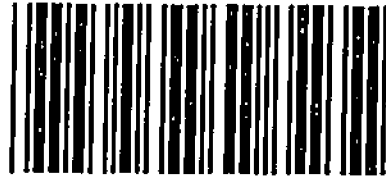

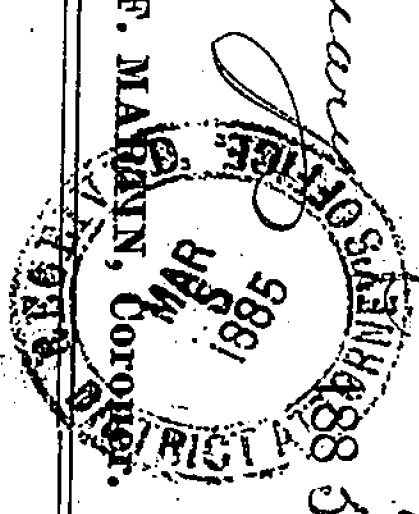

William L. Finkler, M.D. being sworn
says: From examination of body and
evidence I am of the opinion that
Edward S. Gould died from a double
Compound Communicated fracture of
the skull. As the witness

I afterward went to the hospital
and learned from the house surgeon
that the deceased had received Com-
pound Communicated fracture of
the skull, the nose and right side
of the face. He was afterwards
taken to his home at No 273 Mackin
Avenue. He never regained consciousness
~~and died~~ ^{up to the time of his death} on the
following Sat. Feb 21. At the time
of the accident there was another
Jenny team on the wagon with
the ~~prisoner~~ ^{prisoner}. Broadway was almost
clear of trucks at that point. The
prisoner did not ~~seem~~ ^{appear} to have seen
the deceased before the accident
occurred. There might have been
an opportunity for Mr Gould to
escape the accident. If there had

been a Good Crowd there, the horse
was going to fast ~~at the~~ to avoid
an accident. ~~Does~~ There was no
other wagon that would have
forced the deceased to cross the

intoxicated, and he did not appear to realize that ~~he had~~ the accident occurred. The driver did not appear to check his horse, which he might have done and so, avoid the accident. ~~The driver~~ He did not attempt to stop the horse even after the accident had taken place. My duty is to protect people in crossing Broadway. I do not think that the driver saw me when I first beckoned for him to stop. I hardly think the driver is competent driver a horse through the streets. I did not know the deceased was deaf. If the driver's hands were cold, he in my judgement could not contrall the horse. I think he could not have avoided the accident, if he tried. The driver was clad as he is now and the day was a very cold one, and the injuries occurred about 9.50 A.M. When the horse came in contact with the deceased he attempted to turn off at an angle.





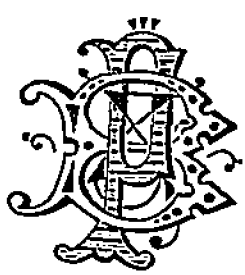
