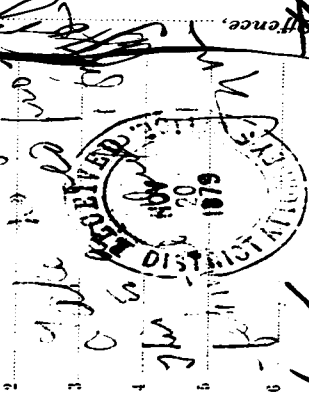

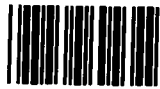

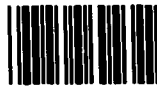

Crosby with *Charles Stewart* I go to
sea as a steward, I have been on

the Schr L. E. ^{Paine} ~~Paine~~ for three months that was the last vessel commanded by Capt Stilliard. I was paid off two or three days after I came in, it was Wednesday or Thursday, last month. I have been coasting since that. It was about a month since I received ^{forty odd} \$48.00 from Capt Stilliard, I bought clothes at Coat \$5. Vest 1.50. Pants \$3. Shirts \$2. Underclothing \$2. Boots \$4. Hat \$1.50. Neck Tie \$1.40. Cane 25¢. Pocketknife 40¢. I left the last vessel on the 20 of last month. I did not go to Dicks when I came in last because he put me out of his house. He keeps in Baxter Street. He put me out because I was not satisfied with the dinner I had. I was in the Tombs about a year or ago. I was complainant against the man for robbing me of my clothes and A & B. he struck me with a stick. the prisoner was discharged. I was not here before it, that is the only complaint I made before this. his name is Nicholas, the Judge said there were too many witnesses. He struck me and made me leave.

the table. I think I was in the West Indies last April. I never was in Jail. I had two persons arrested before these three on other charges. I got a Captain arrested for striking me at sea he was one of the two. I settled the case I got \$3.00 from it. I said that a coat and watch and chain was stolen from me while at Dicks. I was going down South Street about 9 o'clock AM when this affair happened. I went to Fulton Ferry in a car. I went on board a Schooner to get a situation. I don't know where she came from or where she was going to, I have shipped that way several times. I shipped on board the Schooner C. B. Pennell that way I signed the articles at a Shipping master I did not have any thing due ~~me~~ when I left the vessel. I got \$12.50 from the ^{Rev} Father Butler about two weeks ago this money was part of it. I did not buy anything after I got the \$12.50. I eat in Saloons sometime in Spring Street near Sullivan. I slept at Stewarts I did not pay anything I never gave any money to any one in that house I did not keep any account of what I spent. Some days I did not spend

any money. I saw my money on Friday last I saw it while on the car and afterward in a cigar store in South St. I paid for cigars in silver. I had one five dollar bill and eighty four cents in silver and copper coins -

I last saw my money about ten o'clock P. M. I went on board vessels and shipping offices during the day. I did not have any breakfast I got my dinner on board a ship. of the ~~clerk~~ Steward John Mc Brown. I had supper with him the night previous. I got my dinner about 10 o'clock I got 3 cigars for ten cents. I gave him one.

I had Soup and Beef for dinner Beef Soup and Roast Beef. when I left I told him I was going to try to get a chance to go to sea. I went to Charles Lomas Shipping Office. I then went on board a vessel I dont know the name of it. I dont know the name of any of the vessels I was on board that day.

My friend did not know how much money I had. I did not tell him I did not have any money. I went to Old Slip and South Street from Fulton Market I saw a Captain who told me to go to old slip and wait for

him. I went to Old Slip to wait for him, I left him between Wall Street and another Street. Old Slip is more than two blocks from Wall Street. The Captain told me that he was going to meet me at Old Slip. I did not see him there this affair looks place. I did not take my money out of my pocket. I felt it in my pocket. I was taking a cigar out of my outside coat pocket when I felt my purse. I did not have anything else than the money in the purse in the pocket which contained it. I had one of my hands in my pocket and the small cane in my other hand at the time I was assaulted. Hampton was the first to assault me he came and asked me why I was putting on so much airs. I said I was not putting on more airs than other people. That I did not live off of him but my own pocket. I was standing on the corner leaning against the building, there is a Beer Saloon in the building. He told me to shut up. He put his hand between my shirt collar and neck. I said let me go. He then bit me with his head. There were several

men these men and two or three others leaning against the house. There were about a hundred people standing about there, people passing along. I tried to strike him I found my arm held I was held there. I could not walk away, until after they beat me. I then ran to the next corner and told an Officer that I was beaten and robbed and asked him to go and get my hat. I had my coat on all the time I did not take it off at any time. I had my cane taken away. Hughes held my hand. I can't tell how many men were around me while they were beating me perhaps 30 or 40. I did not see either of the three men when I went for my hat. The Officer ~~did not go all the way~~ ^{went} with me and did not see my hat. He said that it was not my beat. I met Dickson yesterday opposite P. & E. R. and got him arrested. Hughes was with him. Dickson took my purse and money. I told the clerk that the money was taken from my pants pocket. I next saw Wampney in the Town Court where he was arrested. Hughes was arrested at the same place. I told the

Officer I was robbed. The second officer I met I told him Wampney was one of the men pointed him out to the officer he told me I had better go to the Jumbo and get a warrant. He said he would go with me and see what he could do. I told him I was robbed. He said he did not see it and I had better go to the Jumbo and get a warrant.

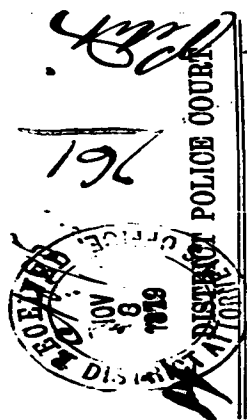
