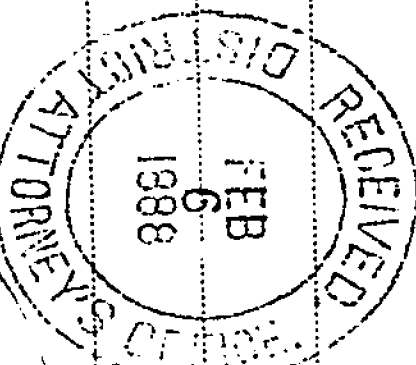

BRIEF FOR THE PEOPLE.

HISTORY OF THE CASE.

The prisoner, who is a longshoreman, 45 years old, residing at 84 Suffolk Street, is indicted for taking, receiving &c. a colored girl named Augusta Sampson, of 82 Suffolk Street, aged 14 years, on December 27, 1887, for the purpose of sexual intercourse. The girl resides with her foster father, and the prisoner has had connection with her on various occasions for about a year past, usually on Saturday in the afternoon, and she is now pregnant by him.

EVIDENCE FOR THE PEOPLE.

AUGUSTA SAMPSON. - Is 14 years of age and resides at 82 Suffolk Street. On December 27, 1887, prisoner came to the kitchen of their house, and after conversation with her and attempt to take liberties with her, she had connection with him. She had previously had connection with him for about a year and a half previous. At the time of this last connection, her foster father and mother were at church in Suffolk Street. This act of sexual intercourse took place in the kitchen. The family occupy four rooms, bedroom and kitchen on one side of the hall and sitting room and bedroom on the other. Witness never had sexual intercourse excepting with defendant, and first had connection with him a year

ago at 78 Suffolk Street, about 9 o'clock. Witness became pregnant on the 27th of August, 1887, by the prisoner. He had connection with her on that day, ~~and~~ on Saturday between afternoon and evening. That act took place in his own house. Witness remembers it because it was two days before her birthday. She was born on the 29th of August, 1873.

MARTHA TAYLOR. - Resides at 138 Chrystie Street. The last witness is her daughter. She was born August 29, 1873. Her husband's name is Louis Taylor; she has been married to him for six years; was married January 29, 1882. The child was baptized in Barrow Street Church Mission by the Rev. Dr. Veitch D.D., Augusta Anna Sampson. The child was born at the Colored Home, 65th Street; Dr. Cochrane attended her. The father of the child was Theodore Kerrikoff; he was a white man, and he abandoned her one week before the child was born, and she has not seen or heard of him since. Her maiden name was Miller.

See Certificate of the Board of Vital Statistics, annexed to the papers, which produce.

OFFICER JOHN CROOK. - Is an officer of the 12th Precinct Municipal Police. Had the defendant in charge, under arrest. When they were going up in the cars defendant told witness that he did have something to do with the girl, but that he was drunk and did not know what he was doing. Witness also heard conversation between Officer Young and defendant, and the officer asked defendant if he had had anything to do with the girl, and the defendant said Yes, about Christmas time, but that defendant was not the father of the child of which she was pregnant.

OFFICER YOUNG. - Is an officer of The New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, 100 East 23 Street. On January 27, 1888, witness came to court and saw the defendant Tyson. Told him he was in a terrible box, as the child was in the family way. Whereupon defendant replied, "I am not the father of the child. I only had to do with her Christmas week." He said about three weeks ago, Christmas week, - those were his words.

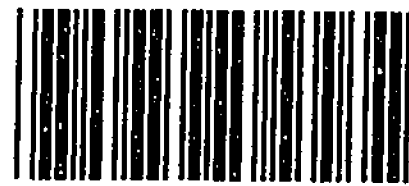

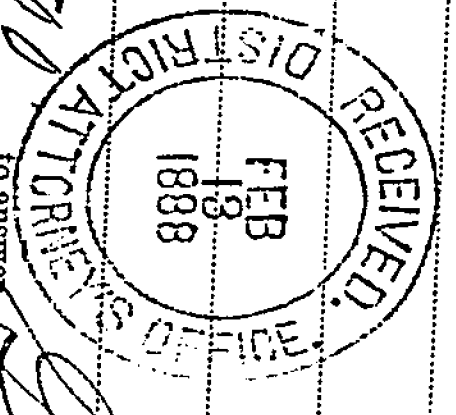
