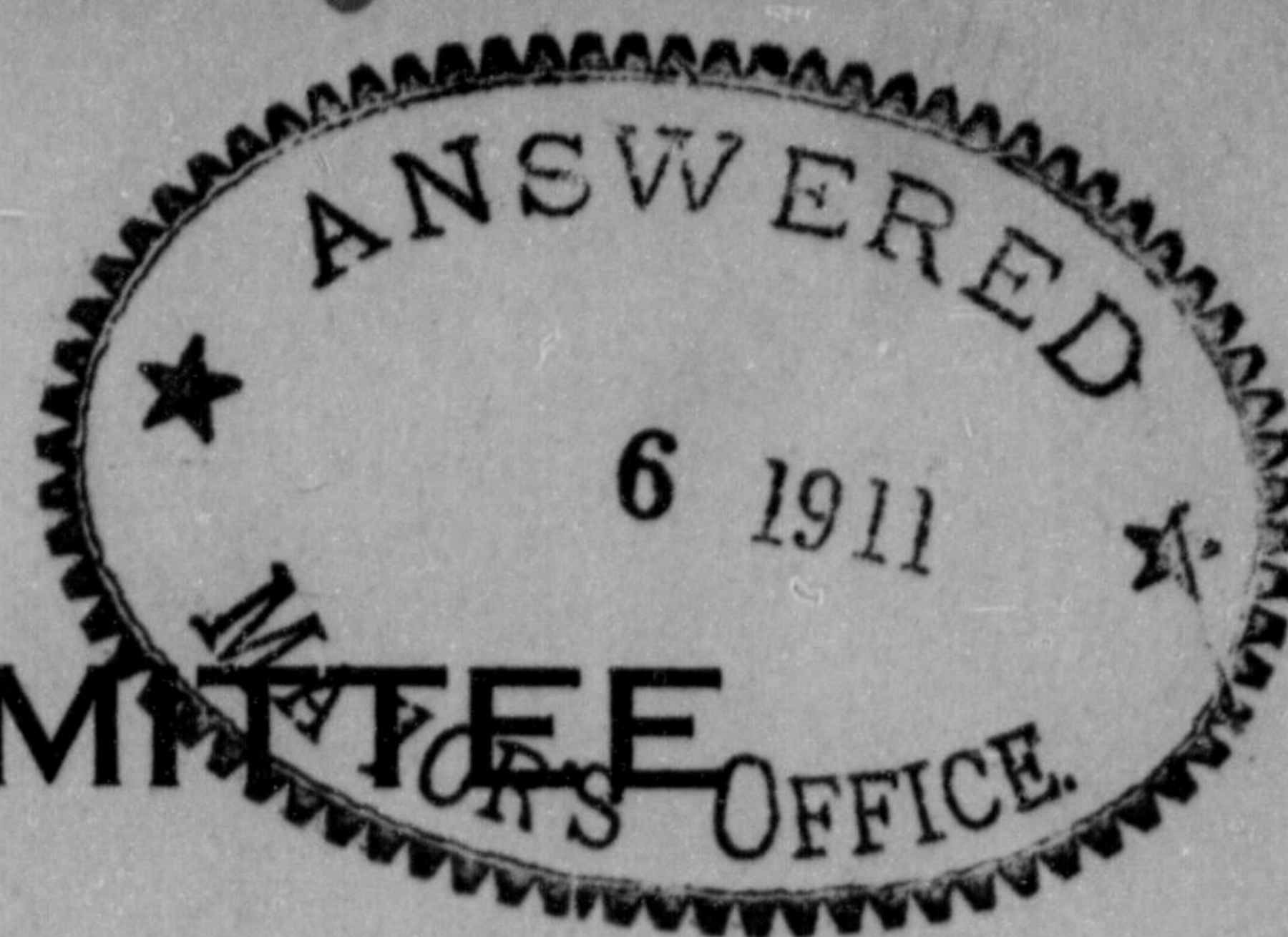

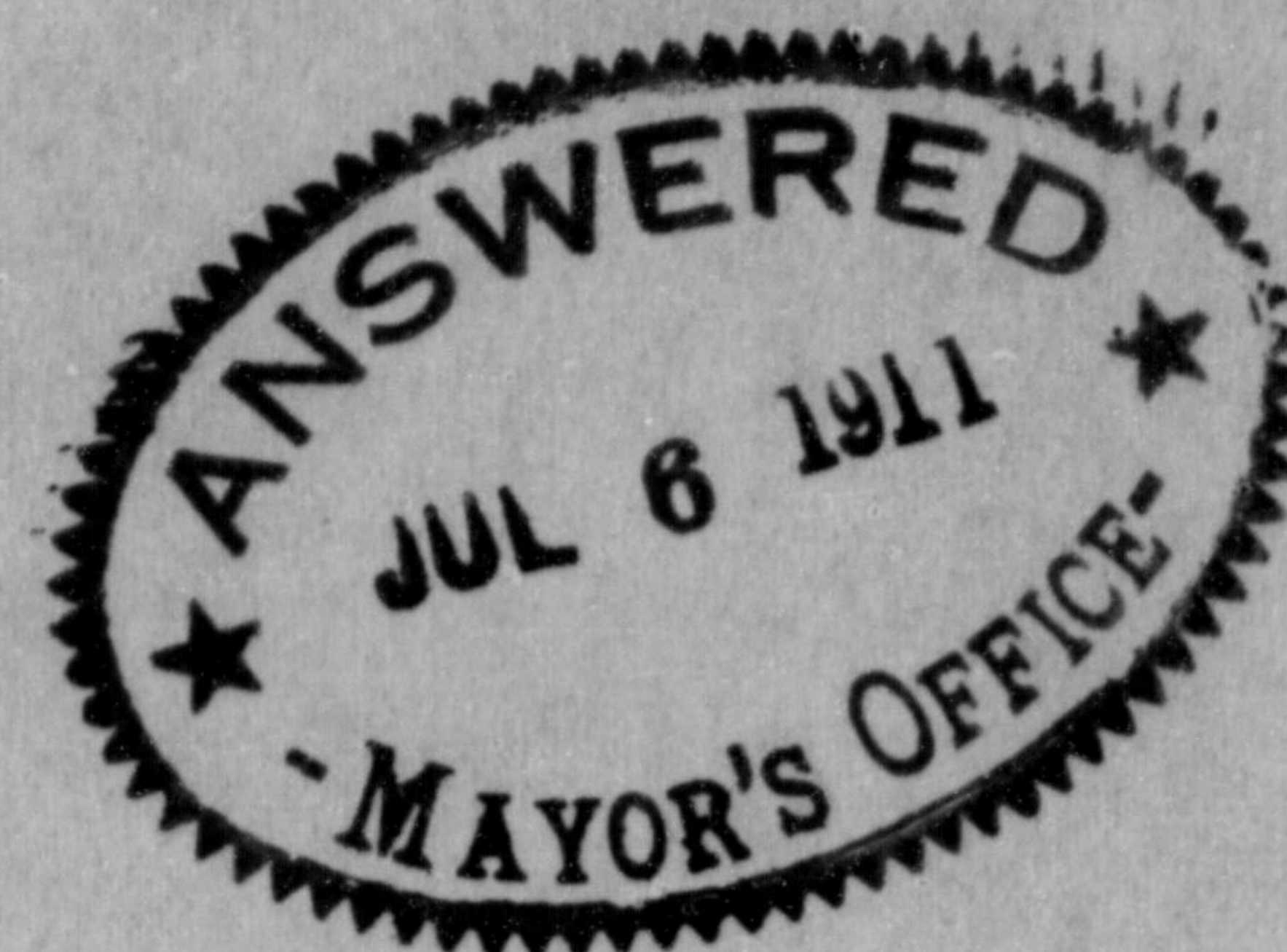

The Jamaica Committee appointed by you claim for Jamaica the position of Honor of all the celebrations in the City of New York, for the reason that not a single ambulance call occurred nor any accident to children took place throughout the entire day.

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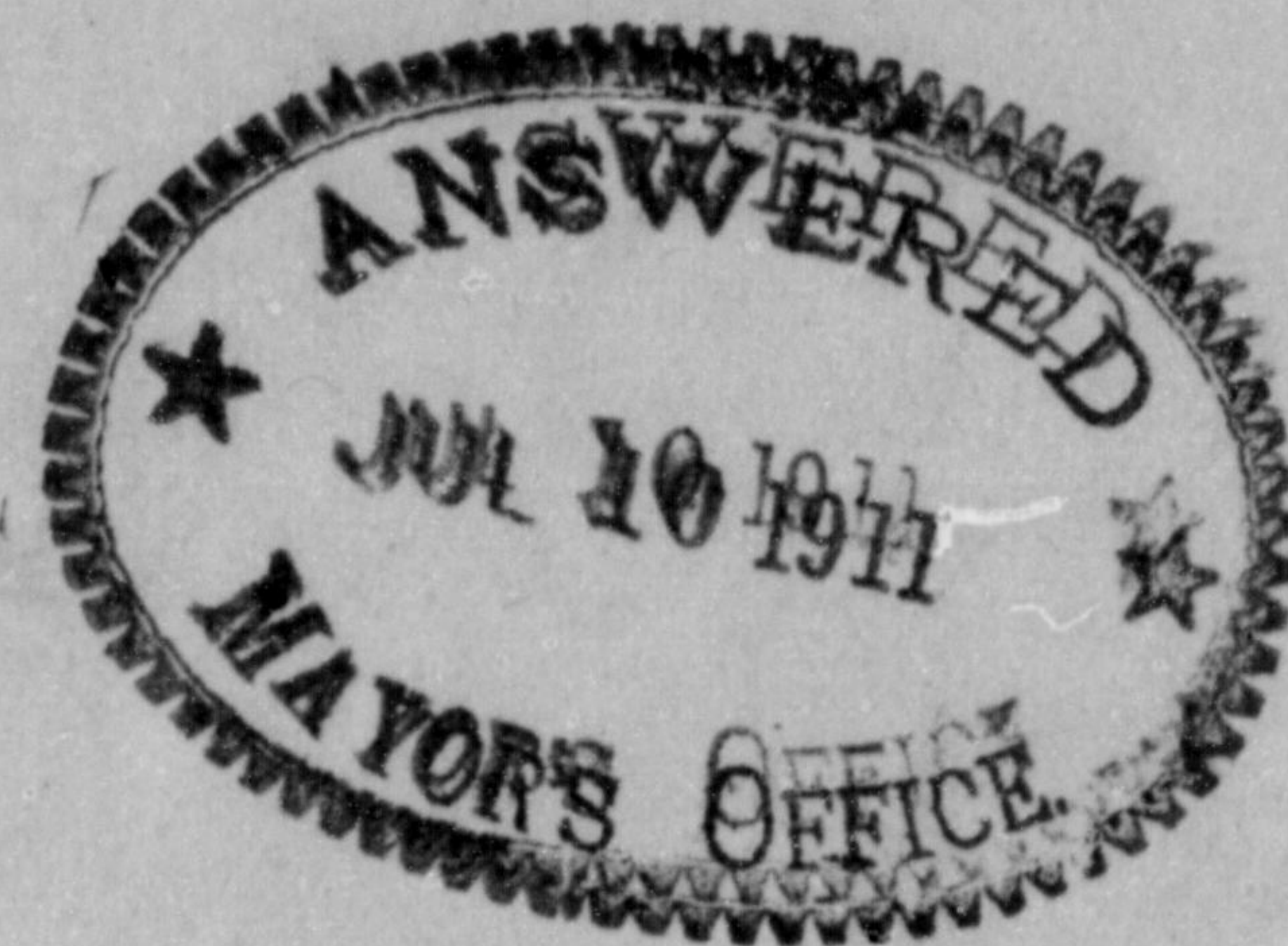
