As complainant in the above case, I beg to recommend the defendant to such leniency and clemency as the Court and District Attorney may see fit to show; but I expressly assert that my reasons for so doing are not controlled by any advantage to myself.

I believe the boy to be of previous good character, & to have been unaware of the nature of his act. 

Maria Divizio sworn and examined. On the 28th of December in this city you saw this prisoner, didn't you? Yes sir. At what time of day or night on the 28th of December was it that you saw him? I cannot tell, I do not know what date, it was in the day time, eleven o'clock. What part of the city? No. 81 Mott Street in this city. What did the prisoner do to you in Mott Street on that afternoon? He came in my house in the morning and another fellow with him and he commenced to get mad, he said, Maria, if you don't marry me I will shoot you with a revolver. I commenced to get afraid and I went in the bedroom and my mother came in the bedroom and said, go and call a policeman and then my mother went out of the bedroom; my mother had a little baby on her arm and she gave the baby in the gentleman's arm and she sat down by the defendant and said, dear boy, I'll give you my girl, she caught him as soon as the policeman came in; if my mamma would not have come out we would be dead, the whole building, he would kill us; the pistol was not so big, my mother got it away from him and he sat down in a chair, he wanted to shoot every one, the policeman stuck his hand in his pocket and took it off him.

Cross Examined. I don't know the name of the other man that came in with the defendant, I know the defendant twenty days, he pointed the pistol at me when he took it out of his pocket and said, Maria, this is the time or not, if you want to save me. He said, if you do

He took the pistol out and he said, now I want to know yes or no, immediately, if not I will kill you and I will kill myself. That is, whether she (her daughter) would marry him (the defendant)? Yes sir.

Cross Examined. Did you send your daughter out of the rooms that day on a message? I called her into the little room and I told her what to do. Up to that time had this man showed any pistol, had she seen the pistol in his hand? Yes sir, he had the pistol out before that. Did he point it at anybody? He held it in his hand and said, now I want to know yes or no, if she wants to marry me or not. How did he hold it? He held it that way (showing); he says, well I want to know, do you want to marry me or not, I will kill you first and I will kill myself. He did not shoot, did he? I sent for a policeman and so we got the pistol away. Did you ever say that you would spend a thousand dollars to have this man convicted? Yes, I expect that justice will be done in this case because my girl would have been dead by this time.

John J. Curran sworn. Officer, did you make this arrest? Yes sir. Did the prisoner give you anything or did you take anything from him? I took a revolver a razor and this picture. (Producing it) What did he say at the time that you took the picture? I went in the room at the time he was sitting down and as soon as I opened the door he jumped up and put his hand in his pocket, I jumped in and grabbed him by the hand and told him to let go; he said, Jesus Christ, no; so I wrangled with him there until another policeman came up, we knocked him down and took the pistol away from him; he said that he had that picture taken yesterday and if she did not marry him he would kill himself that way. (The photograph was taken representing him as trying to kill himself by placing his pistol at his head).

Gaetano Ferranto sworn and examined in his own behalf: I lived in the same room with that family for three weeks and had a little money and spent it. Before I finished my money the mother said to me, are you a married man? I say no; she says, well, if you do well I will give you my daughter. I said to the girl, I am going away to work in Newark and now I will speak to you about our future, it might be I will only come here once in two or three months, I said, in a year I think I will have some money and then we will get married. Then she said, you may go, I don't want you. I said, why don't you want me? You told me a couple of times you are willing to marry me and now that I spent my money you say no. Then I commenced to cry and the mother said, what is the matter? I



Indictment for grand larceny in the second degree

George W. Devoe sworn. I am time-keeper for the White Star Line of steamships and was so on the 23rd of August, 1886, I recollect the unloading of the steamer Britanic, I know the defendant from eight to twelve years, he was at work on that steamer that day as longshoreman, it was his duty to assist in the loading and unloading of vessels, he was assigned to Hold No. 5 I think, I could not say positively that he worked in Hold No. 5.

Cross Examined. I cannot say from memory that I saw him there at any time; the names of the men who were assigned to work with Flanagan in Hold No. 5 are David Sloan, Joseph Goss, William Gotter and John Doyle and Noonan and Flanagan; my book shows that they went to work between ten and twelve, they generally go away an hour for lunch, I could not say positively whether they went to lunch that day, my book would not show what time they left off work, my book would not show whether they were assigned to work on any other part of that ship that day, my book shows that they worked six hours and a half that day; there were probably one hundred and fifty men working on the ship. I have known the defendant to work for that company from eight to twelve years, I cannot say whether the defendant has the reputation of being a hard-working, honest, industrious man; it would take six men more than six hours to empty a hold of that kind I suppose but it depends on the amount of cargo in the hold.

Charles G. Bunker sworn. I am special watchman on the White Star dock and have been such nearly four years, I was there on the 23rd of last August, I know the defendant by sight, I do not remember particularly seeing him that day because there is so many of them.

Cross Examined. There are three watchman in connection with the company's line on the dock beside myself; there is a Custom House officer there during the business of the Custom House and sometimes there is a ship's officer on board; there was not a ship's officer on board that day between one and two o'clock; men worked in Hold No.5 that day between one and two o'clock, I am sure of that, I was on the dock between twelve and one o'clock. I recollect well a case being broken that day, I sent it up from Hatchway No.5, there were men working in Hatch No.5 but No.4 men were working there when No.5 men had gone to dinner; about a quarter to one I sent up that broken case, No.5 men had gone a quarter of an hour before, I did not discover the broken case until No.4 men had been at work, it was pointed out to me as suspicious and I put my hand in it and it did look suspicious, I put my hand in and I discovered a vacancy, it appeared to be tampered with, I sent it up, to the cooper, I did not take the mark on the case.

John F. Lowrey sworn. I am a cooper for the White Star Steamship Company and on the 23rd of August I received a case from Hold No.5, I called one of the officers of the ship, to look at the case which was sent to me by Capt. Bunker, it was marked C. F. N. or G. F. W. No.

3067, I telephoned to Person & Harriman; the case was split across the head probably an inch or an inch and a half below the cover, the goods were either silk or satin in rools, there was apparently one roll out, I think it was Mr Green came in response to the telegram and we opened the case, at least he took the goods out and compared them with the invoice and the result was that two pieces were short.

Thomas Green sworn. I am in the employ of A. Person & Harriman & Co., I received a telephone message on the 23rd of August last to go to the Britanic of the White Star Line, I examined a case of stains on the dock with the cooper, I had the invoice of the case with the piece numbers, the case was supposed to contain fifty pieces but I found only forty-eight, the numbers of the two missing pieces were 13337 and 13338; it was similar satin to the piece now shown me but I could not say whether that is the piece, it was aol colors; there is a color number but we did not compare that, all we compared was the piece number.

Otto L. Oppe sworn. I am now confidential clerk for Louis Russell & Co. but on the 23rd of last August I was salesman for A. Person, Harriman & Co., 457 & 459 Broome Street, I recollect this importation of satin, I did not personally examine the case, I have examined this piece of stain shown me at the pawn broker's in Ninth Avenue between 51st and 52nd Streets and I examined some of the remaining goods in the case and I

compared it with other pieces of the same shade and I found that these were the same identical goods, there is no mark on them, they were of the same quality and same color. This satin is used for batters linings.

George E. Crissy sworn. I am chief clerk on the White Star dock and recollect seeing the goods in the case G. F. N. 3067 from the hold of the Britanic No.5 which was in front of our office, I saw it opened. From the report I have of the names of the men who worked in Hold No.5 Flanagan was one of them, I could not say at what hour he was in Hold No.5.

Leopold Levy sworn. I am a pawn broker at 772 Ninth Avenue, I made a loan on one piece of satin on August 23 of three dollars and the next loan on a piece October 20 of \$1.75, I gave the satin to Officer Mallon, I have seen Mrs. Flanagan before very often.

James Mallon sworn. I am a policeman and received the satin from the last witness, Mr. Levy, I am an officer of the 28th precinct, I arrested Flanagan and took him off the dock, I brought him over to Inspector Eyrnes and I let the Inspector do all the talking to him, I was not present at the time; the next morning I took him to court and had him remanded back again. When we were going out of the Headquarters in the morning I says to him, what did you want to lie to the Inspector for last night? Why didn't you tell him the truth about that stuff? He said, I seen myself in a hole and I had to say

something. I said, what did you do with the remainder of the stuff? He says, I guess my wife told the Inspector all about it. I was present when he was arraigned before the Magistrate; he said to me afterward that he bought the stuff off a sailor; his answer to the Magistrate was, I bought the satin from a sailor in West Street which my wife pawned.

Thomas Green recalled. Do you know whose property this was that invoice called for and that you examined on that ship? The property of A. Person, Harri-
man & Co.

Otto L. Oppe recalled. Two pieces of satin were lost, they averaged from fifty-five to sixty yards in a piece and are worth from forty to forty-two and a half cents a yard, that would be one hundred and ten yards in both pieces and worth from forty-four to forty-six dollars.

The case for the defence.

William Lochart sworn. I work along shore on the White Star dock and am in charge of a gang of men, I have been there about ten years and have been acquainted with Flanagan all that time, I know a great many people who know him down there, I always found him to be an honest, upright man and he always took charge of a gang of men, he is a married man and I guess he has five or six children.

Cross Examined. I never knew of any robberies on the White Star line, I often heard them reported, I have

heard of cases of goods being broken open on the other side, coming on the railroads from Germany.

Thomas Kane sworn. I am a longshoreman and know Flanagan seven years, I know him always to be a hard-working man and his character is good.

Joseph Hoge sworn. I am a longshoreman and have lived here since 1849, I have been acquainted with Flanagan about ten years, I have worked along with him, he is a married man, since I have known him I always found him a hard-working, honest, upright man and never heard a word against him.

Owen Buckley sworn. I am a longshoreman and have been here since 1842, I know Flanagan sixteen years and his character is good, I believe he is the honestest man in the court-house.

David Sloan sworn. I am a longshoreman and worked along with Flanagan on the White Star and several outside ships, I could not say whether I worked with Flanagan on the Steamship Eritanic on the 23rd of August, I worked on that steamer last summer, I do not recollect anything about a broken case on the Eritanic. We sometimes work down in the ship's hold in summer with a little jumper and shirt and coat off by the sleeves.

John Doyle sworn. I am a longshoreman and know Flanagan and worked with him once in a while, I worked on this vessel on the 23rd of August last and worked with Flanagan, we worked with a jumper and an inside shirt with no sleeves at all; there were watchmen

on the vessel and on the dock all the time, I did not hear anything about a case being broken open or anything missing in August last on board the steamship Britanic.

James Noonan sworn. I have been working alongshore for twelve or thirteen years, I heard Mr Devoe the time-keeper testify that I worked on the steamship Britanic on the 23rd of August last, I cannot tell whether it is correct or not, I don't remember anything about it, we are always guided by the time-keeper's books. Besides the men who work in the hold there is always present either an officer of the ship or the quartermaster or Capt. Bunker. I do not remember anything about Flanagan on that day.

Joseph Goss sworn. I am a longshoreman for ten years and work for the White Star line, I cannot tell whether I worked on the Britanic on the 23rd of August last, I may have done so, I did work on Monday I think six hours and a half.

Edward Flanagan sworn. I have been a longshoreman going on thirteen years, I have been in this country twenty-three years and am a married man and have five children, I have never been arrested charged with any offence before, I cannot remember whether I worked on the Britanic on the 23rd of August last, I take the time from the time-keeper's books; the first time that I heard of any goods being taken from the hold of the steamship was on the 23rd of December last, the day of my arrest on the dock. When the officer arrested me he did not tell

me what he arrested me for, he told me my wife was hurt across town and he wanted to see me over there, I was taken to Police Headquarters. The satin shown me now looks something like what I bought off a sailor man in West Street sometime in June or July, I know it was summer and hot weather, I paid him six dollars, he seemed to be a sailor man, he said he was after being to a friend of his bringing this stuff to a lady friend to make a couple of dresses and the people had moved and he lost the address and that he was out of money and he would like to dispose of it. I told him that I didn't care much about buying it, he said he would sell it cheap, I asked him how much he wanted for it and he said ten dollars, I said I haven't got as much money, I will give you six; he said, let me have it as I have no money, I took it home and gave it to my wife, she looked at it and told me it was not good for anything, I told her where I got it. I never took anything from the S. S. Britanic. I had a talk with the officer going from Police Headquarters to Jefferson Market he says, you are in a hole, I said, if I am, I am innocent, that it is a hole I can get out of, I bought the stuff from a sailor man in West Street. I made the same statement before the justice.

Cross Examined. I do not recollect the date when I bought this satin off the sailor man, I could not tell if it was in August, I met the sailor man on the street, he was dressed just like a sailor, he had the satin rolled up in a parcel, I do not know whether it was brown paper or newspaper, he showed me the stuff, he said he was hard up, he did not tell me where he got the satin, this is the only goods I ever bought of sailors, Micheal

Marressy was with me, I have known him about nine years, he and a sailor man came down the street and I was standing on the corner, Marressy said to me that this man had something to sell and if he had any money he would buy himself but he hadn't any, that it was worth money. I told Marressy that I wanted him as a witness, he never told me how long he had known this sailor man. I have been out on fifteen hundred dollars bail since December.

Micheal Harrissey sworn. I am a longshoreman and have been so for nineteen years, I have never been arrested for any offence, I know Flanagan ten or eleven years. I remember the conversation I had with him last summer about some silk. I was at the corner of West 10th Street a summer evening and a man came up and asked me would I buy the making of a couple of dresses. I said I did not want them but to come up this way and somebody might buy them, so I saw Flanagan and so the sailor man took out the paper from under his monkey jacket and showed it to him; he asked him ten dollars for the piece, Flanagan said, all the money I have got is six dollars, I will give you six dollars for it, Flanagan bought it and the sailor went away, this was in West 10th Street between seven and eight o'clock in the evening.

Margeret Flanagan sworn. My husband brought in one piece of this satin sometime in June or July and six or seven weeks after I pawned a piece for three dollars and in a few days after another piece for two dollars at Leopold's.

The Jury rendered a verdict of guilty of petty larceny with a strong recommendation to mercy.

Hannah Butcher sworn and examined. Where do you live? 18 Essex Street. Were you in the city of New York on January 10? Yes. What time were you on Hester Street when you saw the prisoner? About noon time. Tell these gentlemen what the prisoner did to you at noon time on January 10, if anything? I was coming from the store on my way home and he was passing me and all at once snatched my pocket-book out of my dress pocket. How much money if any was in the pocket-book? Two silver dollars and thirty cents. To whom did that money and pocket-book belong? It was my own money. Are you sure that this man Micheal Flanagan now on trial is the man who snatched that pocket-book out of your dress? Yes sir. Yes sir.

Zemmer Neveskey sworn. I was on Hester St. on January 10 and saw the last witness and the prisoner there; as I passed I saw this man pulling out his hand out of the lady's pocket, what he took out I do not know, she commenced immediately to halloo and said, give me my money and he turned and went around a box and then she went nearer and halloed again and when the prisoner saw the crowd was gathering he ran away; several by-standers ran after him and they caught him, they told him to give the money, he was with another little boy and the little boy spoke German and said to the lady, come home with me and you will get your money; an officer came up and took him in his custody. When the prisoner said to me in my own language, what do you want, then the policeman pushed me away.
