At a meeting of the Civil Service Commissioners held March 30th, the following Resolutions were adopted:

RESOLVED: That this Board recommend to the Mayor that the first sentence of Regulation 46 be amended so as to read as follows: "No person on the eligible list shall be certified more than three times to the same appointing officer for the same Bureau or Institution except at his request, nor shall the name of any person remain on the eligible list for appointment or promotion more than one year from the date it is entered on such list."

RESOLVED: That this Board recommend to the Mayor that Regulation 8 be amended by striking out "60" at the end thereof, and substituting therefor, "70".

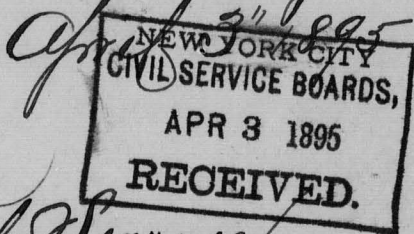

Dear Sir:

In view of the peculiar character of work which it is necessary for the Finance Department to do in connection with the examination and verification of accounts of charitable and other institutions, it is very essential that the person or persons selected for such work shall hold positions of a strictly confidential nature. The work which such persons will be called upon to perform will, to a large extent, be in the nature of detective work, and much of their time will be engaged in the visitation, examination and inspection of institutions, in the carrying on of secret yet necessary methods of inquiry and investigation. It will, therefore, be fully as essential that the Comptroller shall have the utmost confidence and trust in the person or persons he selects to do such work, as it is <sup>in</sup> the case of any other position of a confidential character in any Department of the City Government.

In view of the fact that it is desired by the Comptroller to make this branch of the work of the Department as efficacious as possible in the carrying out of the provisions of the Constitution of the State, and the rules of the State Board of Charities, and that in order to do so the work must be confidential, and secret

to a large degree, I would respectfully request that the Supervisory Board of the Municipal Civil Service will classify the position of "Examiner of Accounts of Institutions" as a strictly confidential one, to be filled by the Comptroller without a Civil Service examination of the appointee.

I would further respectfully state that the matter above referred to has been submitted to His Honor the Mayor, who is familiar with the character of the duties which would be required to be performed by such Examiner, and that his views on the subject are in entire accord with those above expressed by me.

Sir:--

I had the honor on the 25th instant, to address a letter to your honorable Board, asking that the position of Superintendent of Repairs of this Department be removed from the classified civil service list.

Understanding that it has not been deemed advisable to grant this request, I most earnestly urge that you waive your right of examination in the case of Major George O. Eaton, whom we desire to appoint to the above named position.

Our investigations thus far, have satisfied us that a most careful study and examination of the entire water front and dock system must be made. It is therefore, a matter of great importance that we should have a man as Superintendent of Repairs, equipped by training and experience to fulfil its duties; who possesses our entire confidence and at the same time would thoroughly appreciate our aims and efforts to correct the abuses which have crept into the Department.

While a competitive examination would beyond doubt, give us a man who possessed the requisite technical knowledge to fill the position, he might possibly fall far short of our requirements in these latter features.

Major Eaton has the technical and practical knowledge to fulfil the duties satisfactorily. He has had much experience in this direction; was brought up in early life to the trade of ship building and is a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. He is a veteran of the late war, of good standing and is essentially well qualified in all respects to worthily and successfully fill the position.

I trust therefore, your honorable Board, will waive the examination and enable us at the earliest possible moment to make the appointment.

### Appointment of Deputy Supervisor McMillan Questioned.

### Unlucky Contestants Charge Fraud and Collusion.

### The Civil Service Board Asked to Take Action.

The letter which follows has been received by the Board of Civil Service Commissioners.

With the letter was a communication indorsing it and signed by other members on the eligible list for the position of Deputy Supervisor of the City Record and Expert.

The letter, in part, is as follows:

NEW YORK, May 1, 1895.  
To the Honorable Board of Civil-Service Commissioners, New York City.

Gentlemen: As per the accompanying letter addressed to you, and signed by other gentlemen who were with myself competitors, and are now on the eligible list under the Civil-Service rules for the position of Deputy Supervisor of the City Record and Expert, I beg to submit to you the following statement of facts in connection with the late examination for the aforementioned position.

I therefore respectfully protest to your honorable body against your action in placing one Henry McMillan on the eligible list of said competitors, by which action he was chosen for the position of Deputy Supervisor of the City Record.

The reasons for making such protest are as follows:

From the statement made by Mr. John J. McGrath, one of the gentlemen who is on said eligible list, it can be proven that the said Mr. McMillan was unjustly favored by the Supervisor of the City Record, Mr. John A. Seicher, who unfairly permitted the said McMillan to spend several hours each day for a period of three weeks or more in the office of the City Record, and through which permission said McMillan was enabled to procure a practical knowledge of the methods of conducting the City Record and learn the general workings of the office.

The writer was informed by Mr. Lee Phillips, the Secretary of your honorable Board, that the questions that were propounded at said examination were formulated and their general style and outline were suggested by Supervisor Seicher, in the civil service rooms on the day of the examination, which statement Mr. Seicher has since admitted, and the facts conclusively prove that the questions were given in such a manner and for the purpose of aiding his personal friend, McMillan, the appointee, to procure the position.

The above is contrary to Regulation 14 of the rules governing your Board.

Proof that Supervisor Seicher and his newly appointed deputy are close personal friends is founded on the fact that they were associated on a newspaper in Troy, and Mr. Seicher subsequently obtained a position for his friend, McMillan, on the Mail and Express, in this city, where they were both employed prior to obtaining their present position on the City Record.

In view of the intimacy existing between Mr. Seicher and Mr. McMillan there is reasonable presumptive evidence to prove that Mr. Seicher had furnished Mr. McMillan with an outline of the questions, if not the questions themselves, in which all the applicants were examined.

A significant fact in connection with the examination was that Mr. McMillan was the second man to complete the answers at the examination.

That he could not have done this nor obtain the rating that he did without collusion, is based on the fact that the questions were of such a character that only persons with a long and close familiarity with the technical preparation of the City Record and its purposes, could have answered the questions correctly, which knowledge and experience Mr. McMillan did not have, as he was a comparatively newcomer to the city, and his newspaper work, while in this city, was not of a nature to give him the expert technical knowledge required in said examination.

Hoping you will give the matter your earnest consideration and by so doing uphold the true spirit of the Civil-Service law, I remain, yours respectfully,

Mr. McMillan, it will be seen, was third in passing the civil-service examination. The two who passed better examinations are practical printers and newspaper men.

Supervisor Seicher denies McVay's statement from beginning to end.

"The charges are absurd," he said to an "Evening World" reporter, this afternoon.

"McMillan used to come into the office sometimes. It is true, but I told him nothing about the examination papers. I knew nothing about them myself. They were made out at the Civil Service Commissioners' office, and I did not even see them. McVay was, I suppose, disappointed because I didn't give him a position that he wanted in my office."

The examination for deputy was purely competitive. Mr. McMillan got the third highest mark, which was within 1 per cent of the very highest.

"I knew nothing of the first man. The second was already employed by the printers who work by contract for us, so I gave the position to McMillan. I hope, if there is any doubt on the subject, that the Commissioners will demand a full investigation."

### McVay's Letter Sent to Albany.

The letter of George P. H. McVay, editor of the Uptown Press, which charged the Civil-Service Commissioners and Lee Phillips, the Secretary, with fraud in the examination for Deputy Supervisor and expert of the City Record, has been sent to the State Civil-Service Board for investigation.

### CHARGES AGAINST SLEICHER.

#### A Candidate Accuses Him of Evading the Civil-Service Law.

G. H. P. McVay, editor of the Uptown Press, and one of the unsuccessful candidates for the office of Deputy Supervisor of the City Record under John A. Seicher, has addressed a letter to the Civil-Service Board in which he charges that undue favoritism was shown to Mr. McMillan, the successful candidate, by Mr. Seicher, and that Mr. McMillan had practically been "coached" by Mr. Seicher for the examination.

In view of the intimacy existing between Mr. Sleicher and Mr. McMillan there is reasonable presumptive evidence to prove that Mr. Sleicher had furnished Mr. McMillan with an outline of the questions, if not the questions themselves, in which all the applicants were examined.

A significant fact in connection with the examination was that Mr. McMillan was the second man to complete the answers at the examination. \* \* \*

That he could not have done this nor obtain the rating that he did without collusion, is based on the fact that the questions were of such a character that only persons with a long and close familiarity with the technical preparation of the City Record and its purposes, could have answered the questions correctly, which knowledge and experience Mr. McMillan did not have, as he was a comparatively newcomer to the city, and his newspaper work, while in this city, was not of a nature to give him the expert technical knowledge required in said examination. \* \* \*

# NINE-HOUR WORK-DAY.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee, held June 10, I was instructed to submit the following propositions to a vote of chapels, said vote to be taken in the usual manner of holding elections, on Wednesday, July 27, 1892:

## PROPOSITION No. 1.

The inauguration of the shorter work-day and the method of providing ways and means for its successfulness was the subject which might well be classed as the most important,—most far-reaching in its good results,—presented for the consideration and action of the Fortieth Session of the International Typographical Union, and how thorough was this consideration and with what high degree of wisdom and practicability is the plan submitted for its accomplishment can but be known by a study of the report of the committee to whom the matter was referred, which is herewith submitted:

"Before entering into a demand for a nine-hour work-day we deem it advisable to prepare ourselves by creating a defense fund of such magnitude that will inspire our membership with confidence in its success.

"Your committee would suggest the submission to a vote of the subordinate unions, in accordance with Section 1 of Article XXII., Constitution International Typographical Union, the result to be reported by the 15th of August, of a proposition to create an 'International Resistance Fund' to be under the exclusive control and jurisdiction of the Executive Council. Said fund shall not be used for any purpose other than that for which it is created.

"An assessment of one cent a day (seven cents a week) upon all members under the jurisdiction of the International Typographical Union, beginning September 1, 1892.

"Compliance with the provisions and requirements of this enactment shall be exacted of all subordinate unions and their membership under the penalties prescribed by Article XVII., of the Constitution of the International Typographical Union, and all subordinate unions shall refuse to issue traveling certificates, or working cards to such of its members refusing to comply with any or all of its details.

"Every subordinate union shall appoint or elect a local Board of Trustees of the International Resistance Fund, to consist of not less than three (3) members, to whom all amounts to the credit of said fund shall be paid at least monthly. All local boards of trustees shall deposit the funds in their possession with some first-class safety deposit company with the understanding and agreement that the presence of at least two of its members shall be necessary to secure access to the deposit at any and all times. In localities where no safety deposit company exists, local boards of trustees shall select a solvent bank as their depository, with the understanding that not less than the signatures of two members of said board shall be necessary in withdrawing any portion of the funds. Local boards of trustees shall keep their accounts in a book specially prepared and furnished by the Secretary-Treasurer of the International Typographical Union for that purpose and render complete and accurate reports of the receipts each month to the Executive Council.

"The President and Secretary-Treasurer of the International Typographical Union shall exercise a general supervision of details and require all subordinate unions to promptly and strictly comply with the provisions of this enactment. The President of the International Typographical Union shall be authorized to inspect all the books and documents of any subordinate union, or those of its local board of trustees, in person or by duly appointed agent or agents, whenever in his judgment he may deem it necessary and proper.

The foregoing contemplates the most thorough preparation before making a movement toward securing the shorter work-day, and in view of the importance of the proposition, affecting as it does every member under the jurisdiction of the International, it is desirable to provide each member with a copy of the proposition, to the end that all may become familiar with the details of the plan, and thereby be in a position to vote intelligently thereon.

Should the proposition receive the approval of the membership it will become a law of the International Union and be in effect from and after September 1, 1892. The manner of collecting the assessment provided is left largely to the discretion of subordinate unions, the only requirement being that such collections shall be made at intervals not greater than once each month. The money realized from the assessment is not to be paid into the International treasury, but each union is to retain same and place it in charge of a local board of trustees, to be deposited by said trustees in a safety deposit vault or solvent bank, to be there kept and to be used for no other purpose than that for which it is created.

## PROPOSITION No. 2.

Among the most important subjects presented at the recent session of the International Union was a proposition to carry to a successful issue the strike now being waged at Pittsburgh for the inauguration of the nine-hour work-day. The matter was very thoroughly considered, and the statements submitted showed that steady gains on the part of the union in both offices and men have been made since the inception of the strike, until to-day a fair majority of both are working nine hours and under the jurisdiction of the Union.

So well satisfied with the statements presented were the delegates, and so thorough was the realization of the necessity of continuing the strike and financial support, that it was unanimously decided to submit to a vote of the membership a proposition levying an assessment of ten cents per week, the resolution providing therefor being as follows:

**"RESOLVED, That an assessment of ten cents a week per capita be submitted to a vote of the subordinate unions for the support of the Pittsburgh strike. Said vote to be returned to the International Typographical Union Secretary-Treasurer not later than August 10."**

As the result is to be determined by popular vote, you should not fail to state the number of votes cast for and against the proposition. If the action be unanimous, the number of members voting must be stated, otherwise the vote can not be counted.

# AND THIS IS CIVIL SERVICE!

## OUTRAGEOUS TREATMENT OF TWO MEMBERS OF "BIG SIX."

**Supervisor Sleicher of the City Record Appoints Henry McMillan Deputy Supervisor and Expert—Fraud and Collusion Charged—An Editor's Protest—Civil Service Board Appealed To—Will the Appointment Stand?**

Mr. James Haltigan, one of No. 6's most prominent members and at present chairman of the World office, was one of the applicants for Deputy Supervisor of the City Record and Expert. There were several other printers seeking the office, and G. J. H. McVay, Editor of the Uptown Press, was also among the applicants. A civil service examination was held by the Supervisor Sleicher on April 6, and the competitors ranked as follows in percentages:

Fred Alfred, 49 Park Place, 91.00.  
Henry McMillan, 622 Columbus avenue, 90.50.  
George P. H. McVay, 282 St. Nicholas avenue, 87.50.  
John P. McGrath, 126 East 114th street, 80.00.

On Thursday the members of Typographical Union No. 6 were astonished to learn that a rank outsider had captured the plum, one Henry McMillan, who, it is alleged, is a personal and intimate friend of Supervisor Sleicher. Members of the craft throughout the city are justly indignant at what they consider a humiliating snub.

McMillan, the appointee, was third in passing the Civil Service examination. Mr. Haltigan outranked all competitors and reflected great credit upon Typographical Union No. 6.

Mr. McVay was highly indignant at the appointment of McMillan, and on Thursday last addressed an open letter to the Board of Civil Service Commissioners protesting against Supervisor Sleicher's action, whom he charges with adopting unfair tactics in the interest of his personal friend McMillan. He also charges the Supervisor with violating the Civil Service law.

It is quite probable that the appointment will not stand if the Commissioners decide to investigate. The fact that Mr. Haltigan's percentage was the highest of any candidate examined goes to show that he was clearly entitled to the position. He feels sore over losing the nice berth, but when interviewed on the subject positively declined to speak of the matter for publication, except to say that he was very proud to know that he had outranked all rivals and reflected honor upon No. 6.

In order to give the readers of the Union Printer and American Craftsman an idea of the manner in which No. 6 has been snubbed—for that's the proper way to view the matter—we reproduced a few extracts from Mr. McVay's letter:

New York, May 1, 1895.  
To the Honorable Board of Civil Service Commissioners,  
New York City.

Gentlemen: As per the accompanying letter addressed to you and signed by other gentlemen who were with myself competitors, and are now on the eligible list under the civil service rules for the position of Deputy Supervisor of the City Record and Expert, I beg to submit to you the following statement of facts in connection with the last examination for the aforementioned position.

The writer was informed by Mr. Lee Phillips, the secretary of your honorable board, that the questions which were propounded at said examination were formulated and their general style and outline were suggested by Supervisor Sleicher in the civil service rooms on the day of the examination, which statement Mr. Sleicher has since admitted, and the facts conclusively prove that the questions were given in such a manner and for the purpose of aiding his personal friend, McMillan, the appointee, to procure the position. The above is contrary to Regulation 14 of the rules governing your board.

Supervisor Sleicher says McVay's charges are absurd. He admits that McMillan used to come into the office, but he denies that the candidate was told anything about the examination papers. He knew nothing about them himself.

In regard to Mr. Haltigan, Sleicher claims he knew nothing about that gentleman. On the other hand, it is positively known that Mr. Haltigan was introduced to the Supervisor by prominent politicians. Sleicher's memory is bad, indeed, in this connection, for it is stated upon unquestionable authority, that Mr. Haltigan had more than one personal interview with Sleicher.

In the meantime we shall thoroughly investigate the facts in connection with McMillan's appointment, and further developments may be looked for of an interesting nature. *Union Printer May 4, 95*

## CHINESE REFORM GAMES.

**McVAY SAYS THAT McMILLAN HAD A JACK UP HIS SLEEVE,**

**Jack's Last Name Being Sleicher, Whose Deputy McMillan Became—Denials Made by Sleicher and Phillips that the Competitive Examination Was Crooked.**

G. P. H. McVay, who was one of the applicants examined by the Civil Service Board on April 6 for the place of deputy supervisor and expert of the City Record, has written a letter to the Chinese Commissioners charging Supervisor Sleicher with having improperly assisted Henry McMillan, who finally received the appointment, to pass the examination. The following sentences occur in the letter:

"From the statement made by Mr. John McGrath, one of the gentlemen who is on said eligible list, it can be proven that the said Mr. McMillan was unjustly favored by the supervisor of the City Record, Mr. John A. Sleicher, who unfairly permitted the said McMillan to spend several hours each day for a period of three weeks or more in the office of the City Record, and through which permission said McMillan was enabled to procure a practical knowledge of the methods of conducting the City Record and learn the general workings of the office.

"The writer was informed by Mr. Lee Phillips, the Secretary of your honorable Board, that the questions that were propounded at said examination were formulated and their general style and outline were suggested by Supervisor Sleicher in the civil service rooms on the day of the examination, which statement Mr. Sleicher has since admitted, and the facts conclusively prove that the questions were given in such a manner and for the purpose of aiding his personal friend, McMillan, the appointee, to procure the position.

"Proof that Supervisor Sleicher and his newly appointed deputy are close personal friends is founded on the fact that they were associated on a newspaper in Troy, and Mr. Sleicher subsequently obtained a position for his friend, McMillan, on the Mail and Express in this city, where they were both employed prior to obtaining their present position on the City Record.

"In view of the intimacy existing between Mr. Sleicher and Mr. McMillan there is reasonable presumptive evidence to prove that Mr. Sleicher had furnished Mr. McMillan with an outline of the questions, if not the questions themselves, in which all the applicants were examined. The questions were of such a character that only persons with a long and close familiarity with the technical preparation of the City Record and its purposes, could have answered the questions correctly, which knowledge and experience Mr. McMillan did not have, as he was a comparatively newcomer to the city and his newspaper work, while in this city, was not of a nature to give him the expert technical knowledge required in said examination."

With the letter was forwarded an endorsement signed by several of the other applicants who were placed on the eligible list. The names of the five who stood highest on the list, with their ratings, were: James Haltigan, 91.50; Fred Alfred, 91; Henry McMillan, 90.50; George P. H. McVay, 87.50; John P. McGrath, 80.

Supervisor Sleicher was considerably exercised about the matter yesterday, and was emphatic in his denial that there was even the slightest foundation for McVay's charges.

"McVay's name was not even sent to me," he said. "Under the Civil Service law only the three who stand highest are forwarded. I knew nothing whatever about Haltigan. Alfred was employed by a firm of printers who do work for us under contract, and I considered that it would be manifestly improper for him to supervise the work to be done by that concern. McMillan I knew to be a thoroughly competent man. He has had experience as a practical printer, as an editor, and in all the other branches of the newspaper business; and, although he was third on the list, his percentage was only one point below that of the highest man.

"It is true that he had access to the City Record office and that he made use of that advantage, but this is a public office, and any one else would have the same right to inform himself of its workings that Mr. McMillan had. It is not true that he had obtained from me any intimation of the nature of the questions that would be asked at the examination. I did not prepare the questions, and merely made general suggestions as to their scope at the request of Mr. Phillips, the Secretary and executive officer of the Board. Even so far as that was concerned, Mr. McMillan had no conversation with me. If he had asked me for any information on that point I should certainly have refused to give it. The questions were naturally such as he would be prepared to answer as an all-around newspaper man."

Secretary Phillips said: "Mr. Sleicher did not prepare the questions, but at my request he made certain suggestions. It is my duty under the law when preparing questions to consult an expert, and I would naturally go to the man who was best acquainted with the requirements of the office. On the morning of the examination I asked Mr. Sleicher to come to my office and look over the paper I had prepared in accordance with his suggestions. He did so and some changes of a technical nature were made. For instance, Mr. Sleicher propounded a question as to the number of ems in a given space. Before incorporating it in the paper I changed the figures, only adopting the general question, as a safeguard against any suggestion of collusion between the supervisor and any of the applicants. I was particularly careful because one of the applicants, Mr. McGrath, had objected to Mr. Sleicher's presence in the room. I can say that there was not the slightest impropriety about the examination and that it was conducted in the fairest possible manner throughout. The charges against Mr. Sleicher are without the slightest foundation in fact. Although I cannot speak for the Commissioners, I hardly think they will deem it necessary to make a formal investigation."

The office of deputy supervisor and expert was created when Mr. Sleicher reorganized the City Record office a few weeks ago. McGrath, the applicant upon whose statements McVay says his charges are largely based, formerly held a place similar to that of deputy supervisor and expert, and was discharged by Mr. Sleicher. McVay himself was an applicant for the place of supervisor before Sleicher was appointed. After that he tried to have the new supervisor appoint him deputy supervisor and accountant, which is not a classified office. Mr. Sleicher declined to appoint McVay. It was then that the latter took the civil service examination for the other place. Mr. McVay is the editor and publisher of the Uptown Press.

# FRAUD IS CHARGED.

G. P. H. McVay Says He Was  
Swindled Out of a Job.

## AFTER McMILLAN'S PLACE.

Trouble Over Appointments in the  
City Record.

## CHARGES AGAINST SLEICHER.

The Civil Service Commissioners  
Meet and Discuss the  
Matter.

When the Civil Service Commissioners met last night in executive session at Mr. Godkin's house, in West Tenth street, they had enough business before them to keep them busy during an extremely protracted session. In the afternoon Secretary Lee Phillips said that the meeting would be an unimportant one and that only the newly established system of registry for laborers would be under discussion. But that was before Mr. Phillips knew that a letter written by one G. P. H. McVay had become in a measure public property. That letter was the subject of most of the discussion last evening.

Mr. McVay, who is the editor of the Uptown Press, was an applicant for the position of Deputy Supervisor of the City Record, and his name was on the eligible list forwarded to Supervisor John A. Sleicher by the Civil Service Commissioners. Mr. Sleicher a few days ago appointed Henry McMillan, who stood third on the eligible list, to the position, and shortly afterward Mr. McVay went before Commissioner Godkin and preferred complaints of collusion and fraud in connection with the appointment. Mr. Godkin told him to put his charges in writing and forward them to the secretary of the commission, which McVay did yesterday. The letter containing the charges was also indorsed by James Haltigan, Fred Alfred and John P. Sleicher by the Civil Service Commissioners. Mr. Sleicher a few days ago appointed Henry McMillan, who stood third on the eligible list, to the position, and shortly afterward Mr. McVay went before Commissioner Godkin and preferred complaints of collusion and fraud in connection with the appointment. Mr. Godkin told him to put his charges in writing and forward them to the secretary of the commission, which McVay did yesterday. The letter containing the charges was also indorsed by James Haltigan, Fred Alfred and John P. McGrath, who were respectively first, second and fifth on the eligible list sent to Supervisor Sleicher.

# NINE-HOUR WORK-DAY.

ROOMS, TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION No. 6,  
240 WILLIAM STREET,

NEW YORK, July 18, 1892.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee, held June 10, I was instructed to submit the following propositions to a vote of chapels, said vote to be taken in the usual manner of holding elections, on Wednesday, July 27, 1892:

## PROPOSITION No. 1.

The inauguration of the shorter work-day and the method of providing ways and means for its successfulness was the subject which might well be classed as the most important,—most far-reaching in its good results,—presented for the consideration and action of the Fortieth Session of the International Typographical Union, and how thorough was this consideration and with what high degree of wisdom and practicability is the plan submitted for its accomplishment can but be known by a study of the report of the committee to whom the matter was referred, which is herewith submitted:

"Before entering into a demand for a nine-hour work-day we deem it advisable to prepare ourselves by creating a defense fund of such magnitude that will inspire our membership with confidence in its success.

"Your committee would suggest the submission to a vote of the subordinate unions, in accordance with Section 1 of Article XXII., Constitution International Typographical Union, the result to be reported by the 15th of August, of a proposition to create an 'International Resistance Fund' to be under the exclusive control and jurisdiction of the Executive Council. Said fund shall not be used for any purpose other than that for which it is created.

"An assessment of one cent a day (seven cents a week) upon all members under the jurisdiction of the International Typographical Union, beginning September 1, 1892.

"Compliance with the provisions and requirements of this enactment shall be exacted of all subordinate unions and their membership under the penalties prescribed by Article XVII., of the Constitution of the International Typographical Union, and all subordinate unions shall refuse to issue traveling certificates or working cards to such of its members refusing to comply with any or all of its details.

"Every subordinate union shall appoint or elect a local Board of Trustees of the International Resistance Fund, to consist of not less than three (3) members, to whom all amounts to the credit of said fund shall be paid at least monthly. All local boards of trustees shall deposit the funds in their possession with some first-class safety deposit company with the understanding and agreement that the presence of at least two of its members shall be necessary to secure access to the deposit at any and all times. In localities where no safety deposit company exists, local boards of trustees shall select a solvent bank as their depository, with the understanding that not less than the signatures of two members of said board shall be necessary in withdrawing any portion of the funds. Local boards of trustees shall keep their accounts in a book specially prepared and furnished by the Secretary-Treasurer of the International Typographical Union for that purpose and render complete and accurate reports of the receipts each month to the Executive Council.

"The President and Secretary-Treasurer of the International Typographical Union shall exercise a general supervision of details and require all subordinate unions to promptly and strictly comply with the provisions of this enactment. The President of the International Typographical Union shall be authorized to inspect all the books and documents of any subordinate union, or those of its local board of trustees, in person or by duly appointed agent or agents, whenever in his judgment he may deem it necessary and proper.

The foregoing contemplates the most thorough preparation before making a movement toward securing the shorter work-day, and in view of the importance of the proposition, affecting as it does every member under the jurisdiction of the International, it is desirable to provide each member with a copy of the proposition, to the end that all may become familiar with the details of the plan, and thereby be in a position to vote intelligently thereon.

Should the proposition receive the approval of the membership it will become a law of the International Union and be in effect from and after September 1, 1892. The manner of collecting the assessment provided is left largely to the discretion of subordinate unions, the only requirement being that such collections shall be made at intervals not greater than once each month. The money realized from the assessment is not to be paid into the International treasury, but each union is to retain same and place it in charge of a local board of trustees, to be deposited by said trustees in a safety deposit vault or solvent bank, to be there kept and to be used for no other purpose than that for which it is created.

## PROPOSITION No. 2.

Among the most important subjects presented at the recent session of the International Union was a proposition to carry to a successful issue the strike now being waged at Pittsburgh for the inauguration of the nine-hour work-day. The matter was very thoroughly considered, and the statements submitted showed that steady gains on the part of the union in both offices and men have been made since the inception of the strike, until to-day a fair majority of both are working nine hours and under the jurisdiction of the Union.

So well satisfied with the statements presented were the delegates, and so thorough was the realization of the necessity of continuing the strike and financial support, that it was unanimously decided to submit to a vote of the membership a proposition levying an assessment of ten cents per week, the resolution providing therefor being as follows:

**"RESOLVED, That an assessment of ten cents a week per capita be submitted to a vote of the subordinate unions for the support of the Pittsburgh strike. Said vote to be returned to the International Typographical Union Secretary-Treasurer not later than August 10."**

As the result is to be determined by popular vote, you should not fail to state the number of votes cast for and against the proposition. If the action be unanimous, the number of members voting must be stated, otherwise the vote can not be counted.

For members not voting in chapels, polls will be open at the Secretary's Office, 240 William Street, from 10 a. m. until 8 p. m.
