Conversation between Captain Connor, David H Lewis and Geo C Murray held at the 19th Precinct Station house Dec 14th 1892 4pm

Q What is your name and address?

A David H Lewis 127 West 25th Street

Q Did you see Matthew Johnson on Sunday night the 11th of December 1892?

A Yes. I was in Mr Murray's house when he (Johnson) came in. Mr Murray's house is 251 Seventh Avenue. He called me and said: "I want to speak to you a moment."

Q Did you speak to him?

A I spoke to him and asked what he wanted. He said he wanted me to go around to Sawyer's and ask Sawyer to send me his overcoat as the Detectives were after him.

Q Where does Sawyer live?

A Over Lynch's bar room 24th Street and 7th Ave.

Q Did you see Sawyer?

A I did not go. I called Murray out and told him what Johnson wanted me to do. Murray says, "Don't you have

anything to do with him. Go out in the street and come back and say you can't find anyone in his room.

Q What time did he come to your house?

A He came there between 5⁰⁰ to 6⁰⁰ pm

When Mr. Lewis called me and told me what Johnson said, I told Lewis to go

in the street and say he could not find anyone in the room. I then turned

back to Johnson and said: "Are the detectives after you?" He answered: "I hear so."

I asked him what he had been doing and he replied: "Nothing"

He then jumped up and left my house.

On the west wall here I found a smaller saw at which were blood streaks.

On Monday Dec 12th about 10 pm I went to Johnson room at the N.E. corner of Second Street and 24th St. and there found a black serge pair of pants and a brown striped pair of pants, also a pair of linen cuffs. The brown pants and cuffs were blood stained. I delivered the articles to Captain O'Connor at the Station House.

I stopped him. he said he got them at 120th St and 1st Ave; he couldn't tell what kind of a store. I took him back to John Messloh's grocery store. the case was marked in black crayon chalk J. Messloh. 118th St and 1st Ave. The clerk, Albert Jackson, went into the cellar and found such a case was missing. While in the store, Young said "well I suppose this is the case I will do three months for".


Jackson came with us to the Station House: a crowd followed us. I gave Jackson my billy. Young said to Jackson "you Dutch son - of - a - bitch if you could get at you I'd make a bum out of you. If you dont weaken on this case somebody will do you" He made this threat at least

three times on the way to the
Station House. Jackson
asked me to walk back
with him on account of the
threats.


