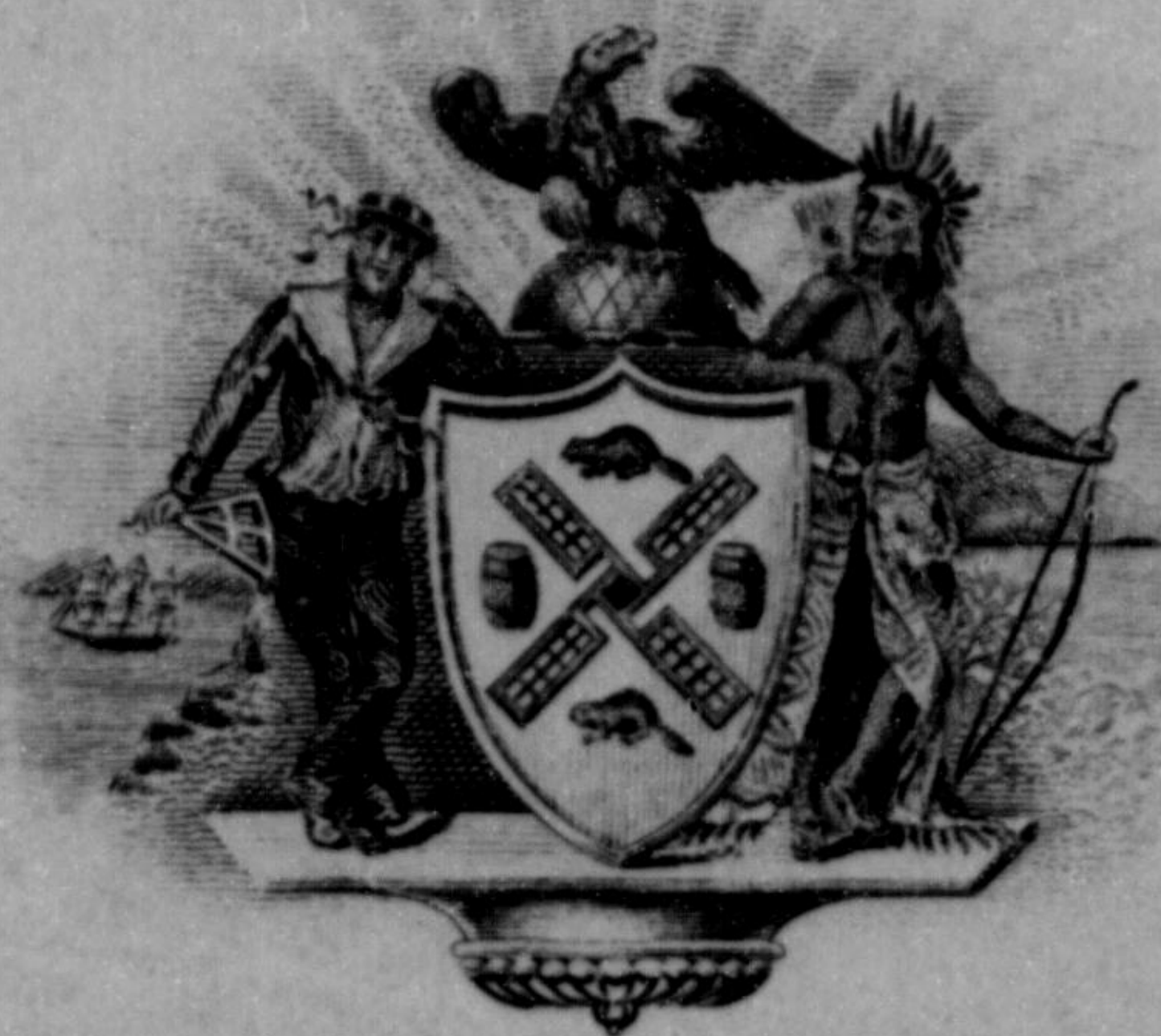

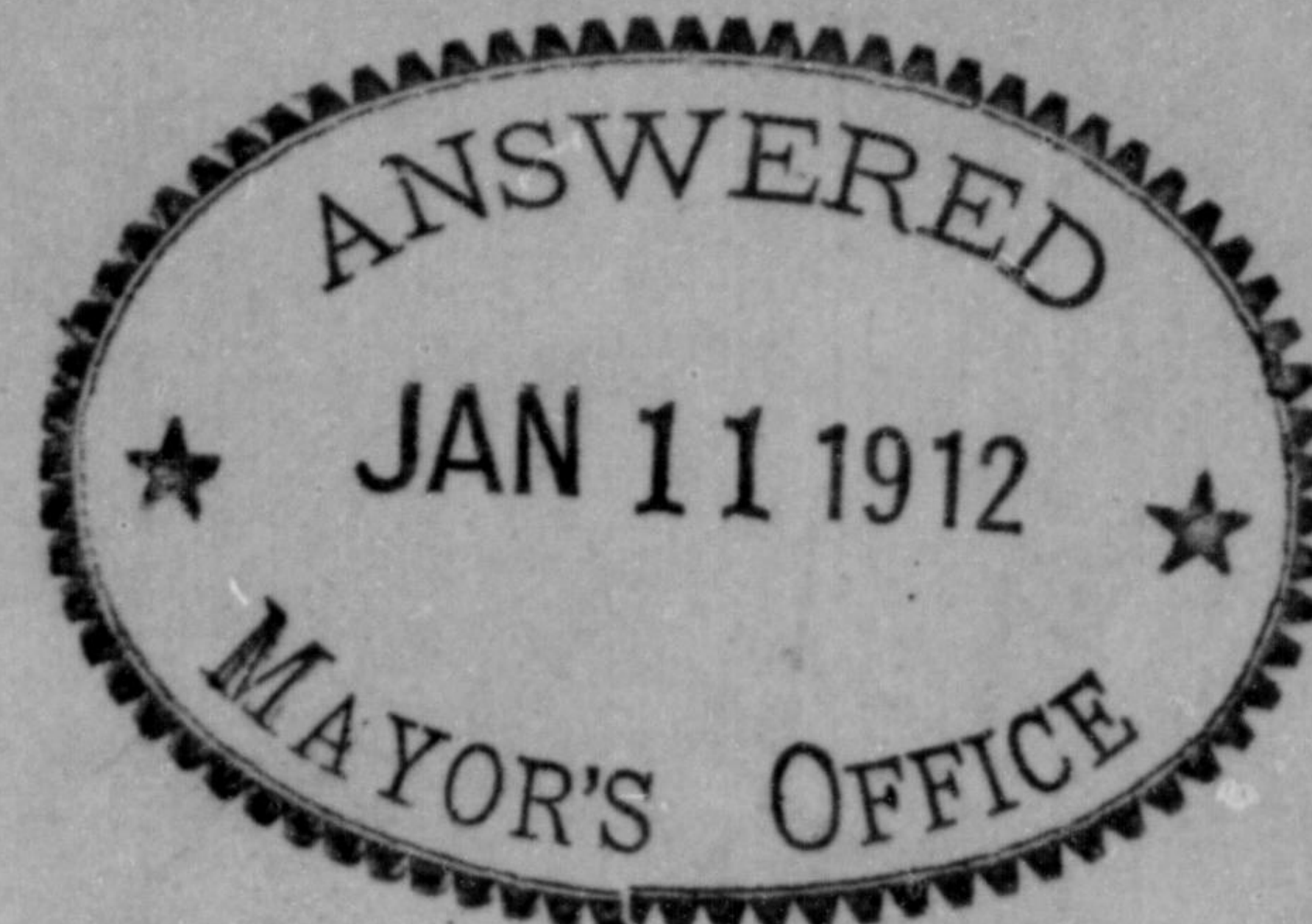

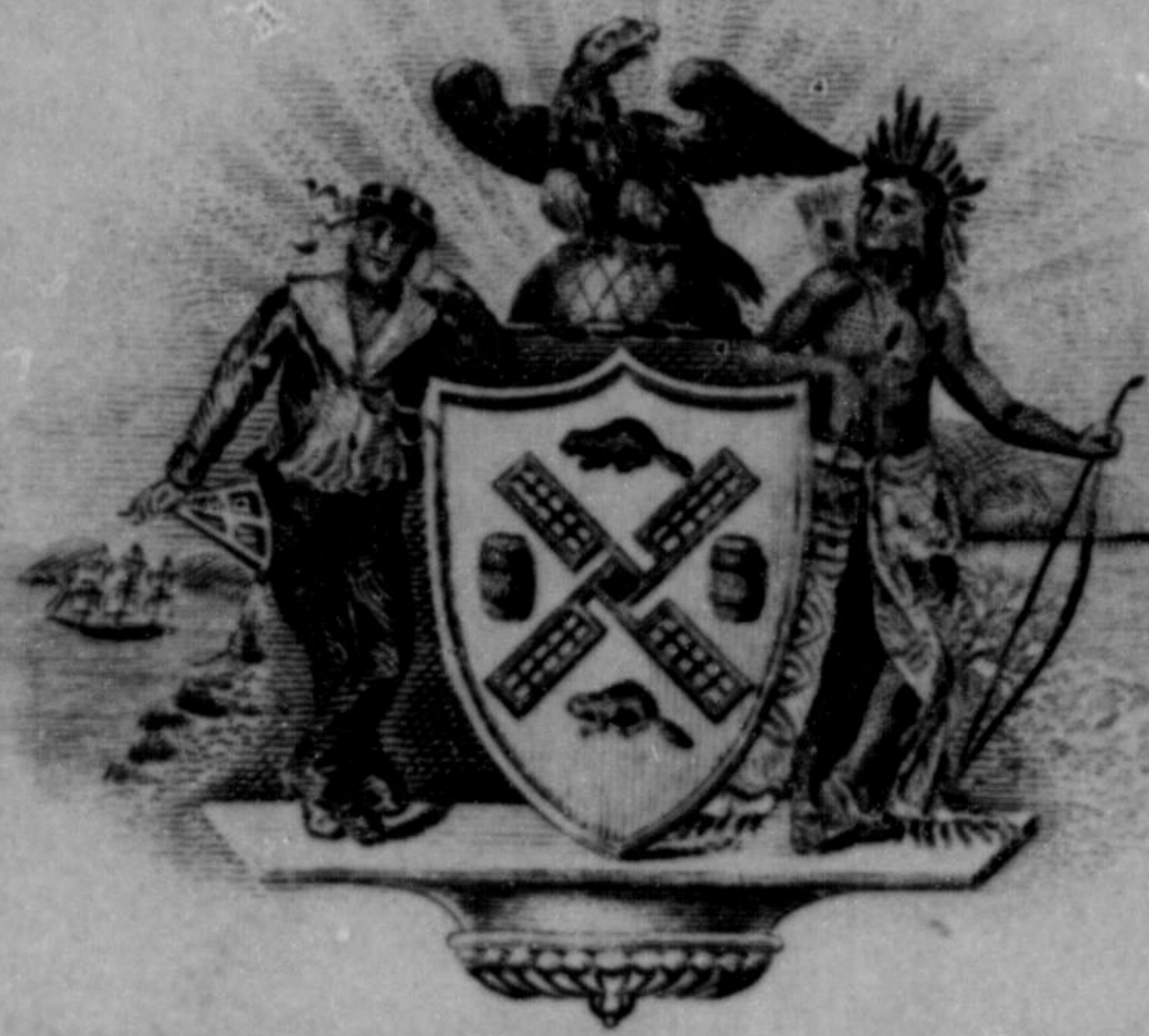
Sir:-

I am informed that the Commissioner of Accounts has reported to you respecting Edward A. Mc'Quade, Clerk of the Municipal Court for the Sixth District of Manhattan that he has been suspended from office by me. The report in that respect is in error. I have not suspended Mr. Mc'Quade. I have no authority to do so. It would seem that jurisdiction over Clerks and Deputy Clerks for misconduct in office rests in the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court. When I was informed on Thursday last by Mr. Ackley of Commissioner Fosdick's office that an examination of Mr. Mc'Quaid's accounts showed failure to properly account for moneys chargeable to him and that he had not been at his office for several days I directed the Deputy Clerk as next in authority to take charge and to safeguard all moneys pending further action. To-day I am informed that Mr. Mc'Quaid has paid into his account as Clerk of the Court the sum of \$4157.68, the amount charged against him by the Commissioner of Accounts. I am awaiting a written report in the matter. I am writing you as I think it my duty to apprise you of the situation.

Honorable Sir;—

I respectfully hand you an excerpt from a letter written to the Board of Estimate, and bearing even date.

" The Clerks and Deputy Clerks of the Municipal Courts of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Bronx and Brooklyn, are paid \$3000.00 per annum, while the Clerks and Deputy Clerks of Queens and Richmond are paid but \$2000.00 per annum, notwithstanding the fact that their hours of employment are the same and the duties that they perform are identical and they are required to furnish the same amount of Bond.

There are 2 Clerks and 2 Deputy Clerks in the Borough of Richmond and 4 Clerks and 4 Deputy Clerks in the Borough of Queens, making a total of 12 Clerks in all.

I, by request of the aforesaid clerks herewith respectfully request your honorable body to establish a grade of \$3000.00 for the above named six Clerks and six Deputy Clerks

I have this day made request of the Board of Aldermen for a bond issue of the sum of \$6000.00 to provide for the salaries of said twelve Clerks at \$3000.00 instead of \$2000.00 from the 1st day of July 1912.

We are informed that it is necessary that a regular grade be established and that a bond issue be provided for, which is the reason this letter is written. "

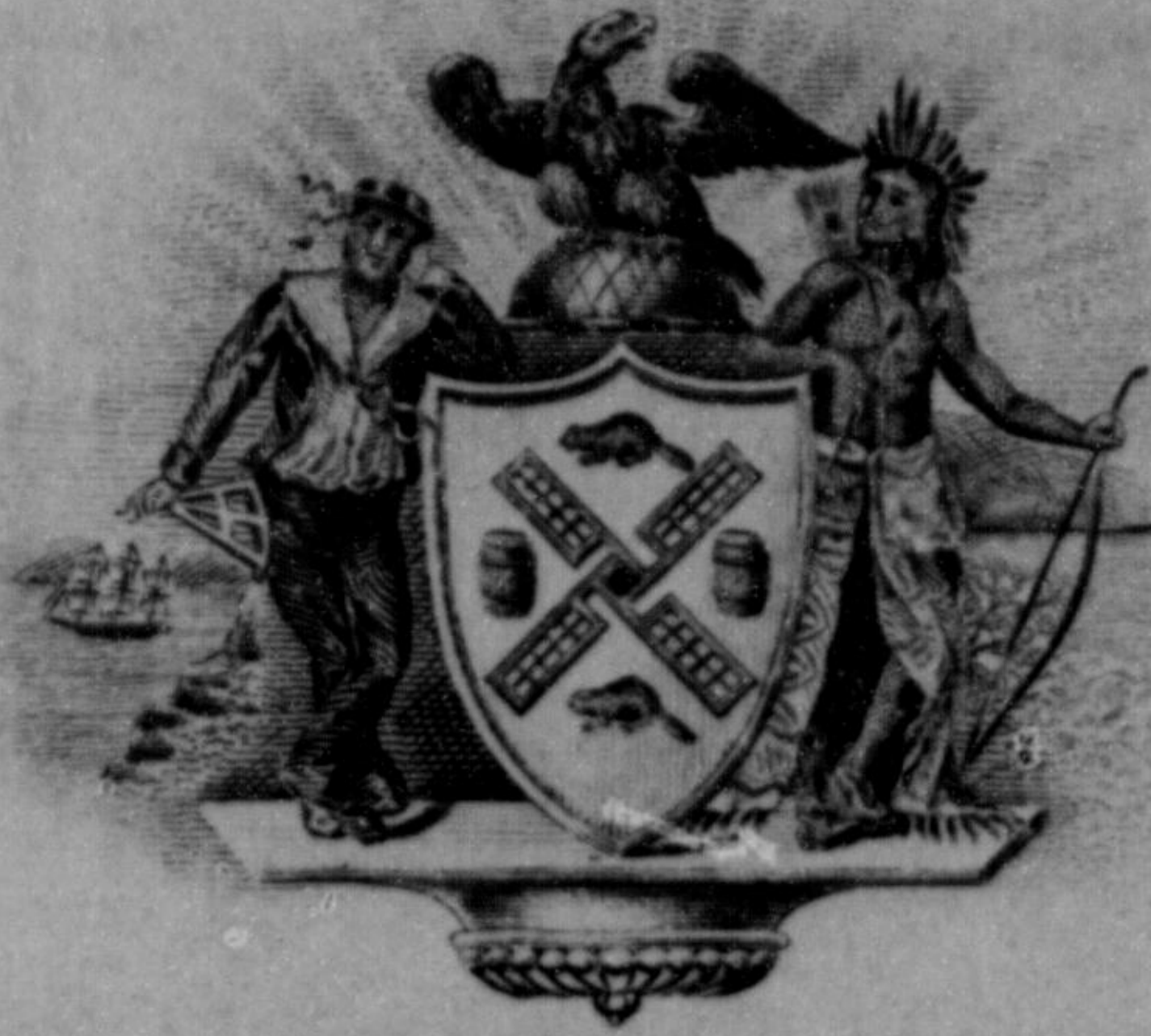

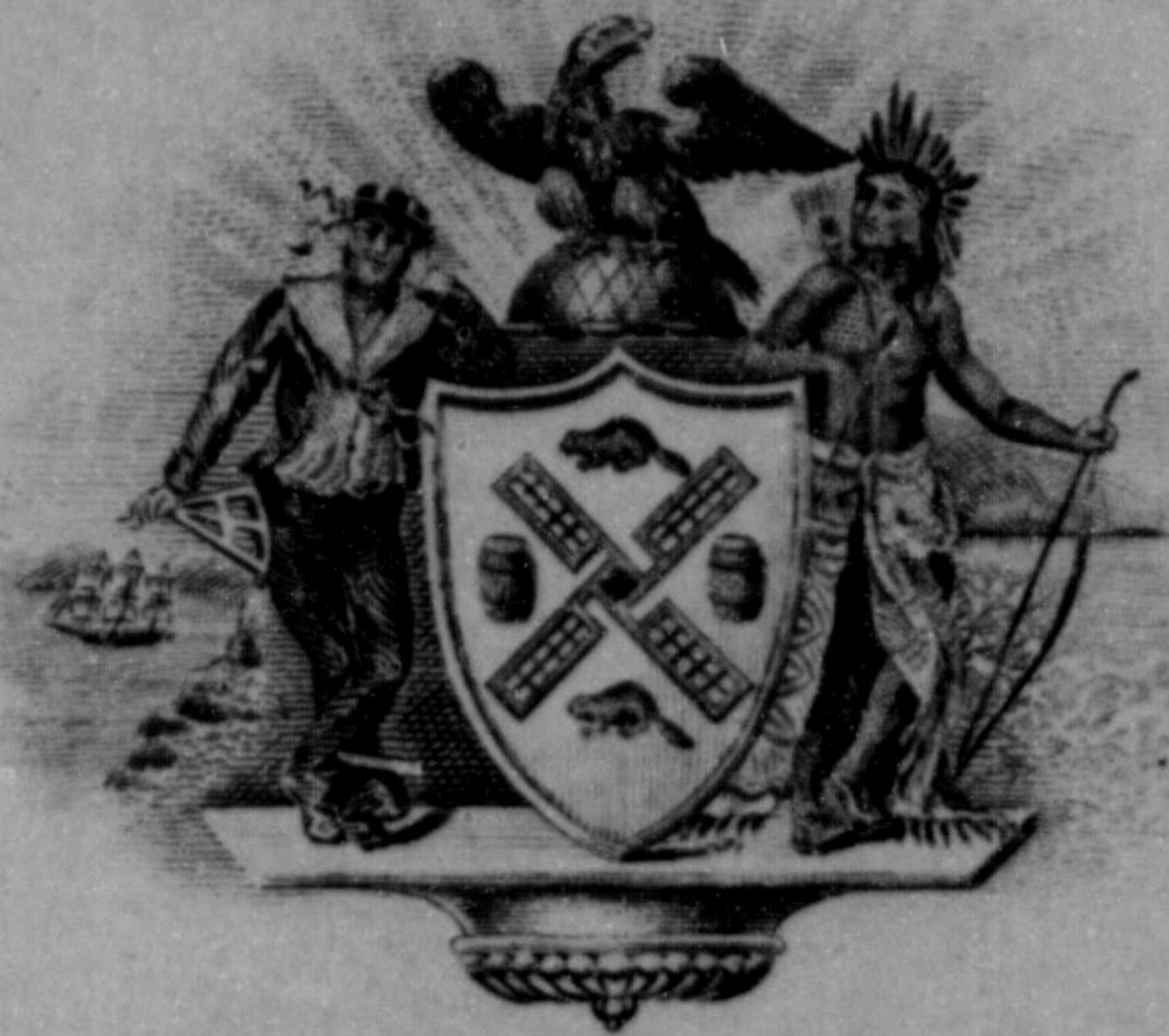

Whereas:- the Court Stenographers employed in the
Municipal Court of the City of New York have had no
increase in salary since 1857, and

WHEREAS:- since that time the jurisdiction of the
Court has been increased from \$250 to \$500, and

WHEREAS:- all other persons connected with the Court
have had an increase in salary at some period since
that time and having in mind that the cost of Living
has increased in this City at least fifty percent in
the last twenty-five years, and knowing the difficulty
of the work performed, the long hours necessarily en-
gaged in court and out of it, the interest and conscien-
tiousness displayed by the men so employed in their
successful endeavor to do the work properly, and believ-
ing they are entitled on their merits to an increase
of One thousand dollars per annum, be it,

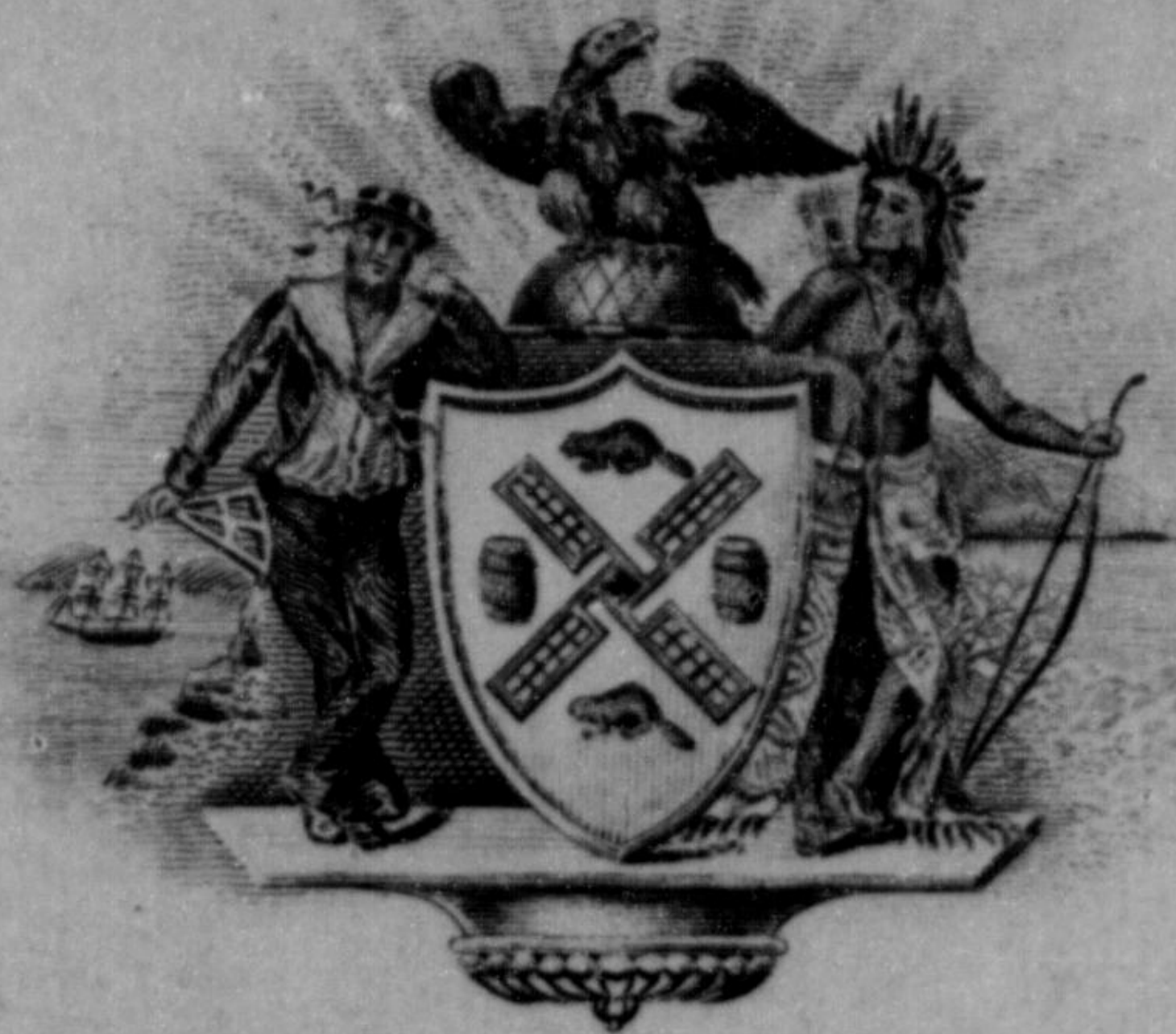
RESOLVED:- That the Board of Justices of the Munici-

RESOLVED:- That we the Board of Justices of
the Municipal Court of the City of New York, do
hereby recommend and respectfully request the
Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to provide

Dear Sir:

Your letter of August 26th, 1912, containing a copy of a communication dated August 23rd, 1912 from Rosenthal & Steckler, Counsellors at Law, regarding the desirability of the passage by the Board of Estimate of a resolution immediately vesting title to the court house site in the City has been received and considered by the Court House Board.

I am instructed by the Board to inform you that the Court House Board will not need the possession of the property for its immediate uses until at least January next and probably later. We will be unable with the greatest possible expedition that we are able to make to avail ourselves of its use until then.

Regarding the passage of the Resolution by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, vesting the title to the Court House Site in the City, we would prefer to be informed by that Board as to its wishes in the premises, being willing to make ~~any~~ request for the

Sir:

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 5th instant, transmitting to me a letter received by you from one Benj. F. Koperlik.

The records of both the District and Circuit Courts of the United States have been searched, but that the Declaration of Intention of Max Greenstein was made in either of those Courts in the year 1899, does not appear.

The only Courts exercising Naturalization jurisdiction in the year 1899 within the limits of Manhattan and Bronx Boroughs were the Supreme Court of the State of New York and the two Courts already mentioned.

I would suggest that Mr. Koperlik's letter be forwarded to the Clerk of the County of New York.

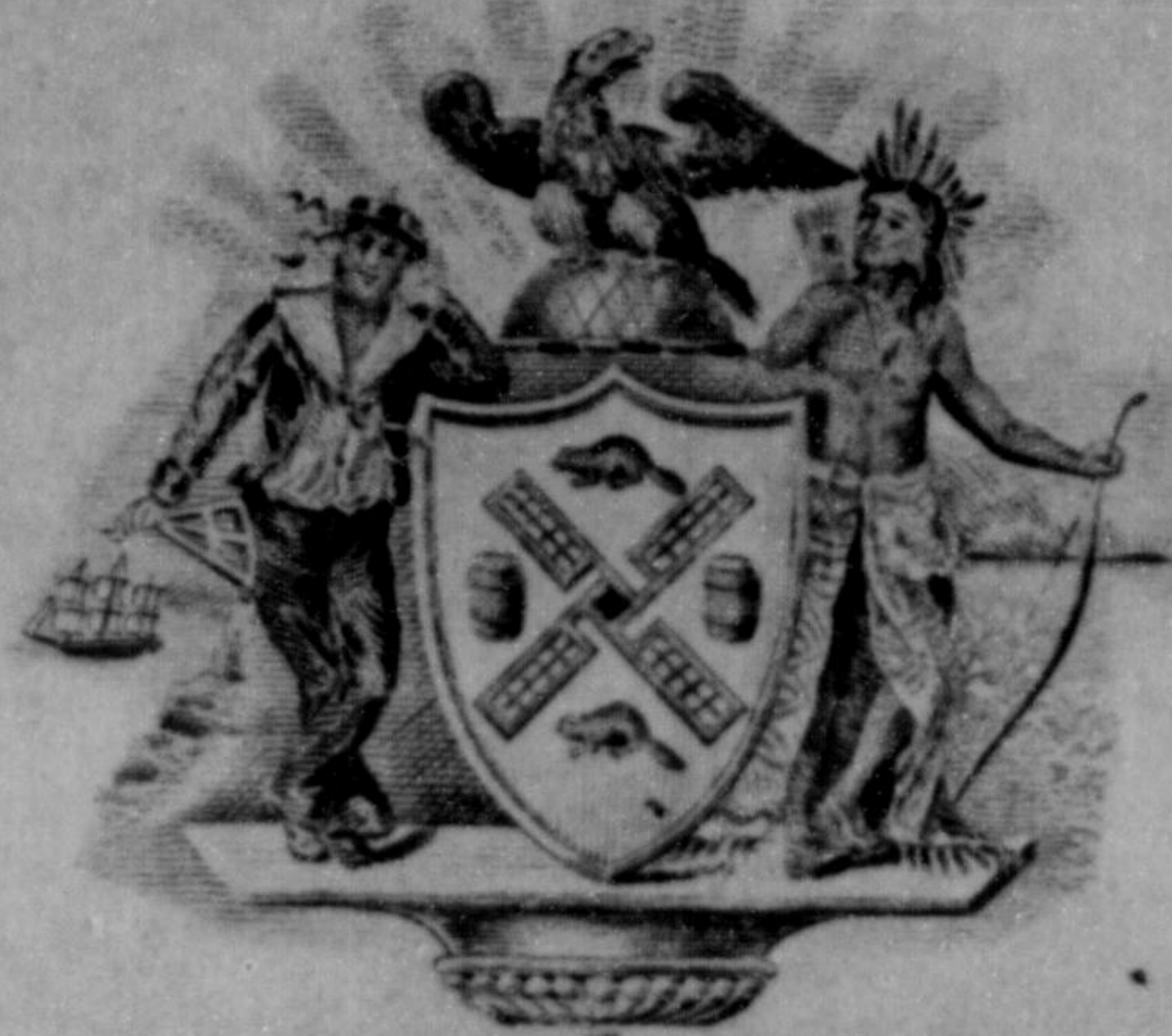

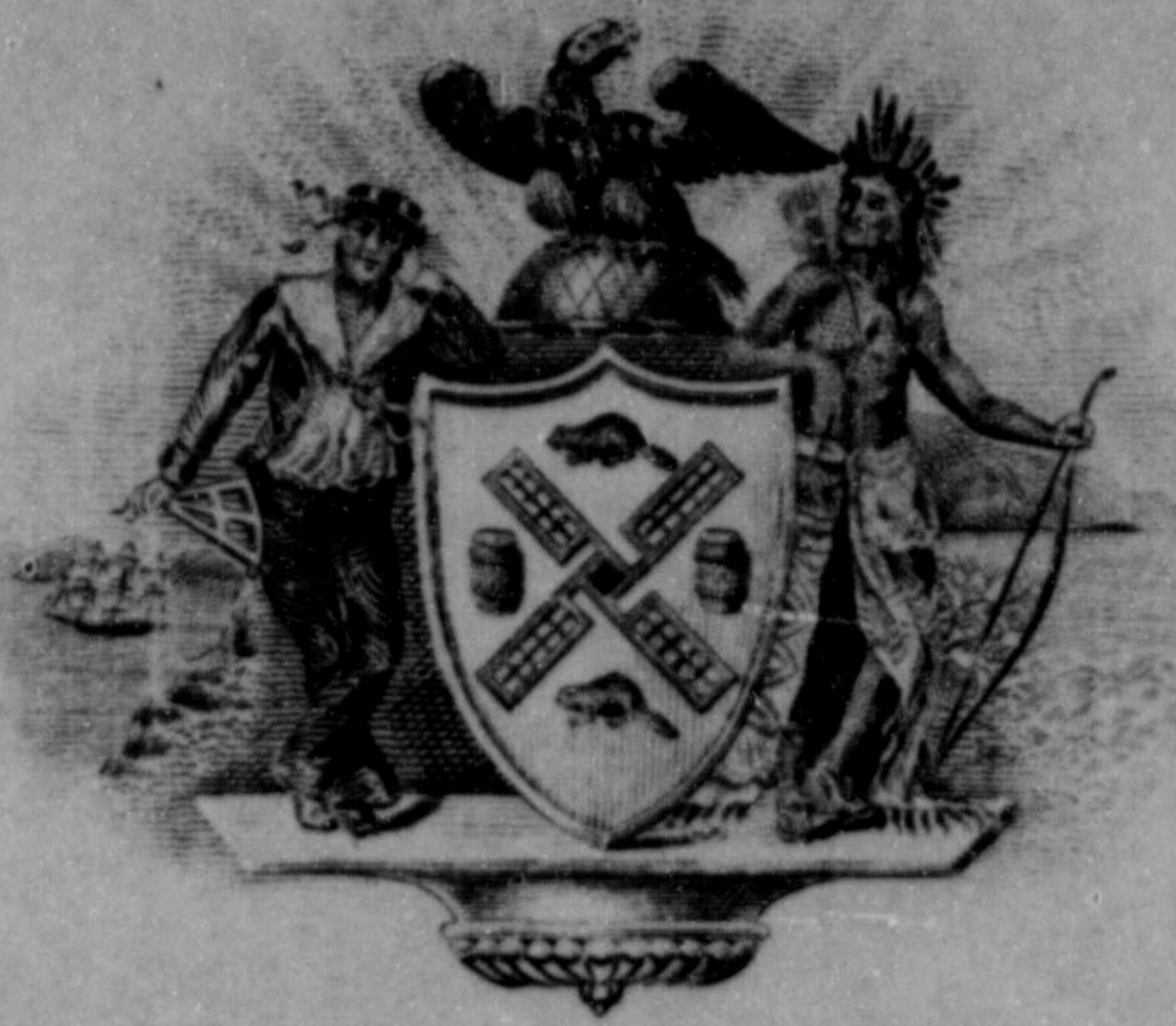
I respectfully submit these matters in the hope that this communication may be considered by Your Honor in coming to a determination of his application.

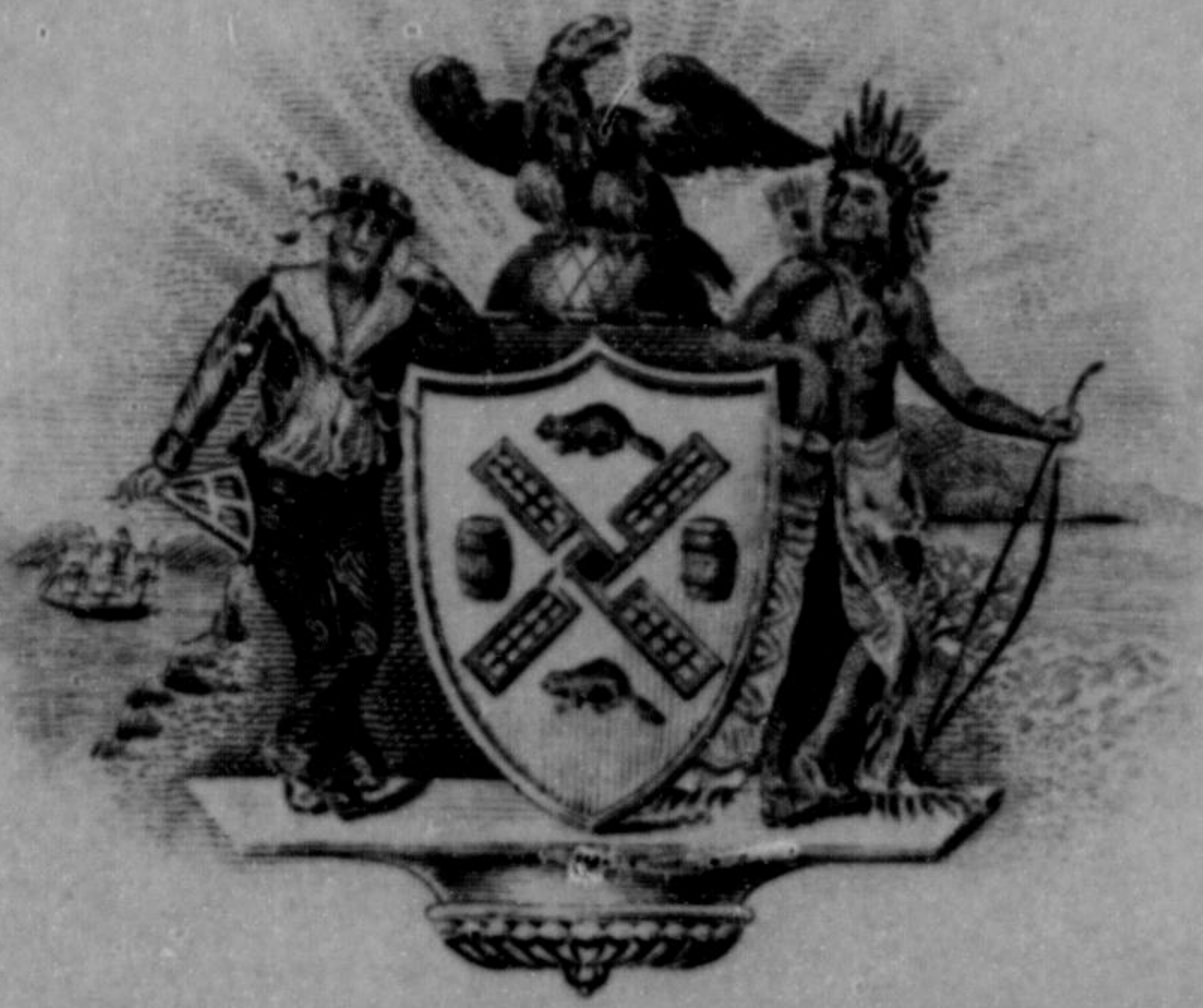


