Julia Garrity, 26 Nutor Street.
I live with my father at said place, keep house for him. We moved there in the first week of May 1888. The house is a double tenement house. There are about twenty families in the same. On the 11th of July, 1888, between four and five o'clock in the afternoon I was sitting on the stoop of said house, nursing a baby, belonging to my brother. A noise arose one flight up-stairs, and on looking around I saw the defendant strike the deceased with a foot-stool in the face. His chin was bleeding. The deceased called the defendant then a prostitute, picked up the foot-stool and struck her on the side of the head, which was bleeding thereafter. The defendant remained on the landing of the second floor

while the deceased walked toward the third floor. About three minutes afterwards he returned to the defendant and said, that he would go and get a policeman to have her arrested. He walked a few steps down stairs, the defendant went after him and pushed him. When he was near me on the stone steps in front of the house she pushed him so violently that his hat fell off. One Thomas McKeever, who was standing at the right hand side of said stoop, picked up said hat and put it on deceased's head. The deceased did not strike back at the defendant, but she gave him another violent push, so that the deceased fell between the front and hind wheel of a truck that was just passing by. The hind wheel passed over his back. The driver of the said truck did not see the deceased fall and he could not know of the fall of the deceased before the truck had passed over him. The defendant did

not say anything. He was at once arrested. I have had no quarrel with the defendant; in fact I have never spoken with her. During this whole transaction, until the deceased fell under the truck I stood on the stoop of the house. The deceased was drunk, the defendant was sober at the time.

Leonard Pchmidt, 230 Eldridge Street, I am a truck driver in the employ of J. Perper & Co., truckmen, 123 Grand Street. On the 11th of July, 1888, between three and four o'clock in the afternoon I drove a single truck through Rector Street. On the corner of Washington & Rector Streets I noticed the defendant and the deceased standing on the stoop of No. 26 Rector Street. I did not pay any attention to them, but drove on, until I felt a jar and heard a woman scream. I at once stopped and saw the deceased lying on the road bed, a few feet from the curbstone. When I ~~came clear him~~, he got off my truck, two gentlemen had taken hold

of the deceased, who was then still alive. A young ^{man} said: "There goes the woman, that done it!" pointing to the defendant who was going into the house 26 Rector Street. I ran after her and held her, until the officer arrived who brought her to the Flatiron House.

Thomas McKeener, 26 Rector Street, Laborer. On the 11th of July, 1888, in the afternoon ~~between~~ at about four o'clock, I was standing on the stoop of said house, and saw the deceased go in ~~the~~ ^{there}. A few minutes thereafter I heard the defendant and the deceased quarrel on the landing of the second floor. About a quarter of an hour later the deceased came down stairs, bleeding in his face. The defendant followed him and at the foot of the stairs, near the stoop, she gave him such a violent push, that he fell against me, his hat fell off his head, and I picked it up. When I turned around, to give the deceased his hat, the defendant gave him

another violent push, and he fell headlong ^{on his face} into the road bed between the hind and fore wheel of a truck, which was moving on. The ^{right} hind wheel passed over the deceased's back. I helped to lift him up and brought him to the side walk, assisted by Michael Cahill. A few minutes afterwards the deceased had breathed his last breath. I did not observe any symptoms of drunkenness on either party. It was impossible for the truck driver to stop the truck. He did not see the deceased fall, and the whole occurrence passed off very quickly.

Michael Cahill, 26 Rector Street, Laborer. On the 11th of July, 1888, at about four o'clock P.M., I stood in front of said house, when the deceased came out, followed by the defendant. On the side walk he gave the deceased such a violent push that he fell headlong in the street, between the hind and fore wheel of a truck. The hind wheel passed over the back

of the deceased. I picked him up with the aid of another man.

Albert Williams, 69 Washington Street, Expressman. My stand is at 38 Rector Street. 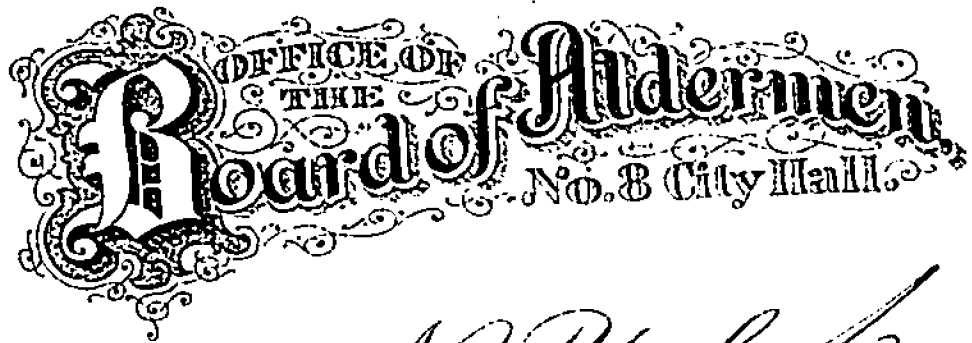

and feloniously did make an assault, and

drawn by a certain horse and then and
there passing, moving and being drawn
in, upon and along the public highway
there, known as Rector Street, then and
there wilfully and feloniously with great
force and violence did pull, push, cast
and throw; by reason and by means

whereof one of the wheels of the said cart, and whilst the said cart was so as aforesaid passing, moving and being drawn, over, against and upon the body of him, the said Timothy Sullivan, and whilst he, the said Timothy Sullivan, was lying and being upon the ground as aforesaid, then and there with great force and violence did move, pass, run and go; giving unto him, the said Timothy Sullivan, then and there, as well by the said pulling, pushing, casting and throwing of him, the said Timothy Sullivan, down unto, upon and against the ground as aforesaid, as by the moving, passing, running and going of the said wheel of the said cart, over, against and upon the body of him, the said Timothy Sullivan, as aforesaid, in and upon the breast, belly, back and sides of him, the said Timothy Sullivan, several mortal wounds, bruises, contusions, lacerations, fractures and ruptures; of which said several mortal wounds, bruises, contusions, lacerations, fractures and ruptures he, the said Timothy Sullivan, then and there did die.

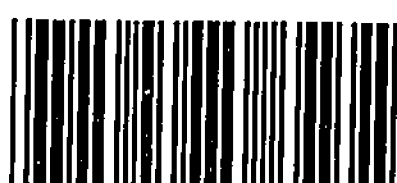

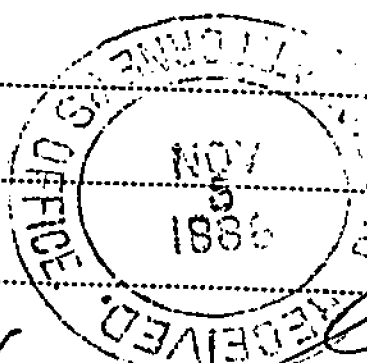
