Dear Sir:

Your letter of November 24th., to His Honor, The Mayor,  
has been referred to me.

You did not, as stated therein appear in this Bureau  
at one o'clock, September 19th., the date on which you were call-  
ed on our calendar. The Justices of the court in your absence  
adjourned your case to December 1st., notice of which you acknow-  
ledge.

There are to-day over two thousand new cases on our  
calendar, and at the rate the Justices are hearing the cases, those  
filing to-day will have to wait at least one year before they can  
be heard in open court. It is therefore imperative that the ad-  
journed cases be eliminated as much as possible.

In other courts had you not appeared when your name  
was called, your case would have been thrown out.

In Naturalization cases we have invariably given the  
Petitioner one more chance, which in your case will be December  
1st. It will be necessary for you to answer your name when call-  
ed in this Bureau at one o'clock.

If you find it impossible on that date to have your  
original witnesses, and if you so state to the court, we may give

you another adjournment or allow you to make substitution of witnesses, in which event you will then have to wait ninety days longer, as the Law requires that such witnesses be posted, the same as the original witnesses.

Naturalization cannot be obtained in any other manner than as prescribed by the Laws of June 29, 1906, which are in substance stated above.
