late of the City of New York, in the County of New York, aforesaid, on the *fourth* day of *January* in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty *four*, with force of arms, at the City and County aforesaid, in and upon the body of *Andrew Wilson* in the peace of the said people then and there being, feloniously did make an assault and *in* the said *Andrew Wilson* with a certain *knife* which the said *Dennis O'Brien*

in *his* right hand then and there had and held, the same being a deadly and dangerous weapon, wilfully and feloniously did beat, strike, stab, cut and wound with intent *in* the said *Andrew Wilson* then and there feloniously and wilfully to kill, against the form of the Statute in such case made and provided, and against the peace of the People of the State of New York and their dignity.

SECOND COUNT:

And the Grand Jury aforesaid, by this indictment, further accuse the said

of the CRIME OF *Assault in the Second Degree*, committed as follows:

The said *Dennis O'Brien*

afterwards, to wit, on the day and in the year aforesaid, at the City and County aforesaid, with force and arms, in and upon the body of the said *Andrew Wilson* then and there being, feloniously did, willfully and wrongfully, make an assault and *in* the said *Andrew Wilson* with a certain *knife* which the said

in *his* right hand then and there had and held, the same being an instrument likely to produce grievous bodily harm, feloniously did, willfully and wrongfully then and there beat, strike, stab, cut and wound

Redmond Mc'Mannus, being duly sworn, deposes and says: That he is one of the Keepers of the Penitentiary of the City of New-York; that among the prisoners in said Penitentiary is one Dennis O'Brien; that on the morning of the 4' day of June, 1884, while said prisoners were at breakfast the said O'Brien was talking to one of the other prisoners, which is against the rules of the prison, and using blasphemous language, and deponent found it necessary to reprove the said O'Brien, which he did; that it afterwards became necessary for deponent to again reprove the said O'Brien, and after deponent had spoken to him and was walking away the said O'Brien threw a pan of coffee at deponent which struck him on the head; that deponent then turned and was struck a violent blow on the temple by the said O'Brien.

Deponent further says that every kindness and indulgence has been extended by the Warden and the other officers of the said prison to the said O'Brien, hoping that by such kindly treatment of him he would be a better man when he got out of prison, but that the said O'Brien has taken advantage of the kind treatment shown him; and that he could not have done a much worse act that he did in striking deponent as he did, inasmuch as the assault was committed in the presence of five or six hundred of the prisoners confined in said prison.



Andrew Wilson, being duly sworn, deposes and says: That he is one of the keepers of the Penitentiary of the City of New-York; that on the night of the 4th of January, 1884, there was confined in one of the dark cells of said Penitentiary one Dennis O'Brien, who, about seven o'clock of said night, informed deponent that if he, deponent, did not give him water he would keep all the prisoners awake during the night; that deponent refusing to comply with said O'Brien's request, it being against the rules, he, the said O'Brien, commenced to make good his threat, and that for about one hour he kept up such a shouting, halloaing and drumming on his cell door that he caused a general uproar in the prison; that deponent repeatedly warned him to keep quiet, which said warning said O'Brien refused to heed; that at about eight o'clock deponent, accompanied by Keeper Thomas Sullivan, who carried a lantern, entered the cell of said O'Brien for the purpose of taking from him the stick with which he was beating on the door; that when deponent entered said cell he was assaulted by said O'Brien with said stick, which deponent succeeded in getting away from him; that then said O'Brien assaulted deponent with a knife which he had concealed on his person, and made several blows at deponent and cut his coat in three places; that deponent and the said Sullivan had a desperate struggle with the said O'Brien before they succeeded in getting the knife away from him, and deponent believes that if it was not for the assistance rendered him by the said Sullivan he would have been killed by the said O'Brien with the said Knife.

Deponent further says that the said O'Brien was imprisoned for the term of one year ~~for beating his mother~~, and that his term of imprisonment expires on the 8th or 9th day of this month.
