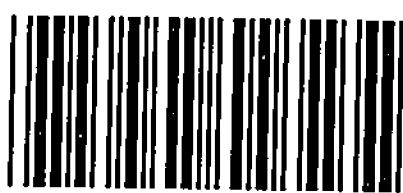

The Grand Jury of the City and County of New York, by this indictment, accuse

Elizabeth Dunnington

of the CRIME OF Manslaughter in the first degree committed as follows:

The said Elizabeth Dunnington

late of the City and County of New York, on the 20th day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, at the City and County aforesaid, with force and arms, in and upon one Desire S. Dornet, in the face of the People of the said State then and there being, then and there wilfully and feloniously did make an assault; and she the said Elizabeth Dunnington, with the said Desire S. Dornet, with a certain knife, which she the said Elizabeth Dunnington in her right hand then and there had and held, in and upon the back of him the said Desire S. Dornet, then and there wilfully and feloniously did strike, stab, cut and wound, giving unto him the said Desire S. Dornet, then and there, with the knife aforesaid, in and upon the back of him the said Desire S. Dornet, one mortal wound, of the breadth of one inch and of the depth of six inches, of which said mortal wound, he the said Desire S. Dornet, on the day and in the year aforesaid, at the City and County aforesaid, then and there did die.

And so the Grand Jury aforesaid, do say, that she the said Elizabeth Dunnington

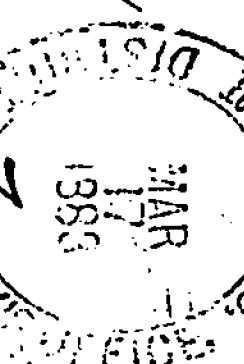

August Moine being sworn says: I live at 366 6<sup>th</sup> Av. I am a butcher. I knew the deceased Desore L. Howork. - I saw the deceased at 7.20 P.M. Feb'y 28 1880. - He came alone to 404 6<sup>th</sup> Av. There were three other friends there at the time. He did not drink anything just before he left. He asked Mr Bordell of 404 6<sup>th</sup> Av. for some one up stairs. Mr Bordell said on top floor up stairs. Deceased Howork went out back door. I & my two friends went out the front door. Not two minutes after Howork came out of the private door of 404 6<sup>th</sup> Av. and put his hand on shoulder of Mr Schultzer, grocer & fell on side walk. I then stooped down and asked him what was the matter. Howork ~~did not answer~~ <sup>did not answer</sup> nothing and I stooped over him and saw that he was covered with blood. He was dead by the time he fell. Howork was a sober man. I assisted in carrying deceased to the 29<sup>th</sup> Precinct Station House.

 & liquor merchant at above address  
 I knew deceased Desire L. Houvet.  
 Mr Desire Houvet came to my place





 live 49 W 27<sup>th</sup> St. I am a cook. I  
 was in Mr Brendell's Saloon 404 6<sup>th</sup>  
 av. at the Bar with Schultzer Morine  
 & Brendell. Hovorst came in at  
 about 7:15 P.M. 28<sup>th</sup> of July 1883. -  
 While talked at the bar with above

External Examination - Body well nourish-  
ed. incised wound of back about 2 inches  
to the left of spinous processes of vertebra  
between 8<sup>th</sup> & 9<sup>th</sup> ribs.

Internal Examination - Left pleural cavity  
full of fluid & coagulated blood. Left  
lung collapsed by blood in pleural cavity.
