Pauline Lathammer, daughter of deceased
living sworn says. I lived with my father
for a month previous to the shooting.
I had left my husband on Aug. 22. 87
because he threatened me and my children
with our lives with a table knife.

He was very jealous of me would
follow me to the hydrant or the store

He would act the same whether he
had been drinking or not. I lived

in 41st and with Mrs. Comer 429
W 41st St with my children. Then,

I went to my sister over in Jersey
he followed me. and wanted my
brother-in-law to put me out.

My brother-in-law told him to go away.
He came over there in Woodward &
Dearborn on August 25th ~~with a~~

~~pistol in his hand~~ : He wanted to go up
stairs my sister would not let him

He raised a disturbance and my
sister sent my niece 9 yrs old to
look for the police. He pulled a
pistol and ~~held it up at me~~ .

Said Oh Ford. Don't do any harm with
that. He said ~~I won't~~ I'll give it
to you if you don't report me

He then went into another room and put the pistol under some clothes that were being ironed. He then gave me a box with some bullets in it.

The police came in and he asked me to kiss the children and he would go right to New York. He was allowed to and went away. Soon he came running back at full speed and jumped over the yard fence. We shut the door. He said if you don't open the door ~~because~~ I'll kick it open. He then asked for the revolver. I refused to give it. ~~He~~. He said he would not hurt anybody with it. He only wanted to kill himself around the place where I was.

We sent for the police who came again. He jumped over the fence and ran down扶手 (stair) Aug 26th - I saw him again in 435 W 39th St. He was on the sidewalk and I was up stairs.

The 27th of Aug. he came and asked me to live with him. I refused.

On Sept 21st I was at the door of 435 W 39th St with the children. I met him coming down stairs.

for. Then Fred came and put the pistol to my head. I said, Oh! Fred I didn't do anything to you what do you want to shoot me for. Then he turned and saw his wife at the head of the stairs about to go down. He fired one shot at her then she ran down. Then Fred turned the pistol towards his own face. I then shut the door.

Then my father came out of the front bedroom into the kitchen the blood was pouring from his left cheek and from his right arm.

I helped him down stairs and two men helped him to the station house. I found my sister Mrs. Lachammar in the station house in 37 St - she had a look on her head and behind her ear on the left side.

She said I want to go to the store to get the breakfast you can get the water back yourself. He then said Oh! My god! What a life I've got! He then stood up by the table and looked at the clock saying Is this the right time?

My mother was coming upstairs as my sister his wife was going down he fired another shot which passed over their heads.

Then he stood by the hydrant with the pistol in both hands but no finger on the trigger and the muzzle pointed at himself. Then he ran upon Wolf and towards 10' Ave.





informed that an application has been made
for a pardon for Patrick H. Lynch convicted
of Murder in the Second Degree, I have
deemed it my duty to write you in
regard to the case, as I acted as Counsel
for Lynch upon his trial.

The defense was that the shooting
which caused the homicide was done in
self defense, and the evidence given by
the witnesses for the People showed that
the prisoner was attacked and chased
by the party who was killed and others
before the pistol was fired.

The District Attorney who tried the case,
offered before the trial to accept a plea of
guilty of Manslaughter in the third
degree, but the prisoner refused to plead,
claiming that he was innocent.

0196

There had been quite a number of cases of homicide just at the time of the trial of this case, to which fact the District Attorney called the attention of the Jury in his summing up, and I think the verdict of the Jury was influenced more by the verdict of the other homicides, than by the facts of the case before them.

Several of the jurymen met me a few days after the trial, and said that on reflection they felt they had made a mistake in convicting Lynch of any greater crime than Manslaughter, and I think that a careful examination of the testimony will show that the prisoner ought not to have been found guilty of any greater degree of crime than manslaughter in the third degree, if found guilty at all.

He was a machinist and employed by Inger & Co in N Jersey for 14 years - we lived in the neighborhood ever since my father came to this country - my father always got up at 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ or 5 am. He used to take his bitters in the morning. He stopped in Morrissey store if not open to Meyer & Dryers Delaney & Yonca Sts.

Nov 18. He got up as usual about 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ am, he took his time usually to dress himself. I fell asleep before he went out.

He usually took the cars at 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ AM.

About daylight a man named James Keck came and knocked at our door and said "John's Father is shot!" I got up and went to in front of 39 Lewis St where my father was lying unable to speak.

Mr Morrissey Keck and two ladies were there as also was the prisoner.

I had seen the prisoner before the shooting in his store while passing once four days before.

The store was new to me and attracted my attention. I had never been in his store.

Adam Wallers 39 Lewis St being sworn says. I keep the Baker Store on the Browne St side. I have been there since Nov 3 - I know the prisoner who moved in about the 5th or 6th of November.

On Nov 18. about 4:45 A.M. I got up ^{for the purpose} usually open about 5th A.M. I heard the bush of the store door tried. My wife got up looked. opened the door and said nobody is outside. I said I guess its the policeman. In about 5 minutes. I heard a pistol shot fired. I was partly dressed. The first shot was in the yard. I opened my store door Mr Lyons was on the step at the hall door. I asked what's the matter. He said ~~there are~~ was two men here just now who wanted to break in my windows. A big fellow and a little fellow. and he said to me hurry up and run through your store to the yard I did - The prisoner ran through the hallway. We searched the yard and could find nobody.

He said one fellow has jumped over his fence. pointing to the Browne St side.

He then ~~said~~ hurried up to the side - walk ~~they~~ must be in these halls some where. The prisoner was in his bare feet. I walked up two doors towards

Philip L. Danner M.D. being sworn says - On November 18- 1881 I made an autopsy on the body of Adolph Heyen at no 280 Delancey St and found a semi circular wound of the left side of the forehead. with the convex side towards the top of the head.

The upper or convex edge of this wound which was about an inch and a quarter in diameter was clean cut.

The lower edge was contused and in the center pulpified.

The bone beneath was uninjured. I also found a bullet wound in the back two inches and a half from the median line entering through the cavity of the chest between the 6th & 7th ribs its direction was upward and upwards after passing through both lobes of the left lung fractured the 2nd rib and made its exit between the 1st & 2nd rib about 3 inches from the median line and about an inch under the collar bone.

The left lung was collapsed and the thorax on that side filled with blood.

Findings otherwise normal.

Heart. Slight valvular insufficiency and thickening of valves of Aorta, ~~so~~ the Heart over anterior surface adherent to the pericardium, otherwise normal

Brain slight congestion of.

Liver fatty degeneration of

Adipose tissue

All other organs normal
