bell going down the steps. I made three trips to Mr. O'Neill's house. I do not remember giving the officer the name of the party who was with me. I told him there was another party. Before I gave Stevenson the overcoat to pawn, he told me he wanted me to go over to Brooklyn with him. I sold the other coats to Levy. I know Capt. Williams. I did not tell him it was a man over in Houston St. that helped me. The jury rendered a verdict of guilty of burglary in the first degree with a recommendation to mercy.

feloniously stolen of the said Hugh O'Neill

unlawfully and unjustly did feloniously receive and have (the said William
Smith and Alfred Stevenson)

then and there well knowing the said goods, chattels and personal property to have
been feloniously stolen), against the form of the Statute in such case made and pro-
vided, and against the peace of the People of the State of New York and their dignity.
