Defendant further says, that in aid and for aiding and assisting in the contriving, proposing and carrying on of said lottery, he the said Smith did keep, with another person, an office for the sale of tickets in said lottery, and under the name or address of J. Duff & Co., the said Smith and another person did receive mail matter ordering tickets and conduct the ~~sale~~ business of said lottery by means of circulars and letters received and sent through the mail, and did receive letters containing money ordering lottery tickets; and further, at and upon premises known as number 42 Nassau street did keep a room for the sale of lottery tickets and on the 22<sup>nd</sup> day of May 1890, he the said Smith did sell a certain ticket in said lottery; and further did by a circular

advertise or publish an account of said lottery,  
stating when and where the same is to be, or has been  
drawn, what the prizes therein were, and are, or  
some of them and the price of a ticket, share  
or interest therein, or where or how it or they could  
be obtained or had, which said circular  
<sup>marked exhibit A1</sup>  
is hereto annexed: And further did  
keep in said office 42 Nassau street, aforesaid,  
with himself and another divers  
<sup>bills annexed & marked exhibit</sup>  
Circulars, advertising said lottery as aforesaid  
all and singular in and for contriving, proposing  
carrying on or drawing, or assisting in the  
contriving, proposing, carrying on or drawing of  
said Louisiana State Lottery, against the  
form of the statutes of the State of New York  
in such case made and provided.

Defendant further says, that the said John  
Smith, and another did on the dates aforesaid,  
at 42 Nassau street, aforesaid, main-

**R**EMEMBER that ONE DOLLAR is the price of the smallest part or fraction of a ticket issued in any drawing. Anything in our name offered at a less price is either a counterfeit or a swindle. REMEMBER further, when experiencing to see if your ticket has drawn or not, never to accept anything but our official drawings which are copyrighted under the Act of Congress, and cannot be reproduced correctly under penalty of the Law.



# ROYAL HAVANA LOTTERY

## THE MANNER OF DRAWING IS AS FOLLOWS:

All the numbers are counted and put into a wheel or globe in presence of the authorities and the public at Havana, and the Prizes in another globe, both of which are locked with three different keys, kept by the three Treasurers of the case of the Havana Lottery.
