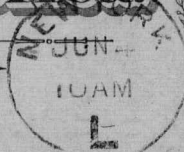

It has been brought to my notice, that a bill passed by the Hon Board of Alderman is before you for signature, authorizing the creation of a second public pound. The measure is unequalled for, eminently unjust, and created in the interest of a Tammany Hall man name Dickson

The present poundmaster, Louis Briegal, is living within a mile and a half of Van Cress where the proposed pound is to be situated. The present pound



does not at any time contain  
more than 20 animals, and during  
winter months average 2 animals.

From this data your Honor  
may see there is no real necessity  
for another pound.

Alderman Randall, who framed  
the original bill, quashed it, when  
he ascertained the injustice it  
would be doing Mr Obeigal.

If you desire a delegation to  
protest against your signature being  
appended to the bill, we can send  
one that will fill your rooms.

My Dear Mr. Mayor:-

On behalf of the Republicans of the 23rd Assembly District I would respectfully request the appointment of Mr. Gardiner Conklin of 185th Street and Kingsbridge Road as Pound Keeper. I am informed there has been no pound in this neighborhood for the past three or four years and I apply to have such a position created at the suggestion of the Acting Captain of the 32nd Precinct. In a conversation with him within the last few days he stated that his Precinct was overrun with goats and other animals running loose and that the <sup>police</sup> were practically unable to abate the nuisance on account of the fact that the nearest pound was at Arthur Avenue in the Annexed District, somewhere in the neighborhood of West Farms, a distance of some four miles by a circuitous route from the police station. Sargeant Kirschner also informed me that he was in receipt of numerous complaints from property owners stating that goats and other animals were allowed to run wild and that he was practically powerless to force the ordinance on account of his inability to get rid of the said animals after he had captured them.

After this conversation I looked around for a party who would have an available place within a reasonable distance of the

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police station. Mr. Conklin's place is very nearly in the centre of the District in which most of the annoyance occurs, and it would be quite accessible and convenient for the Police. I understand the pound keepers compensation is ~~with~~ <sup>only,</sup> fees <sup>^</sup> therefore the appointment would not be adding any expense to the City government. Will you kindly give this matter your consideration?

Dear Sir.

Received your letter in regard to a complaint

to drive cattle to the Pound at night time  
is a falsehood that I can prove by my  
books that are always open for inspection  
and also my neighbors. In regard to going  
to an officer's assistance when he is bumping  
cattle to Pound is done by men (Citizens)  
not boys and their work is to open the  
Pound gates and help the officer to get the  
cattle in to the Pound safe and uninjured

Your Honor my Pound is very strictly  
kept in every respect a thing that was not  
done at any of the former Pounds  
my place is the largest and has the finest  
accommodations for the animal ~~me~~ he may be  
be worth one dollar or two Hundred dollars  
they get the same good care. I am residing  
25 years in my district and I never knew  
I had an enemy this so called Citizen  
and Cattle owner might have been one of  
my Tammany Hall friends that had  
his cattle pounded.
