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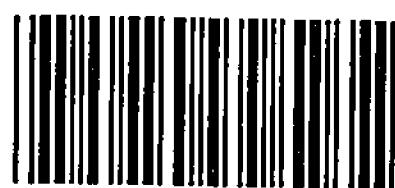

DEAR SIR:

You are hereby notified that the sale of Excursion Tickets will be closed on Friday evening, August 12th, 1887, and a special meeting of the Club will be held at headquarters on the evening of that date, at 8 o'clock sharp; at which meeting the unsold tickets and the money for the sold tickets must be returned. All tickets not returned at this meeting *will be considered* as sold, and charged to your account. As this is the last meeting prior to the Excursion, at which the final arrangements will be made and instructions given, you are earnestly requested to be present.

You will also notify the persons to whom you have sold tickets that the uniforms are now ready, and can be had on any day or evening, Sunday and Sunday evening included—the Janitor or a Committee always being present to wait on them. It is VERY IMPORTANT to call as soon as possible to secure a suitable and well-fitting uniform. All persons who call or send for uniforms will be required to show their ticket, so that the number can be taken and recorded by the Secretary. No UNIFORMS will be given out after Tuesday evening, August the 16th.

The line of march will form at 170th street and Third avenue promptly at 7.30 o'clock A. M.

You are specially and earnestly requested to be on time, as the badges and canes will be given at the starting point before the parade starts.

Twelve men will constitute a Company, and when a Company is formed the respective Captain will take his position in the front and centre of his Company.

Badges must be pinned on the coat, the bar or top of the badge on a line with the second button of the coat from the top, three inches to the left of the button.

Captains will obey the instructions of the Adjutant; the members of Companies will obey the orders of their Captains. This request, we believe, will be cheerfully accorded and will tend to make the display, as heretofore, successful.

Ticket-holders who wish to join the parade after the line is formed, will join the last or rear Company. No person will be allowed to crowd in a Company which has been formed and has its requisite number of men.

The same rules will be observed in the return parade (at night) from the Bridge.

All Captains will be held strictly responsible for any breach of these rules, as well as for any misconduct in the ranks of their Companies.

Captains who have no Companies will parade as Privates in the last-formed Company, holding

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themselves ready to form a new Company as soon as sufficient men arrive; the next Captain in order to take charge.

The formation will be as follows: Band, Drum and Fife Corps, followed by the Commander and his Staff; the several companies will then follow in alphabetical order.

Captains will look after the comfort of their Companies at all times, especially at the Clam-Bake—each Captain taking charge of one table and not to dine himself until the others have finished.

The Bake will be served in courses, and no person will receive a new dish until all have been served with the preceding one, and all participants are requested not to annoy the guests and management by shouting or drumming on the dishes and tables.

Every person will receive whatever they desire of the Bake, but all must remember that it is no easy matter to serve and wait on so large a body of men, and that it will require time to do it; so, with little patience, every one will be fully satisfied.

Captains are particularly instructed not to allow any ungentlemanly or unruly conduct during the parade, on board the boat or at the grove; and are ordered to instruct the members of their Company that the knocking off of hats or destroying the uniform in any manner is positively forbidden: as this sort of practical joking is apt to end in quarreling, and thus mar the pleasure of the occasion.

All ticket-holders, as they pass on board the boat, will receive a ticket entitling them to the Clam-Bake, which ticket will be taken up at the tables in the grove by the caterer.

For the careful carrying out of all details, and to insure the more thorough enjoyment of our guests, the management have adopted the above rules as a guide for the occasion.
