William Livatt sworn and examined.
 I am the complainant and know the prisoner.
 I remember the 12th of November; she took
 some property from me that day. I never
 saw her before in my life. I met her in
 Wester St. about ten minutes of twelve at
 night. She said, Halloa, where are you going?
 I said, I am going towards home. Will you
 stand treat? she said, I said I did not
 mind; she took me in 113 Wester St.; then
 we had four glasses of beer there; she asked
 me to go home with her. I changed a ten
 dollar bill over the counter. I gave 75 cents
 for a bottle of whiskey to take home and I
 stood treat for the parties in there. which
 cost me 35 cents. I went home with her
 to 22 Allen St. She unlocked the door
 to let me in, not the outside door, but the
 door up stairs. Then I went in with her; she
 wanted me to drink some of the whiskey
 and I would not; she locked the door and
 put the key on the mantel piece. I got
 out of bed and tried the door again. I
 asked her if the door was locked. I
 undressed myself in there. What did

you do with your clothes? I put my clothes on a chair, coat, pants and vest - a woolen suit. There was three dollars in my coat that I could swear to. I valued my clothes at twenty five dollars, I could not get a suit under that. Did you go to sleep? Yes sir; it might be one o'clock as near as I could say when I went to sleep. It might be after six o'clock in the morning when I woke up, I could not swear exactly. Then I woke up I saw she was gone and my clothes were gone. The lining of my cap was turned inside out. There was not a living soul but her and her man knew I had bills about me. I put my bills in the stocking - otherwise she would have got my bills. I had six dollars a five dollar and a dollar bill. It was only some silver you had in your pocket? Yes sir. The bottle of whiskey was placed at the foot of the bed and my boots were wrapped up in paper. I did not taste any of the whiskey. This happened on Saturday night and I next saw the prisoner on Monday evening; she was in the Police cell in the station house, in the Tenth precinct Eldridge St. I made a complaint in the mean time to the Sergeant. I had

described the woman, she went by the name of Kate Sanders, I found that out in the saloon I went to next morning. I have got nothing back and I lost a good situation beside. Cross Examined. I am a machinist, I work for Mr. Edison in Goerck St. for two weeks. I had fifteen dollars a week. I got paid at half past four that day. I had twenty dollars on me that afternoon. After supper I went to Niblo's Garden. I was with a friend of mine that afternoon. Mr. Wetheral of Stamford, who was buying a suit of clothes. I went out of the Theatre at half past ten o'clock. I went on the Elevated road with my friend and left him at 11 1/2, I got out at Canal St. close to twelve o'clock I live at 457 Grand St. I was reading a paper and that is the reason why I did not get off at Grand St. I had no special reason for going into Mester St. We had four drinks in the saloon, I took four beers, nothing else I am sure I did not remain in the saloon two hours, I left there before one o'clock. I had no quarrel with the woman in the room. I saw that she had a blackened eye and a bruised cheek. That is what her man gave her who passes as her husband I was told that.

Kate Landers, sworn and examined in her own behalf testified: Did you steal this man's money? No sir, I did not. Did you steal his clothes? No sir, I never took a cents worth. You went with him to that room on this night in question, did you? Yes sir, I did. He was a little drunk. I met him in a house in Eldridge St. I went in a room with him a little while; he gave me a dollar; he asked me where we could get a couple of glasses of beer and I told him in Nester St. We went to the saloon and remained till half past two. He asked me if I would not take him all night and asked me how much? I said, "Three dollars; he said he would not give me but ~~the~~ ^{two} dollars. He struck me because I would not do something that he wanted me to do; he blackened my eye and bruised my face. Cross Examined. When I woke up in the morning he was in bed, I could not say if he was asleep, I dressed myself. I lived with a man four years; he was out of work at this time, he was not with me a week before this. This room was on the second floor. I saw his clothes when I went out of the room that morning, but I did not take them. The jury rendered a verdict of guilty of petty larceny.

The Catalogue of the said College 1858- '59. contains a list of all the Graduates of that College to 1859; and in that list the name of Light-hill does not appear. These Catalogues are here produced, marked Exhibits A. 2. and B. 2. respectively. The Diploma shown me by the Counsel for the Defendant and marked Exhibit "A" (shows discoloration where the name of Light-hill is inserted) was not given to Mr Light-hill by the Authorities of the New York Medical College; (it shows discoloration where the name of Light-hill is inserted)

6. (The College officers & Question by the Court, This Diploma here shown bears it the signatures of all the Members of the Faculty.

Answer. Yes of most of them.

Q. You see Dr. Lightshill's name there?

A. I do sir.

Q. Is not that proof that it was given to him by the Faculty?

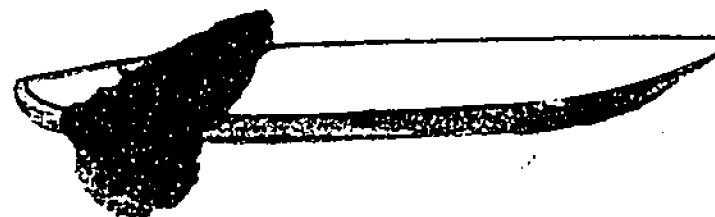

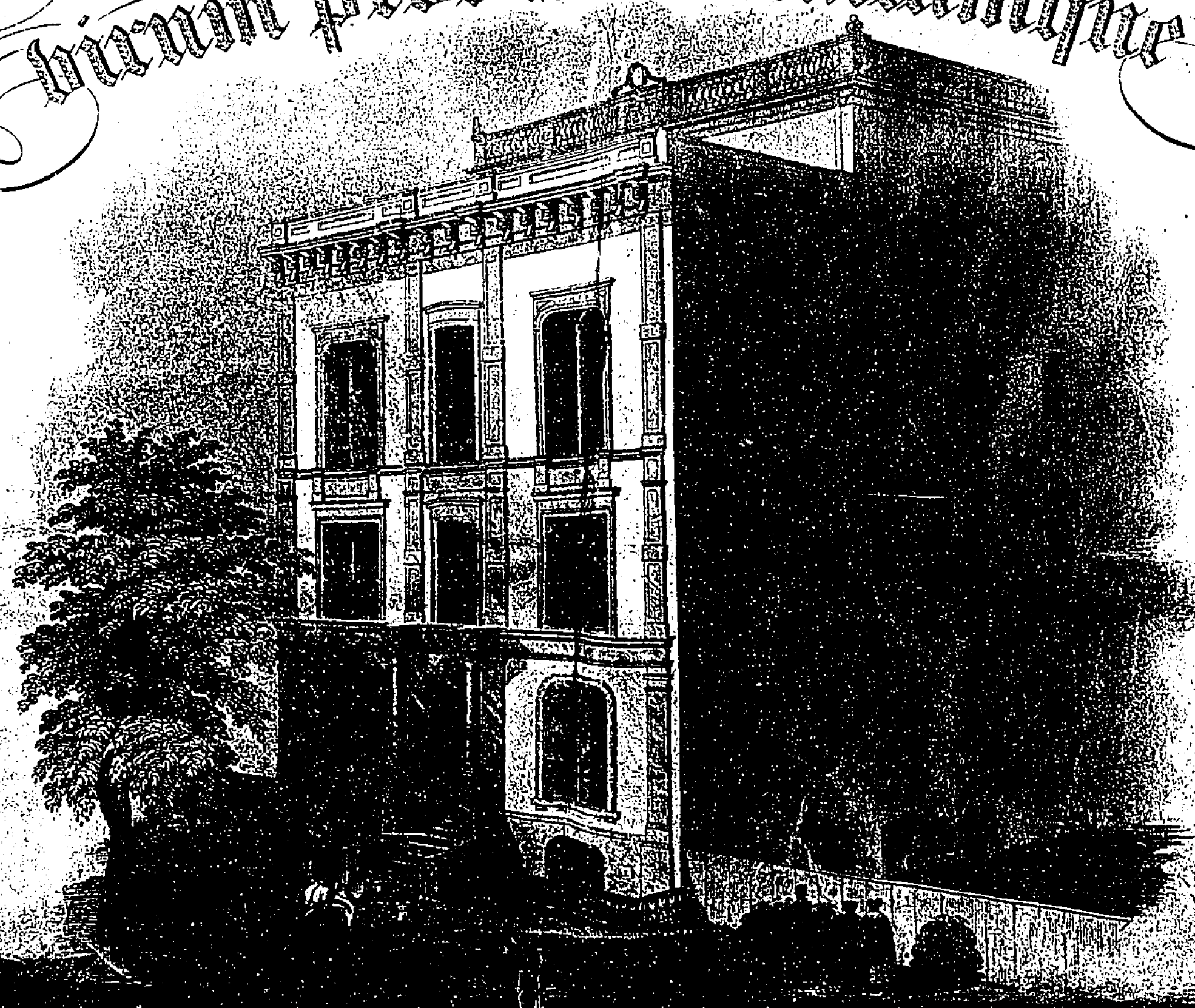

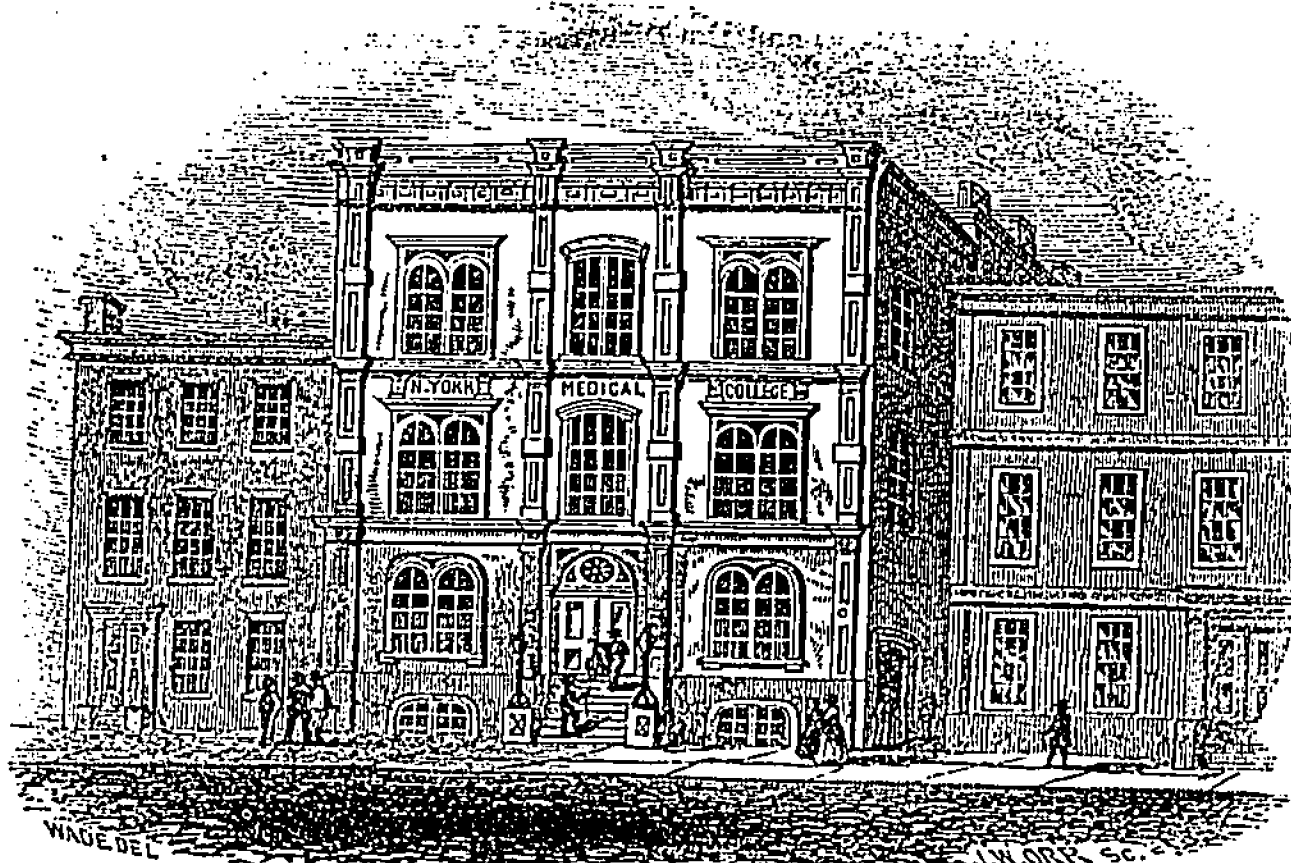

- On *Diseases Peculiar to Women*, by Prof. BARKER.
- On the *Surgical Operations of the Eye*, by Prof. CARNOCHAN.
- On *Diseases of Children*, by Prof. COX.
- On the *Influence of Geological Formations in Producing Certain Diseases*, By Prof. DAVIS.
- On *Auscultation and Percussion*, by J. HANCOCK DOUGLAS, M. D.
- On *Medical Jurisprudence*, by DAVID UHL, M. D.
- On *Practical Obstetrics*, by C. A. BUDD, M. D.

CLINQUES AT THE COLLEGE.

There will be three Cliniques weekly, at which over two thousand patients are annually prescribed for.

- On Tuesday, Clinique for Diseases of Women, by Prof. Barker.
- On Thursday, Surgical Clinique by Prof. Carnochan.
- On Saturday, Medical Clinique, by Prof. Cox.

The following list of the various hospitals, will give some idea of the facilities which New York affords for the study of medicine:

THE EMIGRANTS' HOSPITAL

Contains about 1,500 beds, and during the last year furnished accommodations for more than 15,000 patients; and of which Prof. Carnochan is Surgeon-in-Chief.

BLACKWELL'S ISLAND HOSPITAL.

Over 10,000 patients were treated here during the past year. Dr. W. W. Sanger, Resident Physician. Prof. Barker, one of the Consulting Physicians.

THE BELLEVUE HOSPITAL

Contains about 600 beds, accommodating annually from 3,000 to 4,000 patients. Prof. Barker, one of the Attending Physicians.

THE NEW YORK HOSPITAL

Contains about 400 beds, and is occupied by about 3,000 patients annually.

Besides these, are the Nursery Hospital for Children; Nursery Hospital, Randall's Island; The Ophthalmic Hospital and Eye Infirmary; and four Dispensaries,—in which large numbers of patients are treated, thus affording to students the opportunity of studying disease in any form and combination. Prof. Cox is Consulting Physician to the first two institutions.

If students attending the Summer Course afterwards decide to attend the Winter Course, the \$25 paid will be placed to their credit on taking out the tickets for the Winter Course. Matriculation Fee, \$5.

The fee of the Demonstrator of Anatomy is \$5.

Thirty dollars are to be paid previous to the final examination, which is irrespective of graduation. In case the candidate is not recommended for the degree of Doctor of Medicine, he will be entitled in six months afterwards to another examination, for which no fee will be exacted.

Graduates of three years' standing, of other institutions where the requirements are the same as at this, will be admitted to attend all the lectures on paying the matriculation fee.

By an express section of the charter, five students from the Free Academy of this city, who shall have the written certificate of the professors of that institution, of their having obtained superior scholarship, shall be admitted without charge to all the lectures of this College, on paying the matriculation fee.

REQUISITES FOR GRADUATION.

The Candidate for Graduation must be of the age of 21 years. He must have studied Medicine, under a respectable practitioner, for three years. He must have attended two full Courses of Lectures, of which one must have been in this College; and he must present to the Faculty a thesis, in his own handwriting, on some Medical or Surgical subject.

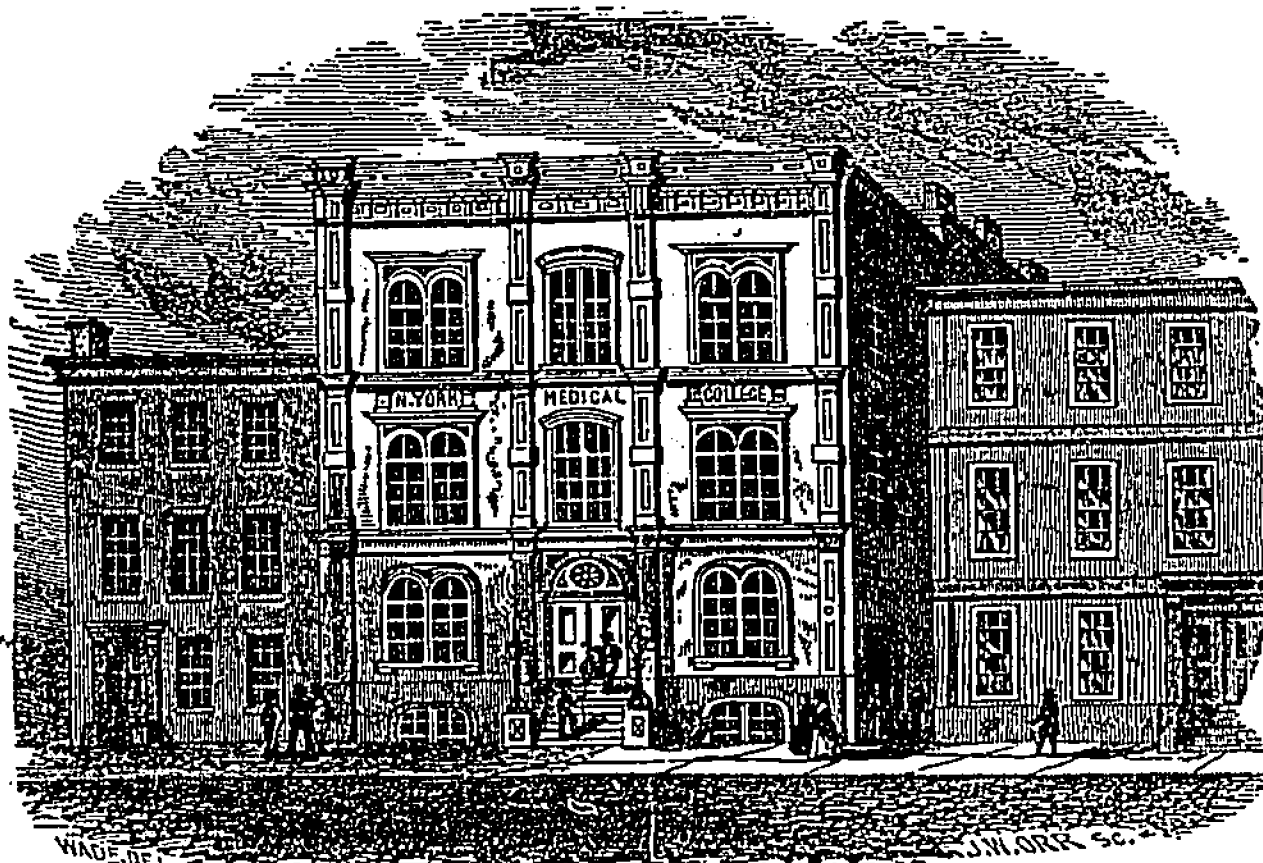

CLINQUES AT THE COLLEGE.

There will be four Cliniques weekly, at which over two thousand patients are annually prescribed for:—

- On Tuesday, Clinique for the Diseases of Women, by Prof. Barker.
- On Wednesday, Miscellaneous Clinique by Profs. Peaslee and Childs.
- On Thursday, Surgical Clinique, by Prof. Carnochan.
- On Saturday, Medical Clinique, by Prof. Cox.

To give some idea of the facilities which New York affords for the study of medicine, we would mention that there are twenty-five regularly organized Hospitals, containing nearly 10,000 beds, and accommodating some 50,000 patients per annum; besides ten Infirmaries and Dispensaries, in which large numbers of patients are treated; thus affording to students the opportunity of studying disease in every form and combination.

 and in the year last aforesaid, and
 ever since that day and until
 the finding of this indictment, at
 and within the City, County and State
 aforesaid, did knowingly, intentionally
 and unlawfully practice physic and
 medicine and attend as a physician
 upon divers persons to the great hurt

aforesaid unknown one was, then
 and there, sick, weak, ill and
 distempered, and there and there,
 prescribe and administer as a physician
 to the aforesaid persons certain
 such and medicines to the grand jury
 of said unknown, and said
 Edward B. Light hill, then and there,
 not being as to the said Edward B. Light hill,
 then and there, and knew and ought
 not and to so practice physic or
 medicine as aforesaid or to so
 prescribe or administer such physic
 and medicine so prescribed and
 administered as aforesaid, against
 form of the Statute in such
 act made and provided, and
 against the peace of the People
 of the State of New York and
 their dignity.

And the Grand Jury aforesaid,
 by this indictment, charges because
 the said Edward B. Light hill
 of the crime of practicing medicine without authority
 committed as follows:
 the said Edward B. Light hill
 late of the ward, city, county and State

aforesaid afterwards to wit, on the day
 and in the year last aforesaid, and
 at a place then and there
 the finding of the incision, at
 and within the city, county and state
 aforesaid, did knowingly, intentionally
 and unlawfully practise physic and
 medicine and attend upon divers
 persons to the Grand Jury aforesaid
 unknown, who were, then and there,
 sick, sickly, old and infirm
 and, then and there, prescribe and
 administer to the aforesaid persons
 certain physic and medicines
 to the Grand Jury aforesaid unknown,
 he the said Edward B. Light hill
 then and there, not being, as he the said
 Edward B. Light hill, then and there,
 was then, lawfully authorized to so
 practise physic or medicine as aforesaid
 or to so prescribe or administer such
 physic and medicine so prescribed and
 administered as aforesaid, against the form
 of the Statute in such case made and provided
 and against the peace of the People of the State
 of New York and their dignity.
