Specifications and form of contract for paving the slope of the Pool near 102nd Street in Central Park have been prepared and referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report;

Also a plan of proposed grade of that portion of the Bronx and Pelham Parkway lying between the Eastchester Avenue (or lane) and the Eastern Boulevard, Pelham Bay Park, the improvement of which was not included in the existing contract for the parkway.

The Comptroller has been notified of the readiness of this Department to proceed with the construction, improvement and embellishment of the public park at the junction of East 192nd Street, Kingsbridge Road and the Grand Boulevard or Concourse, in the 24th Ward.

The work of tree planting and ornamentation at Morningside Park is being proceeded with, by the working force of the Department, and will be finished in about 10 days.

The entire work for the improvement of Mulberry Bend Park has been completed.

The work of re-grading the railroad tracks of the Metropolitan St. Ry. Co. and the Third Avenue Ry. Co. at the Circle, 59th St. and 8th Ave. is being proceeded with preparatory to the paving of the Circle with asphalt by the Sicilian Asphalt Paving Company, the contract for which was executed November 20th, 1896; contract price \$29,654.69.

The repairs to the Washington Arch, Washington Square, have been completed.

The work of paving and repaving with asphalt the walks of Central Park is being proceeded with.

At the Circle, 59th Street and 8th Avenue, the Metropolitan Railway Company have adjusted the southerly and westerly portion of their tracks and are repaving with old blocks the tracks adjusted.

The work of repairing and repaving with asphalt the walks of the city parks other than Central Park is being proceeded with. The walks in Mount Morris Park were completed on the 4th inst.

The grading and construction of sub-structure of the walk at the entrance at Manhattan Avenue and Cathedral Parkway is being prosecuted by men in the employ of the Department, and asphalt has been laid on the platforms of the stairway at the 120th Street entrance.

On the 1st and 2nd Sections of Riverside Park, between 79th and 120th Streets, the shaping of grounds and covering with top soil and the laying of asphalt on walks is being prosecuted.

On the 3rd Section, and the grounds surrounding the tomb of Gen. Grant, telford foundation for widening the roadway has been laid, as have been gutters on telford foundation, setting curb stones, constructing rubble stone foundation of walks and foundation for steps, coping and posts around the tomb. The grounds are being graded and drain pipe

laid .

The work of grading and construction of the culverts on the Bronx and Pelham Parkway has been in progress, with a force of 72 men and teams.

The work of regulating and paving with telford pavement the Pelham Bay Road, between Eastchester Bay and the northerly line of Pelham Bay Park was commenced on December 1st and the grading is in progress, with a force of 18 men and teams.

Surveys are in progress for the extension of the Bronx and Pelham Parkway through Bronx Park to the Southern Boulevard, and surveys for the erection of the new bridge have been commenced.

Considerable tree and shrub planting has been done in Central Park during the week.

The work of removing the snow in the City Parks on Monday last was finished by 10 A. M. on that day.

Wednesday next, the 9th inst. has been fixed for opening the Aquarium. An invitation to luncheon at the Aquarium at 1 P. M. on that day will be sent to the heads of the Departments of the City Government, and it is hoped that your Honor will be present on that occasion.

REPAIRS TO THE MADISON AVENUE BRIDGE: At the last meeting of the Board bids were received for repairs to this bridge and the contract awarded to Augustus Smith for \$6,470. Proposals for this work were advertised early in November and at the meeting held on November 16th, only one bid was received, that of Joseph Edwards & Co., for \$10,880. This bid was rejected, the Board deeming it to the interests of the City so to do.

PARK ENCLOSING WALLS, 97th to 110th STREETS: The construction of the Park enclosing walls and entrances on 5th Avenue from 97th to 110th Streets is nearing completion.

CIRCLE, 59th STREET & 8th AVENUE: The work of excavation, laying of concrete, rolling and preparation of foundation of the section on the south-west side is being prosecuted.

PAVING AND REPAVING WITH ASPHALT THE WALKS OF CENTRAL PARK: The walks from the Concourse near 105th Street and 8th Avenue to the East Drive and 7th Avenue have been completed and work is now in progress on walk west of the Terrace.

GREELEY SQUARE, 32nd STREET, 6th AVENUE & BROADWAY: The laying of the asphalt walks surrounding this square will be finished next week.

SEA WALL ON THE NORTHERLY SIDE OF EXTENSION OF EAST RIVER PARK: The work of preparation of foundation for masonry is in progress.

RIVERSIDE PARK: The work for the week has been as follows:

1st Section, 79th to 96th Streets; delivering and spreading top-soil and laying foundation and concrete for walks at entrances.

2nd Section, 96th to 120th Streets: Shaping, delivering of mould and spreading; laying sods; building foundations and setting rustic steps; building foundations for walk and laying asphalt on walks; the delivery of cast iron water pipe was begun today.

3rd Section, surrounding Tomb of General Grant: Laying Telford foundation and gutters for drive; setting curb stones around Tomb; excavation for foundation and construction of rubble masonry foundation; filling; laying drain pipe; rolling the foundation for pavement of Avenue.

BRONX AND PELHAM PARKWAY: The work of grading and construction of culverts is in progress with a force of 98 men and teams.

PELHAM BRIDGE ROAD BETWEEN EASTCHESTER BAY AND THE NORTHERLY LINE OF PELHAM BAY PARK: This work was commenced on December 1st and the grading is in progress with a force of 22 men and teams.

AQUARIUM: The building was opened to the public on Thursday last, the 10th inst., and between twelve and fifteen thousand persons have visited it daily since its opening. By a resolution of the Board, the building is to be open to the public between the hours of 10 A. M. and 4 P. M., excepting Sundays and Mondays. It is the intention of the Board to open the building on Sundays immediately after January 1st next.

Number of men employed.....4---Policemen.

The storm and heavy snow fall on Tuesday and Wednesday, the 15th and 16th inst., with the freezing weather, prevented the prosecution of all masonry work, laying of asphalt and work of a similar character in this Department.

The work of paving and repaving with asphalt the walks of Central Park was completed on the 15th inst.

The relaying of the walks at the triangle, 35th Street, Broadway and 6th Avenue was completed on the 19th inst., and that triangle completes the work under the contract requiring repairs and repaving in good condition the walks in the following named parks: Tompkins, Stuyvesant, Washington, Bryant, Greeley, East River, Extension to East River, Triangle at 32nd Street, 6th Avenue & Broadway, and Mount Morris Park.

The snow on the walks of the parks other than Central Park was removed with all possible speed by an "emergency gang" sent from the Labor Bureau of the Civil Service Commission. The total time expended on this work was 3288 hours at 22 cents per hour.
