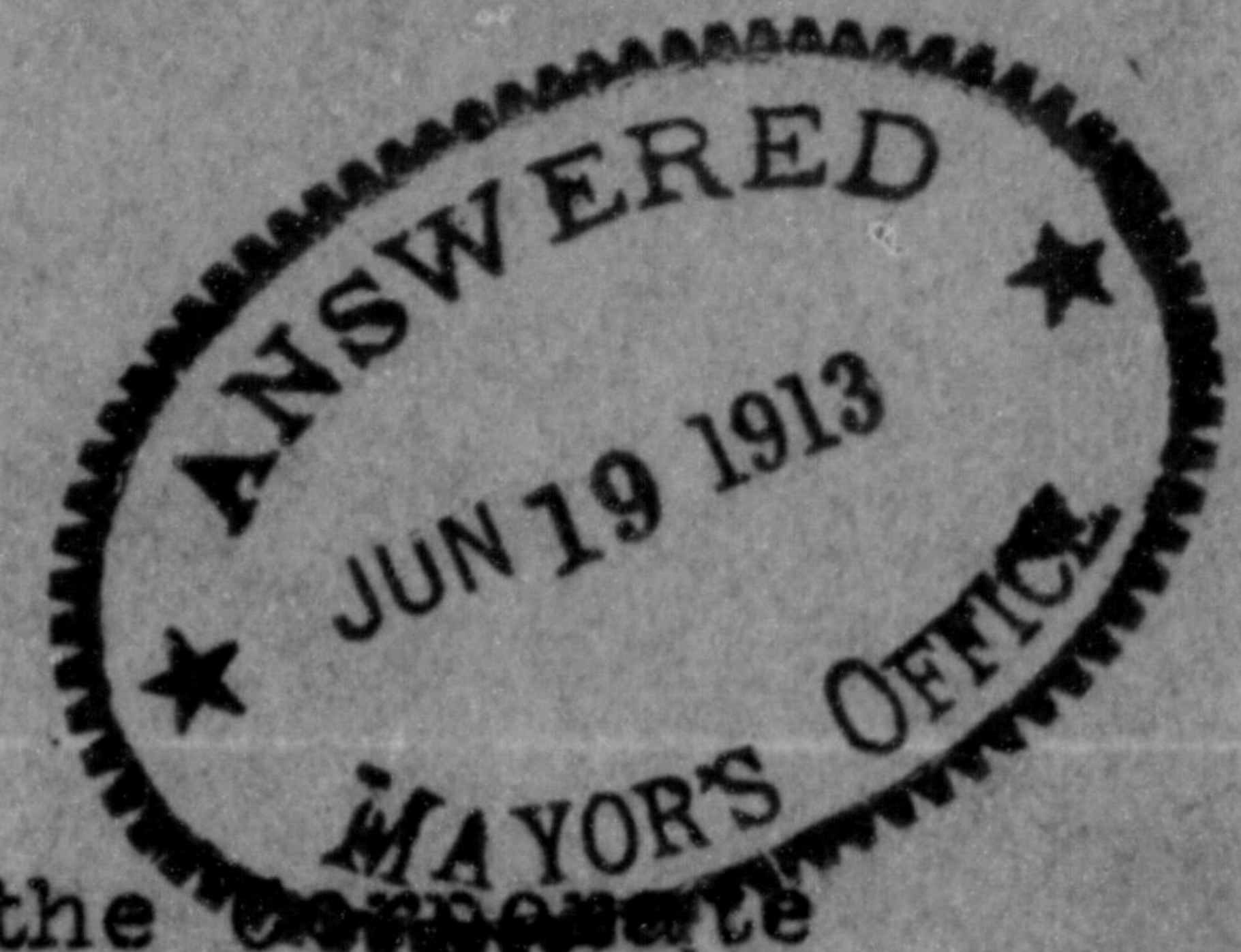

My dear Mayor Gaynor,



I have just learned that the Corporate Stock Budget Committee has recommended the denial of our request for \$6,500 for architect's fees, &c. A report favoring the appropriation of this sum was previously prepared by the Committee and the change has been made without a request for information or consultation with any representative of the Board of Inebriety.

It is impossible for us to proceed further without a topographical survey, or the advice of an engineer in regard to the water supply. The general arrangement and the location of the various groups of buildings have been decided upon so far as possible without drawings and estimates of the cost involved. These cannot be obtained without the services of an architect.

I therefore respectfully ask you to recommend that the report of the Committee be amended to provide an appropriation, or that it at least be withheld pending a conference between the Corporate Stock Budget Committee and the members of the Building Committee of this Board.
