Court of General Sessions. Part I
 Before Judge Cowing.
 September 27th 1887.

Timothy Kelly sworn and examined.
 I live 215 East Forty Fourth St. I drive a team. I remember the 24th of July last. I was in Forty Second St. that day. I saw the two defendants about half past twelve o'clock at night and James Kelly - the three were together (Kelly pleaded guilty) I was near the Central Depot and these three men were standing together; they seemed not to let me pass when I came up to them. Kelly got a hold of me and we wrestled for a while on the sidewalk, and the next thing I found I was on the sidewalk myself. I had two pocket books, one containing 75 cents and another one thirty five dollars. Kelly wrestled with me on the sidewalk and these two defendants run away. The next thing I found was my money gone and my vest open. The defendants run away for the east side and Kelly for the west side. I followed Kelly and kept close to him. I halloed. I was robbed and officer Hiemen

arrested Kelly. These defendants when I first met them shov^{ed} me. I was going from the west to the east side. To the best of my opinion it was between twelve and half past twelve o'clock. There were no other persons around at the time that I saw. Kelly was the first got hold of me; they remained five or ten minutes while Kelly held me, but he did not hold me all the time; first one shov^{ed} me and then the other and then I fell down. They then ran away. I had hold of Kelly when I fell. The defendants said nothing to Kelly that I know of when they ran away; they were arrested the next morning. I saw them and identified them as the men who were jostling me from one to the other. McCabe and Gorey did not say anything to me at the time I was jostled. Kelly did not say anything to me when he was taking the money out of my pockets. The men were as close to me as they could stand when I arrived on the scene. Cross examined. I got the pocket book containing the \$35. Officer Cook got it on James Kelly or else he saw him throwing it away. I cannot tell which. The pocket book was taken from me after I was knocked down. It was not so very

dark where I was robbed. I was not perfectly sober and I was not drunk. I called for no help while they were shoving me. I thought I would make my way home and go about my business. This happened between Madison and Fourth Aves., to the best of my opinion, in this city. I am not sure whether anybody passed, I was not watching the people I know. There are trains coming in at that hour for I am around there this last thirteen years. I called for assistance as soon as my money was gone. I saw the defendants the next morning in Fifty Seventh St. Court and I made a complaint then. I am positive the defendants are the men who were with James Kelly when I was robbed. I cannot write nor can I read writing. I had no watch with me when this occurred, but to the best of my opinion it was between twelve and half past twelve. John I buff swear I am an officer of the Twenty Third Precinct. Officers Helms and Moran arrested the prisoners. When I came to the station house that morning there was a ticket for a watch found on McCabe. I had the two prisoners McCabe and Grey remanded back to the station house.

0725

Peter Helmus sworn. I am an officer of the Twenty Third Precinct and arrested the defendants on the morning of the 25th with officer Moran. I drove them off Third ave. up through Forty Fourth St. into an alley; they jumped a fence, officer Moran came to assist me and I got them on the top floor of a house in Forty Fifth St; This was between three and a quarter past three o'clock in the morning. These two defendants were standing before a man who was sitting on the stoop of a house where he boards. I did not see these men rob Timothy Kelly. The prisoners saw me and they ran. I searched them and found a train ticket for a gold watch and a pocket book containing five dollars and a collar button. I don't know whether the pocket book belonged to Grey or not. I took them to the 57th St. station house and they were locked up till morning. I took them to Court on the 26th and officer Cuff was there. I don't know whether Timothy Kelly the complainant was there. The pocket book and money was returned to Grey. I was in Court on the 27th when Timothy Kelly, the complainant was there and when officer Cuff was present.

0726

John Kiernan sworn. I am an officer of the 19th precinct; my post on the 24th of July was on Forty Second St. from Madison to ~~Fourth~~ Avenue and Forty First St. from Madison to Fifth Avenue from 12 at night till 6 o'clock in the morning. I saw Timothy Kelly on the early morning of the 25th at Forty First St. I saw James Kelly running away from the complainant Timothy Kelly and he following him; two other men I saw running, but I could not recognize them. I caught Kelly in the middle of the block in Forty First St. between Madison and Fifth Ave. As soon as I got hold of him he threw a pocket book in the gutter behind his back. I picked it up; Timothy Kelly saw the pocket book afterwards; he said it belonged to him. I asked Kelly what he threw it away for and he said nothing. ~~As~~ This is in the 19th ward.

The case for the Defence
William Fuller sworn. I keep a liquor saloon at 2217 Second Ave. I never saw McCabe and Gorey before that evening; they came into my saloon accompanied by Mr. Sharkey. There were three men in the saloon and myself also, David Kenny, Michael Kellagher and ~~John~~ ^{Simon} Canary. Canary is an electrotyper and finisher. Kenny is a stone setter. I suppose I have been in

Count five or six times in this case and the people who were there that night. It was about half past nine when Sharkey and the defendants came into the saloon; it was a Sunday night in July, I believe it was on the 24th. Officer Cuff came to my place in connection with this complaint of Mr. Kelly either Monday or Tuesday following; he asked me if I knew McCabe and Gorey. I told him I did not only through a friend of mine, Mr. Sharkey; that we were in there organizing a chowder club in my back room when these defendants came in accompanied by Mr. Sharkey. He asked me if I knew the character of the men and I told him I did not. I told Mr. Cuff these defendants were in my place from between nine and ten and they left at about two o'clock in the morning when I was going to bed. Cross Examined. I have been keeping the saloon one year; these men were not in the saloon this Sunday night, but in my back roomⁱⁿ which I sleep. I know Mr. Sharkey for four or five years. I sold them no beer, but they drank it at my expense. I am positive it was a few minutes after nine when they came in. The defendants took no part in organizing the chowder club.

They left between two and three o'clock in the morning and I went to bed. I don't know where McCabe lives, I have not seen him around 113th St.; he might have been in my saloon before, but not to my knowledge. I don't know where Gorey lives and I don't know his business. We organized the chowder club, but these men were not included in it. I was convicted once of assaulting a policeman in 1891 and got one year in the penitentiary. I got convicted innocently. I was arrested no other time.

Thomas Sharkey sworn. I have been a gas inspector between six and seven years. I know the last witness, Mr. Fuller and I know Kenny and Canary. Mr. Fuller keeps a saloon on the south west corner of 114th St. and Second Ave. I was in the saloon on a Sunday evening this, the 24th of July and I saw McCabe and Gorey and Kenny, Kelaker and Canary there; we went in together. I and these witnesses have been in Court on several occasions. I went in between nine and ten o'clock and we all left the saloon together about half past one; we sat in the rear room of the saloon; the party was organizing a chowder club under the name of the William Fuller Association. I believe the

defendants came there with the intention of
 joining the club, but I do not know whether
 they did or not. Cross Examined. McCabe
 entered into the talk about the chowder club
 I spoke to McCabe about it before we went
 and he said he would like to go up. Fuller
 said it was time to go home, that he had
 to be up early at business. I was convicted
 about eight years ago of assaulting a
 man with a cane and I got six months
 in the penitentiary. I was not convicted
 after that. I visit Fuller's place quite often;
 he is a friend of mine. I have seen Mc-
 Cabe there before; he lives in Harlem. I don't
 know Gory or James Kelly.
 James Kelly sworn. I pleaded guilty to
 robbing Timothy Kelly. McCabe and Gory
 were not with me that night, but two boys
 named James Mulvaney and Robert
 Warham were with me. They lived at 314 East
 35th St. These defendants told me they were
 arrested for the same thing I was and they
 told me to tell who the other two were.
 Timothy Kelly recalled. I have known
 Gory for four or five years and I
 have known the other by sight for six months.
 The jury rendered a verdict of
 guilty of robbery in the first degree.

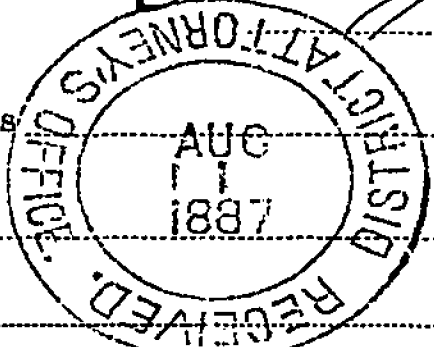

Vincenzo Solomino sworn. I live No 87
 Mulberry St. and do laboring work with my
 father. On the 14th of July I recollect getting into
 a ~~horse car~~ truck in Fulton St. and I had ten dol-
 lars, my week's wages in a woollen shirt. I
 worked on a railroad laying tracks in Fulton
 St. I saw the defendant. I was paid in Fulton
 St. where I worked. I tried to get on a truck;
 all at once I felt that somebody held me
 from behind. I thought it was my father.
 I looked around and saw it was the def-
 endant. I felt his hand near my pocket.
 I noticed my money was gone. I said, "Give
 me my money." He said, "Go on, I have not
 got your money." Then my father came
 up and called a policeman. In about a
 quarter of an hour after I missed my mon-
 ey the prisoner was arrested. He came me
 getting paid the money. Cross Examined.
 I am fourteen years old. There is no hole
 in my vest pocket and it is not torn.
 I worked in the night time. My father is
 here. I had my money stolen from me
 about two or three minutes after I got it.

Raphael Solomino sworn. I am foreman of laborers who work on a Railroad; the last witness worked for me; on the 14th of July I paid him ten dollars - Mr. Gregg paid the money but I was present and saw him paid. I saw the boy right after he lost the money; he came crying to his father. I saw the prisoner down there when the money was paid. I saw him for several days there but I don't know if he was working there. Cross Examined. I am boss of Italian laborers; they are paid \$1.50 a day, but this boy worked in the night time also and Sundays and he made ten dollars in one week. There were plenty of people around when these laborers were paid.

Dominico Solomino sworn. I live in 62 Mulberry St.; the complainant is my son. I know he had ten dollars on this day in question; he came to me crying and in the presence of the defendant he told me in Italian that he took his money; he said in English to the prisoner, "give me my money." He said, "Go on," and he showed fight; he said, "you son of a b---h," and he tried to run away. I went and called a policeman and the policeman arrested him.

0745

George W. Godson sworn. I made the arrest on the 14th of July. At the corner of Gold and Fulton sts; a gentleman told me there was a boy on the other corner lost ten dollars. I was about to go over when the prisoner came over with the little boy (the complainant) and a lot of laborers; the prisoner told me the boy accused him of taking ten dollars. the boy said it was this fellow (the defendant) and I took him down to the House Cross Examined. The little boy had a vest on; he did not show me the pocket that he alleged the money was taken from. I did not notice if there were holes in the pocket. I searched the defendant at the station house, but did not find the ten dollars. Patrick McDonald, sworn and examined in his own behalf, testified. I heard the testimony of the boy; it is not true that I took ten dollars from him. I never saw the boy before in my life. I was standing by an express wagon and this boy came along saying something. I did not understand. A crowd gathered around. I thought the best thing was to get a police man. I walked up Fulton st. and walked over and told him the case. I don't know who took this boys money. I was

not standing for two or three days around
Burling slip! and was not around there
when the boy was paid ten dollars. Cross
Examined. Live at 31 Munroe St. with
my wife; she is not in Court. I have been
married four months; it is about three
months since I have been at sea; the last
ship I sailed on was the Morgan City; she
runs to New Orleans. I was an able sea-
man. For three months I have been labor-
ing in a tire shop and on the docks. Before
I was married I lived with my mother
214 Cherry St; she is nothere. I sailed
out there for Valparaiso, South America
in one of Mr. Grace's vessels. On this day
in question I was coming from the Battery
Path. I was arrested once when nine
years old for swimming. I have been in
the Trumb twenty two days on this charge.
My father is dead; my mother lives at 214 Cherry
Bridget McDonald sworn. I live 214
Cherry St; the defendant is my son
and has always been a good boy; he
had been two years at sea, and then
afterwards began to sail to New Orleans.
I heard he was married two or three
weeks ago. The jury rendered a verdict of

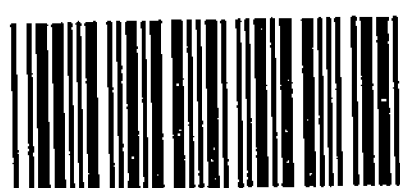

Francis Gorman sworn. I live at 456 Eleventh Avenue; there is a liquor store underneath belonging to Mr. Campbell. I am the bar tender. I locked the place up in the night of the 31st of July about 8 or 8 1/2 o'clock in the evening and left everything secure. There was whiskey and liquors worth one hundred dollars in the store. I was awakened by the boarding house in the morning; when I came down the officer had the prisoner at the station house. I noticed that the glass over the fan light was broken. I did not miss any property. I had no conversation with the defendant at all.

Rose Doherty sworn. I reside at 456 Eleventh Avenue two flights up. I recollect the 31st day of July I saw Sherlin and McGovern that day. I had gone to bed; there was a noise across the street, a man and his wife commenced to fight. I went to the window and looked and McGovern and Harry Sherlin came down thirty ~~seventh~~ St. from South towards Eleventh Avenue and tried the side door of the

0777

liquor store, Mr. Campbell, and while I stood there I did not speak to them; they passed on and then they went back again towards the store. McGovern had something in his hand and he tried to pry open the side door of this liquor store, and "Darry" (the defendant) was with him, right along side of him, two or three feet from the door. I spoke out of the window, "McGovern and Sherlin, I am watching you, I want you to go away, it is closed up for the night, you have no business there. This was a little after twelve or one o'clock, I could not say which, I was in bed at the time, Sunday night or Monday morning. "Darry" answered me and went up the street again, and while they were gone I laid down on the sofa, and a few minutes after that the train came along and made a noise, and the next thing I heard was the breaking of a pane of glass. I jumped up and I saw McGovern standing on the iron railing, and "Darry", the prisoner was alongside of him. He jumped down off the iron railing at the door. I said, "Remember, I am watching you; in the morning I will go up to the station house and get a warrant and have you arrested; you have

0778

no business here this hour of the night. Danny and McGovern, I said, I want you to go away from that door, you have no business there, the store is closed for the night. McGovern said, "That is it your business?" I said, "I wish to goodness I had a revolver and I would shoot both of you." Danny said, "Go down to Jack Keeley and get the loan of his seven popper." I says, "Never mind about the popper, you would wish you had been in bed yourself." I saw a man across the street, he had no hat or shoes on, he made believe he was drunk and he got the two prisoners. It was Officer Fitzgerald, I did not know at the time it was him. Cross Examined. It was between twelve and half past three o'clock when I saw the defendants, I was awake out of my sleep. I did not go to the police Court in the morning. I came down to go before the grand jury, but I was not asked any questions. I called the bar keeper that morning and told him what I had seen. I called the defendants both by name because I knew them. I saw McGovern right near the window in thirty seventh St. and Danny stood on the corner of Eleventh Avenue; the officer came over and arrested them.

Maurice Fitzgerald sworn. I am an
 officer of the Twentieth Precinct. I know the
 premises 456 Eleventh Avenue; they are in
 the 20th ward. I recollect the 31st day of July. I
 arrested this defendant and Edward McGovern
 on the corner of Thirty Seventh St. and 11th
 Avenue; it was 20 minutes past two o'clock
 when we got to the station house. When I
 first saw them it was one o'clock; they
 were both together. The defendant was in his
 bare feet and McGovern had shoes on;
 the first I noticed of them they came from
 the north east corner of Thirty seventh St.
 I saw McGovern try Mr. Campbell's liquor
 store. I heard Mr. Doherty say, "What are
 you doing boys to the door; if you don't
 go from there I will have you arrested
 in the morning and will have you sent
 on the Island six months." McGovern
 said, "Six months in the soup house." With
 that the boys went up towards Tenth Avenue
 and they came back again to the liquor
 store door. McGovern got up on the railing
 and I saw him break the fan light

I attend bar at the liquor store 456 Eleventh Avenue, on the 30th of July I left the store at eight o'clock at night securely locked up, there was in the store cigars and liquor which might be worth a thousand dollars, more or less; when I returned in the morning I found the glass broken in the fanlight and the door was pried open.

Cross Examined. I locked up Saturday night at midnight and went back again on Sunday and left on Sunday at eight o'clock and everything was right, I got there Monday morning between one and two o'clock, my boarding mistress woke me up and said somebody was breaking in the store, I went down stairs in the store and those two fellows were arrested at the time, I have been bartender four years.

Rose Doherty sworn. I live 456 Eleventh Avenue over the saloon, I recollect the 30th of July, Sunday evening between the hours of twelve and three before the defendant was arrested, I occupy the premises over the saloon two flights upstairs. Did you go to bed that night? Yes sir. What time were you awakened? I was awakened at twelve o'clock by a lady and gentleman opposite fighting. Did you look out of the window? Yes. What did you see? I was at the window and McGovern and

0784

Denny Shevlin they tried the door and locked in the window, they passed on, I did not speak to them at the time, they went away and McGovern came back and he had some kind of an instrument, I do not know what, in his hand, and he tried to pry the side door open, Denny was on the corner watching guard. I says, "McGovern and Shevlin, I am watching, go away from that door, you have no business there this hour of the night, the door is closed." They walked up the street and bye and bye they came back again in the meantime I heard the glass break and when I jumped up quick there was a train passed and McGovern was standing on the railing with his hand up, like that. I spoke to McGovern and said "go away from that door, remember I am watching and in the morning I am going to the Station House to get a warrant for both of you." I called their names distinctly three times; they walked away and came back again and Denny stood on the corner, I did not see McGovern, I said, "Denny I am watching you, where is McGovern?" He said, "under this window." McGovern and he walked out together; I said "you had better be in bed. McGovern said, "it is not your business." I said, "I will make it your business"; both of them acted as if they were under the influence of liquor. I saw a man coming across the street as I thought, he had no coat on and no hat and he staggered, maybe he was drunk, I saw him coming across and all of a sudden McGovern was speaking and the officer pounced on them, Officer Fitzgerald, he caught the two boys and said, "I am watching for you all night." I could not say what kind of an instrument I saw McGovern use, it looked to me like ~~the~~ a fork. I have

0785

known McGovern for the last five or six years.

Morris Fitzgerald sworn. I am a police officer and saw these men on the 30th of July from one o'clock until twenty minutes past two, I saw McGovern go up 37th Street towards Tenth Avenue and come back again in fifteen or twenty minutes and the last witness said to him, "go away from here or I will have you sent six months on the Island." He says, "six months in an eating house." After that they went up and crossed the street, I saw McGovern go to Gorman's door, he must have pried it with a jimmy, I saw the marks of a tool on the door. The other fellow was with him and after a train passed I heard glass breaking, I took my shoes and coat and hat off and came over and grabbed hold of the telegraph pole right along side the two boys. McGovern said to Mrs. Doherty, "it is a wonder people can't mind their own business"; I says, "I will mind mine and arrested him.

I would have let them go into the place if the woman had not interfered. McGovern said, we will wait now, and the other boy said, he had to take his shoes off to catch us.

Edward McGovern sworn and examined in his own behalf, testified: that he was born in 37th Street between 11th Avenue and the River and lived there all his lifetime and was never accused of any crime before, he worked for McCarty, the contractor up to Saturday night before he was arrested, Sunday he was taking care of the horses and about half past seven laid down on the stoop on account of its being warm and on the corner was a truck in which Shevlin was lying, I woke him up and told

him to go home; the officer came up and grabbed me and brought me to the Station House and I was beat unmercifully. I don't know anything about this window and had nothing in my hand, I never said a word to Mrs. Doherty, I have no occasion to steal for I work hard for my living.

James McGovern, the father, testified that his son was a hard-working boy and never was in any trouble.

James McGarty, a contractor, testified that he knew the prisoner five years and he worked for him off and on and never found anything dishonest in him.

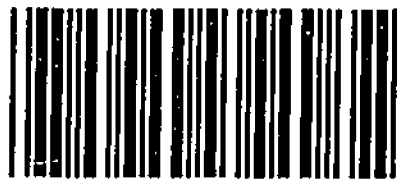

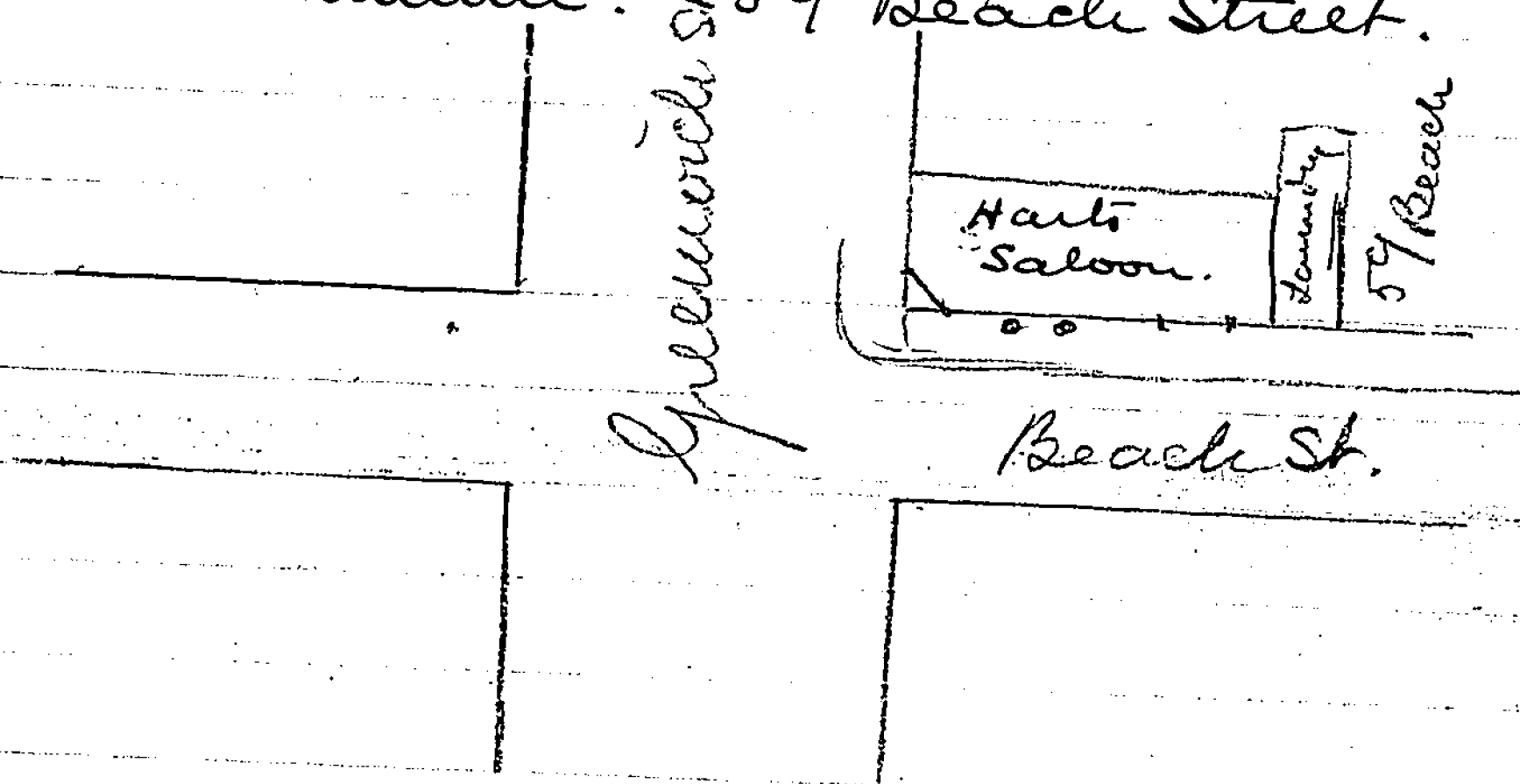
