A I did not go. I called Murray out and told him what Johnson wanted me to do. Murray says: "Don't you have

On the 19th November at about 6 ⁴⁰/₁₀ P.M. I was coming through E 118th St towards 1st Ave. I met dependant Michael Young, about ~~150 feet~~ ^{150 feet} ~~away in the block~~ ^{between 1st and 2nd Avenues}, with a case of eggs on his shoulders. I stopped him. he said he got them at 120th St and 1st Ave; he couldn't tell what kind of a store. I took him back to John Messloh's grocery store. the case was marked in black crayon chalk J. Messloh. 118th St and 1st Ave. The clerk, Albert Jackson, went into the cellar and found such a case was missing. While in the store, Young said "well I suppose this is the case I will do three months for".

Jackson came with us to the Station House: a crowd followed us. I gave Jackson my billy. Young said to Jackson "you dutch son - of - a - bitch if you could get at you I'd make a bum out of you. If you dont weaken on this case somebody will do you" He made this threat at least

three times on the way to the
 station. Jackson
 asked me to walk back
 with him on account of the
 threats.
