That "Delicate" Delicacy

The *Tribune*, which has recently developed an astounding amount of information and zeal relative to the stamping out of lottery policy swindling in New York, yesterday gave some ancient history about a man who is well known to New Yorkers. The facts given have been frequently published in *Truth*, and the article reads like one which had been hammered out of our old files. One difference between us and our contemporary is, however, that we gave the name and it does not. It is truly remarkable that the *Tribune* should be so delicate and deal so gently with the name of one of the worst villains who ever disgraced or preyed upon society. It is less discreet in the use of men's names.

The article, which is referred to, relates that a man well known among lottery dealers before he went to Europe recently arranged to have the drawings of the Kentucky Lottery accurately transmitted to the headquarters of the policy shops, and then the slips were to be printed by the Vesey street house that was cleaned out by Pinkerton's men a short time ago.

This is somewhat erroneous. The "man well known among lottery dealers" made no such arrangements. It was impossible for him to do so, simply because the Kentucky Lottery has had no drawings for more than a year. Its "drawings" were conducted at its New York headquarters by men well skilled in the selection of losing numbers. What the mysterious man referred to by the *Tribune* did agree to was not to expose the policy offices to the authorities on conditions mentioned by the *Tribune*, as follows: "This man, who is traveling in Europe, was to receive fifty cents a week from each policy dealer. As there were over 600 of these dealers, this was dependent upon the common headquarters for the slips of their drawings; an income of \$300 a week was thus promised him, which has now been entirely cut off."

In other words, this man, to whom the *Tribune* alludes so gingerly, blackmailed the policy ring to the tune of \$300 a week, a fact which *Truth* has repeatedly published.

But we have never published one fact about this man, which the *Tribune* announces, because in the interest of public justice we did not deem it desirable that he should be put in possession of the information. The *Tribune*, however, differs from us, and as we know the statement to be true, we give it in the *Tribune's* language. It says:

"There is a warrant now for his arrest in the District Attorney's office. This was issued after he went to Europe. It has been reported that he is expected to return to this city about October 1. If he does, his reception will probably surprise him."

But why, we ask again, does the *Tribune* deal so gently with this man, who is no other than the notorious blackmailer, Marcus Cicero Stanley?

Perhaps the mystery will be revealed within the next thirty days.

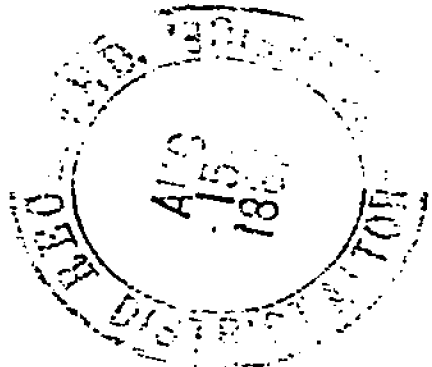

per writing a & or lottery policy at No. 66 Chatham St. at a place kept by one Brennan, where deponent made a bet upon the following drawn numbers in said lotteries: 6-7-55-70 and 2-12-19-58, and 11-13-28-34, for twenty-five cents each. And 7-55-70, and 12-19-58, and 11-13-28, for twenty-five cents each, which said lottery policy is hereto annexed.

Deponent further says that on said day he purchased at No. 366 W. 26th St. at a policy shop, kept, as ~~he is~~ informed and believes by John E. Simmons, the annexed lottery policy upon the drawings of said lotteries containing the numbers, 18-28-32-54 and 9-17-40-67, for which deponent paid the sum of fifty cents. Deponent further says that for several weeks he has been engaged upon an investigation of the illegal lottery and policy business in the city of New York, which investigation was instituted by the District Attorney of the city and county of New York, and deponent has ascertained, and will be able to substantiate and prove the following facts:

That, there are a large number of places in said city to the number of between four hundred and five hundred, where the illegal business of lottery and policy selling is carried on.

That these policy shops so called belong to different persons called mid-

dlemen, some of whom own many and others few. These middlemen receive the money taken in at their respective policy shops, and each and all of them report their business to a general manager of the policy business who receives from them a certain percentage of the net profits.

That the general headquarters of the lottery policy business of the city of New York is at No. 263 Bowery in said city, to which place is daily brought by runners the records of the sale of lottery policies from ~~all~~ most, if not all, the policy shops in the city.

Deponent charges that the general manager in control of said office is one David Bernstein.

or about the 28th day of July last past, this deponent, followed the said Thomas Sully from said headquarters in the Bowery to the said printing office of the said John Simon and after a short interval of time saw about twenty-five (25) small boys, who had collected at said printing office for the purpose of receiving the said little prints, and distributing the same among the dealers of lottery policies, come rushing out of the said printing office in great haste, and running as fast as they could in all directions. That deponents saw in the hands of some of these boys the printed slips of the drawings of said lotteries.

Deponent therefore charges that on the said 28th day of July the said John Simon did then and there publish by printing an account of the drawings of an illegal lottery, and for the premises aforesaid: and the deponent has reason to believe that the said John Simon has in his possession at No. 21 West Houston St in said city a quantity of types, forms, galleys, lottery tickets, printed slips, little prints, account books and other papers and



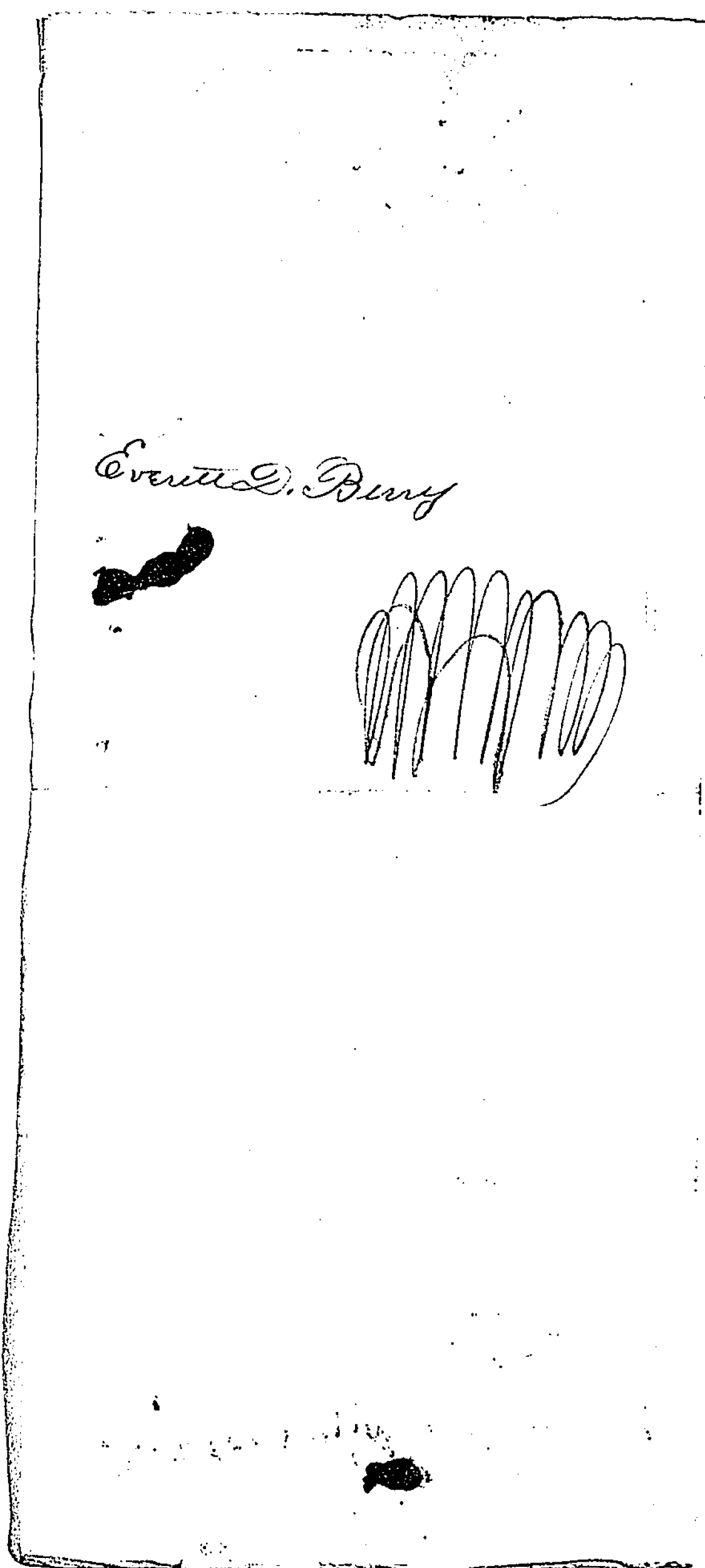
