

dealer of No. 198 Spring Street, New York City

being duly sworn, deposes and says, that on the 30th day of June 1883

at the deponent's residence No. 198 Spring Street City of New York,
in the County of New York, was feloniously taken, stolen and carried away from the possession

of deponent in the day time with intent to deprive of the use
and benefit of the property the true owner thereof the following property viz:

One bill or note good and lawful money
of the United States of the denomination and value of Twenty
Dollars, One bill or note of the value and denomination
of Ten Dollars and two bills or notes of the value
and denomination, each, of Five Dollars, in all
