





 Harry E. Smith, sworn and examined.  
 I am a private detective at 1293 Broadway.  
 I was in the discharge of my duty on the 12<sup>th</sup> of  
 this month. I saw the prisoner on that day.  
 I met him first at 29<sup>th</sup> St. and Eighth ave.  
 I happened to stand, I seen him with his  
 hand in a party's pocket. I followed him  
 down to Ehrich's and between that time he  
 had his hand in over a dozen people's  
 pockets. Then he went in a crowd at ~~Ehrich's~~  
 Twenty fourth St. and Eighth ave. and I seen  
 him take a handkerchief out of the pocket  
 of a lady; she was in the crowd. I got  
 pushed about, I could not get near her.  
 I got an officer to have him arrested.  
 This was about 9 o'clock at night. I could  
 not identify the handkerchief which he  
 took. I saw some white handkerchiefs  
 which the officer took from his person.  
 Cross Examined I have been a private  
 detective six years. On this evening  
 I was taking a stroll in that neighborhood.  
 There were a good many people walking  
 along the Avenue. There is no doubt in  
 my mind as to the identity of this boy.

There were not many boys walking along. I told the officer to arrest the boy and I would make the charge. The lady got out of the crowd; it was done quickly; there was a big crowd at the window because of the excitement of the pantomime. The boy acted the same as a professional pickpocket; he could not do any better. I have seen professional pickpockets operate; this lady's back was turned towards him. It was a white pocket handkerchief he took. Before he took this handkerchief when he was going down the avenue he tried to operate upon about twelve people all the way down from Twenty ninth St. to Erich's. I suspected he had done something. I wanted to see an officer to have him arrested. I did not see an officer till I got to Erich's. I have made arrests with warrants but never without. I was present when the prisoner was searched and I saw handkerchiefs taken from him: he was arrested about half past nine. I followed closely in his tracks watching his movements. He operated upon the right side of the lady with his right hand; he came up behind her; he pulled the handkerchief out quickly and put it in his pants pocket. I saw no other boys in company with the prisoner.

0566

Morgan Thomas, sworn and examined testified. I am an officer of the 16<sup>th</sup> precinct. My attention was called to the prisoner on the 12<sup>th</sup> of this month by Mr. Smith, the last witness. He says, "you arrest this man, I will make a complaint against him for picking pockets." I thereupon arrested him and searched him in the station house. I found this silk and those white handkerchiefs (witness producing three or four) they were loose; I tied them in a bundle Cross Examined they were all in one of his pockets loose. These are the same handkerchiefs that I found on him because they have been locked up in the station house ever since. I brought them here this morning. He gave me all kinds of abuse when I arrested him; he was under the influence of liquor too; he was sufficiently under the influence of liquor for me to make a charge against him for intoxication; he resisted me taking him, I had to use force to arrest him. He said the white handkerchiefs belonged to him. but the other one did not; he denied having taken any handkerchiefs from anybody. I made no effort to find the lady; there was a great crowd at Erick's window; they had a performance there.

Gustav Skihoff, sworn and examined in  
 his own behalf testified. I live at 491 Ninth  
 Avenue. I was born in New York and lived  
 here all my life. I am 18 years old. I have  
 worked in Campbell's paper factory in City  
 first St. between Ninth and Eleventh aves. I  
 worked there last week and up to the time of  
 my arrest. I was on Eighth Avenue the night  
 I got arrested. That day I stopped work at five  
 o'clock, went home to my supper, stayed  
 there about an hour, left home about six  
 o'clock and then walked around the avenue  
 with some boys, Patrick Hickey, McCoy and  
 Brown. I know those boys about a month. We  
 looked at the bill at Harry Miner's theatre and


