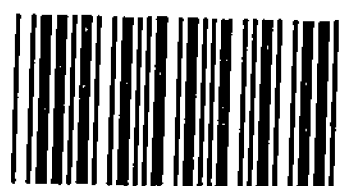

Count of General Sessions. Part I
Before Recorder Smyth. Nov. 13. 1882
Indictment for grand larceny.
George W. Betts sworn. I saw the prisoners
on the 13th of October. I am employed by
the Electric Light Co. I was going through
Twenty fifth St. and Broadway down Fifth
ave. I saw two men, the prisoners, acting
very suspiciously. The wire of the Company
runs from Twenty fifth St. to the Union
Club House across the rooftops; it is
what they call "a dead wire," having been
disconnected during the summer months
from the line connected with the Club
house. I saw those men acting very sus-
piciously from Twenty second to Twenty third
sts. In Twenty second St. they tried to get
out on the top of the house. This was 10 1/2
in the morning. They tried to get into
various houses by ringing the door bells
and going up under the pretence of
being telegraph men. These wires run
across the street. They run at fifteen
or twenty houses. I was in a position where
I could see their actions. I saw Nolan
go up into No 24 West Twenty third St; he
disconnected the wire of that company;
he tied it to the hook of a post there.

I could see this from the street. Then he came down and this other man went up into this house and disconnected the wire from the roof of 4th West Twenty second st; then he rolled it up into a coil and rolled it right off the front of the house down into Twenty second street on the sidewalk. This man Nolan received it and put it on his back and carried it to Twenty first st. near Broadway in front of Park and Spud's store; then he went and got an expressman and put it on a truck and gave it to the expressman. This other man was assisting him. There was a third party in this case which I have not been able to get; the third man I did not know only by description; he was a kind of a look out down below and the truckman and the man Nolan rode down to Spring st. near Marion. There was a junk shop there, McGinnis' - they went into it and tried to sell it; he was there some five or ten minutes and I was under the impression that McGinnis did not take the wire. I called officer Brennan and had him arrested. I followed them all the way to the junk

store. It was copper wire insulated with gutta percha. There was 92 1/2 pounds and to the best of my knowledge it was worth about 45 cents a pound; it was the property of the United States Electric Co. Cross examined. I did not see any of these men have badges to show that they were connected with the Telegraph Co..

Owen Brady sworn. I am a truckman and have been so for fifteen years. I saw the prisoners on the 13th of Oct. Nolan came up to me where my truck was standing corner of Twenty Third St. and Fifth Ave. He asked me if I wanted a job? I said, Certainly. "How much will you take fifty pounds of wire down to Crosby and Spring sts?" I said, "a dollar." "I want give you a dollar." "If you do not, I will not go with you. I could take five coils as well as one." He came back and said, "All right." "Where is this wire?" "On Twenty first St. and Broadway." I took the blankets from my horse and drove down. The man was standing three yards from the wire. I pulled up along the gutter and Nolan got hold of the end of the wire and chucked it on my truck. The other man was along with him. I drive down Broadway.

until I came to Prince St. and Broadway and I stopped there. I said, "Where do you want to go?" He said, "Right down the block." The officer and this detective arrested Nolan. The truck and the wire was taken to the station house. I did not see any badges on any of these men.

Edward Brennan sworn. I am a member of the police force; on the 13th of Oct. I arrested the prisoner Nolan in Spring near Marion St. near the junk shop; it must be about two o'clock. I took him at the request of Mr. Betts and the driver and the wire was taken to the station house.

John Nolan, sworn and examined in his own behalf testified. Lockwood and I were standing at the corner of Cedar and Church Sts. about half past eight in the morning; there was two or three telegraph men standing at the corner; they generally stand round there when out of work. I guess it was nine o'clock like Supple came along; he was employed by the United States Electric Light Co. Our faces were familiar to him; he saw us working; he knew that we were telegraph men; he called us over and asked us if we wanted to make a

days wages, and we said, "yes." He says,
 "I am going to take down some wires that
 is not working, belonging to the United States
 Co. the wire that runs into the Union
 League Club; they are not using that wire
 I am employed to take it down and I
 want a couple of men to help me." He
 said, "all right, we will go along." He went
 up near the corner of Fifth Avenue and
 Twenty Second St. Somebody had to get on
 that roof to undo the wire; he told Lockwood
 to go on this house; he went over and rang
 the bell; the colored man came to the door
 and asked him what he wanted? He said
 he wanted to get on the roof. He told him, you
 cannot get on here - we are not supposed
 to let everybody on the roof unless you can
 show your authority. He told Mike Supple. He said,
 "I'll fix that." He came over and rang the
 bell and said to the colored man, "I belong to
 the Electric Light Co." He said, I am not al-
 lowed to let anybody up, but if it don't take
 you long I will let you. Supple had his badge
 on his vest right under the coat. Finally
 Lockwood got on the roof; he came round
 with me to Twenty Third St. and showed
 me the house. Lockwood did not have any-
 thing to disconnect the wire with. I had to

cut it. I was going around Twenty Third St. when I let the wire over to him from Twenty Third St.; he rolled it up on the roof. This man told me to roll it up there and throw it in the street. I asked the man if I could go on the roof; he said, there is another man on the roof now; he did not see him going down. I said, "No sir, he has come on the street; and he told me I could go up. Go ahead and get that wire down as soon as you can, it is a nuisance." I went up. I had Supple's plyers; neither Lockwood nor I had tools; we did not expect to work that day; we left our tools home. He came down on the street. Supple carried it on his shoulder to Fifth Avenue; the wire weighed 92 pounds. He said to me to go over to Twenty Third St. and hire an express wagon and get it as cheap as you can. I hired this man and told him it was to carry some wire down to Marion and Spring Sts.; he said he would charge a dollar. I said, "All right." So he drove round to where the wire was and Supple and I put it on the wagon and rode down to near Spring St. and he got off. I did not know what he was going to do with the wire. He says to me, "You go ahead and stop at the corner of

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Marion and Spring sts. I will be there in two minutes. The truckman drove a little past the store. So then the watchman for the Company and the police officer came and arrested me. Supple showed me his ^{budge} ~~budge~~. I knew him for two years before; he worked in two or three companies before he went to the United States Electric Light Co. I never worked for the Electric Light Co., but he was working for them at the time - at least he had their budge. Cross Examined. I wrote my name as John Smith in the Tombs Court because I did not want my name to be published. My name has not been Kaumann. I have not been convicted of stealing wire and have not been sent to the State prison for one year. I have never been in the penitentiary. I was waiting at the junk store for Supple to come along. I have not seen him since. I was waiting in Coney Island at several places during the summer. Previous to that I was engaged by Mr. Lake the Superintendent of Construction of the Bankers and Merchants Telegraph Co. I was working at the American Rapid Co. in this city for six months. I left because they reduced the wages from three and a half dollars to two dollars. I did not know where Supple

was going with the wire; he did not tell me it was a junk shop. I did not go into the shop and did not try to sell it. James Lockwood sworn and examined testified substantially the same as Nolan. He said that he worked at telegraphing and was employed by Supple to take down the wire; that Supple had a badge on him. I did not see the wire put on the truck. I did not see anything of it after I rolled it off the roof. I went home and was surprised when I was arrested.

George W. Betts was recalled and said he did not know that there was a man of the name of Supple employed by the Company. There might have been, for he did not know the names of all the employees.

John G. White sworn. I am Superintendent of the United States Illuminating Co. The wire I heard spoken of here was worth 30 cents a pound. I know what it cost. Charles H. Corbet sworn. I was in the employ of the ^{N.E.} Electric Light Co. in Oct. I know the kind of wire described by the witness; it is worth from 30 to 35 cents a pound. It is insulated copper wire manufactured by the Furman Co.

John S. Cunningham sworn. I am

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in the telegraph and electric light business
I have known Lockwood twelve years
and his reputation for honesty is good.

The jury rendered a verdict of
guilty of petty larceny.

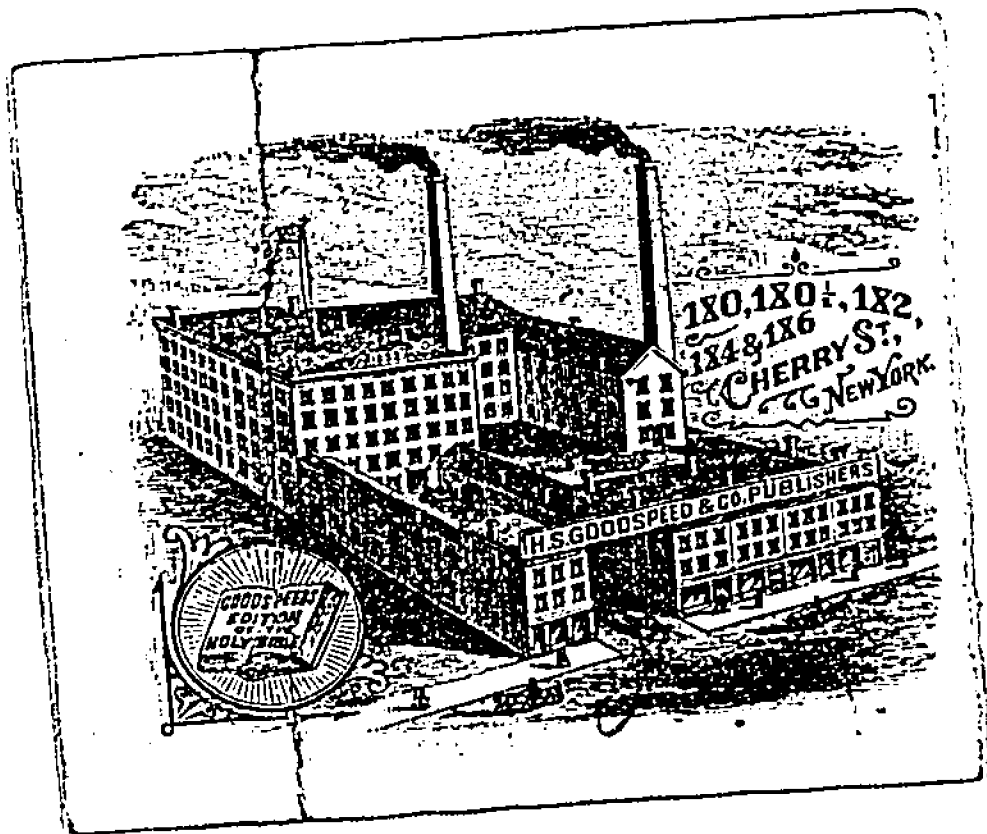
