Indictment for forgery in the third degree.
Richard S. Scott, sworn and examined, testified:
I am the paying teller of the Manhattan Co, doing
banking business at 40 Wall St. I recognize the
prisoner. I have seen the check now handed
to me before; the prisoner presented it to me for
payment. I did not pay it. The check looked sus-
picious to me and took my first impression
that it was not all right and sent him with
an officer down to Colgate Co and they pro-
nounced it a forgery. Colgate Co keep an account
with our bank. Cross Examined. When he pres-
ented the check did he say anything to you?
He did. What did he say? He asked me to give
him twenty dollar bills. You suspected something
was wrong and called an officer to go with him
to Colgate Co? I did. He did not offer resistance,
he went willingly? He did not. Richard M.
Colgate, sworn. I am one of the firm of Colgate
Co of this city. Does your firm keep an account
with the Manhattan Co? They do. Look at the
check which I show you and state whether that
is one of the genuine ~~checks~~ ^{blanks} of your firm's
checks upon that bank? Yes, it is one of our
blanks. State whether the signature of Colgate Co
or, indeed, the filling in of the check is in the

handwriting of that firm or anyone authorized by it? It is not; it is a forgery. Do you know the prisoner? I have not seen him before he was arrested. [Mr. Bell. That is the case.]

John J. Spies sworn. I am a dramatic agent connected with C. R. Gardner, 12 Union Square. I know the prisoner for six or seven months. The people with whom I am employed speak ^{very} well of him; his business is dramatic author and playwright. By Mr. Bell. You do not know of his having taken any part in any dramas of this kind before? No sir, never heard of it.

Clarence Gibson sworn. I am an actor by profession. I know the prisoner for over a year and know many people who know him; he is a perfectly honest and upright gentleman in every respect. I know nothing of this transaction. Elice Ryland sworn. I know the prisoner most all my life. I know a great many who know him. I never heard his reputation for honesty questioned. He is distantly connected with my family.

Berkley E. Paisley sworn. I am a journalist and dramatic writer. I have been connected with the London Daily Chronicle and Lloyd's Weekly Union. I have acted as foreign correspondent for them. I have lived in America about eighteen months. Have you ever been

arrested before charged with any offence whatever? Never in my life. I presented this check to the Manhattan bank. I received it from Mr. Morrison. Mr. Morrison I knew nearly twelve months ago. I had not seen him for some months until I met him the very day he gave me the check. Morrison owed me a little money. He asked me if I would take the check to the bank and get it cashed and he would pay me the money that he owed me. This was in Ann St.; and he said he would wait for me till I came out. I went into the bank suspecting nothing. I tendered the check, the bank teller took it and went away with it, and after I had been there two or three minutes the officer of the bank came round and arrested me. You went with the officer willingly? Perfectly. At the time you presented that check did you know it was a forgery? I had not the slightest knowledge. When I was arrested I was much surprised and I asked the officer immediately to take me ^{to the} place where I had left this man, but he would not listen to me; he prejudged me and he discredited the story, he would not take me there at all and insisted that he should take me down to the station house. Did you tell the officer who gave you the check? I told him, yes sir. I am not sure whether or not I gave him his name.

Cross Examined - I have been wrong for a living since I came to this country. I know very little of Morrison beyond I met him about twelve months ago. I don't know exactly where I met him, some place in the city in the neighborhood of the City Hall in a restaurant. I was writing a political article and he volunteered to give me information on matters which I was then collecting. I saw him three weeks after that, he came to my house on two occasions. The last time I saw him he told me he was going to Albany and asked me if I would lend him twenty dollars. I had the money and I loaned it to him. I met him near the City Hall when he gave me the check, I think it was near Nassau St. near the Tribune building in the street. I asked him for the money that he owed me. He says, "I can pay you." I went through some streets with him that I am not familiar with. We went into a saloon in Ann St; he asked me if I would go round and get it cashed. I said to him, "Is this right?" He said, "yes," he told me where the bank was in Wall St; he said he would wait for me. I did not think it strange that a man should give me a check for \$375 in a saloon and tell me to go to the bank with it. I did not know what Morrison's business was or where he lived. The jury rendered a verdict of guilty with a recommendation to mercy. Penitentiary eighteen months.
