

At a Mass Meeting of Citizens, Owners and Residents in the vicinity of Fifth Avenue and 129th Street, held in St. Andrew's Church, on Saturday evening January 9th, 1897, the following resolutions were unanimously passed. -

WHEREAS, the Board of Education without consultation with the owners of the property or with any of the residents of the vicinity, seeks to acquire the land on the westerly side of Fifth Avenue from 129th to 130th Streets for a public school site, and

WHEREAS, the proposed site is far from the centre of dense population, and in the midst of an exclusively private residential neighborhood, a large number of the residents owning their own homes, and

WHEREAS, few if any of the children of these neighboring residents attend the public schools, a large majority of whom are either educated at home or at private schools, and

WHEREAS, the use of the land so proposed to be taken would greatly depreciate the value of surrounding property and thus cause irreparable injury to the owners, and,

WHEREAS, the land proposed to be taken is of exceptional value, probably the most expensive north of Central Park, other than strictly business property, and

WHEREAS, other sites can be obtained in places suitable for the uses of the Public School System,

THEREFORE, we Citizens, Taxpayers, Owners and Residents of the immediate neighborhood of said site in Mass Meeting assembled earnestly and vigorously protest against this useless and unnecessary injustice and wrongful injury, and be it

RESOLVED:- That the proposed acquisition of the said land for school purposes the valuation of which is not less than two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.) amounts to reckless extravagance on the part of public officials. Our tax rates have been recently increased from \$1.90 to about \$2.25 per hundred, which together with increased valuations give us cause to resist and oppose this additional and unnecessary burden upon the tax-payers when a proper and cheaper site can be procured.

RESOLVED:- That all taxable value of real property within many blocks of the proposed site will be materially diminished by the erection of a school building thereon, that the amount of taxes to be collected will therefore be much less than at present,

RESOLVED:- That the vacant land to the north of Grammar School No. 89 on Lenox Ave. & 134th Street, being a plot 100 x 125 should be utilized to double the capacity of that school which is properly located and which would save expense to the City in many ways, not only in original cost of land but in the administration of the school when erected,

RESOLVED:- That a site should be selected also

between Lexington and Madison Avenues in the vicinity of 125th Street and it is suggested that a plot of land, say on 126th Street near Lexington Avenue of equal area to that proposed to be taken on Fifth Avenue can be purchased for less than one-half the value of the Fifth Avenue site, and that official economy as well as public need should compel the Board of Education to select that location which would give the residents of the City proper school accommodations in convenient places at the minimum cost instead of selecting maximum value in inconvenient localities.

RESOLVED:- That public sentiment demands that the Board of Education shall use its prerogatives judiciously and for the interests of the residents and citizens of the localities where schools are required, and it shall not defy public sentiment by locating schools distant from homes of the children who attend them, and shall not impose hardship and damage upon people who have by frugal savings made for themselves homes in a secluded and retired neighborhood.

RESOLVED:- That the Board of Education be requested to defer further proceedings and to re-consider its action as to the selection of the proposed site, and that this Association hereby ask to be heard upon the question by said Board or its Committee.

RESOLVED:- That an attested copy of these Resolutions be transmitted by the Secretary to the Board of

Education, the Mayor, Comptroller, and Corporation Counsel
and that copies thereof be sent to the newspaper press
of the City.



W H E R E A S WE, citizens of Harlem living East of Madison Avenue, are informed that the Board of Education of this City has taken steps to acquire a site for a public school on 5th Avenue at about 130th street, a n d

W H E R E A S it is rumored that the said Board is about to abandon School No. 39 now located on 125th street East of 3rd Avenue and sell the land upon which it stands.

Therefore be it

R E S O L V E D, that we vehemently protest against both the above measures as discriminating against the mass of the people and in favor of the few.

R E S O L V E D, That we strongly and urgently remonstrate against the action of the Committee on Sites of the Board of Education in selecting for school purposes a location on 5th Avenue which is absolutely unnecessary, which is not in the midst of a public school population, which must depend upon children living east of Madison Avenue for its attendance and which will therefore require our little ones to travel long distances several times daily in all kinds of weather to attend school.


R E S O L V E D that the abandonment of the present 125th street school (No. 39) and the absorbtion by the Sinking Fund of the money derived from its sale will deprive us of a school advantageously located.

R E S O L V E D that we demand that the Board of Education shall place schools in such convenient locations to our homes, that our children may attend them without unnecessary fatigue and with the least possible danger from railway crossings.


R E S O L V E D that the Board of Education be requested to abandon the site proposed to be taken on 5th Avenue.

R E S O L V E D that the Board of Education be urged to select a location East of 4th Avenue and North of 125th street upon which to erect a public school which will accommodate our children without causing them unnecessary hardship by reason of long distances from our homes or that additional surrounding property be added to school No. 39 on East 125th street and sufficiently increase the capacity of School No. 39 or that both the latter suggestions be adopted.



My dear Sir:

I have received your favor of the fifteenth inst, suggesting to me, that I should resign the office which I received at your hands, of Commissioner of Schools of this city.

I am sure that when you appointed me to that office, you did so under the supposition that I was properly qualified for the place, and as I had not previously the pleasure of your acquaintance, I suppose that I must have been recommended to you by gentlemen in whom you had confidence.

If such were the case, I feel certain that the gentlemen who then recommended me, would be as willing to renew the recommendation, as they were to originally offer it, in other words, they have not

to any extent, lost confidence in me.

I appreciate most sincerely your endeavors to reform our school system, and firmly believe that your note to me expresses most truly your honest desire in that regard, but when it comes to your asking my resignation, I am obliged in justice to myself, to reflect upon what such a resignation on my part, under pressure might imply.

I have done no wrong, my record in the department for the visiting of schools, attendance upon the meetings of the Board and its committees and otherwise, is equal to that of any other member of the Board. What reason could I give for such a resignation as you ask that would justify me in the eyes of the community I represent?

The only reason I could give would be that the

Mayor of our city had informed me that "he was convinced that my course during the past two months in the Board had alienated from me the interest, with possibly one or two exceptions, of all the members, so much so in fact, that they had expressed themselves to him as not desiring to serve with me upon the various committees, and his conclusion from the above statement, that my usefulness in the Board is at an end etc."

But my dear Sir, you are mistaken in your supposition and must have been greatly misled, as I shall be able to show you within a very few days. There is no such situation with regard to myself in the Board as you imagine.

If any of the members have expressed to you their unwillingness to sit with me on committees, have

I desire this in defence of my own character and professional standing, and in justification also of the appointment I received at your hands, and I trust that in all fairness you will grant me the opportunity thus requested.





Dear Sir:

Some time since I had occasion to address your Honor with relation to the lack of school accommodations in this neighborhood, and the failure of the School Board to act with sufficient rapidity in providing for ^a pressing need. Since that date action has been taken by them so far that they have selected two new sites for the two new schools which we need at once. I think that the selection is not altogether well made, but that is not a point for me to decide. My purpose in writing to your Honor is to ask you to do what you can to hasten the action of the Commissioners in securing ^{the} land and erecting ^{the} buildings. What need is there of so much red tape and interminable delays? Why cannot this work be done more as business men do work of a similar character? Knowing that hundreds of children are out of school, and that hundreds more are improperly cared for in the schools, it would seem that energetic and efficient men should have by this time proceeded much further than to choose sites where some time [#] in the future they

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propose to erect school buildings.

Last spring the two schools of this district, Nos. 54 and 93, and especially the former, were greatly overcrowded, particularly in the lower classes. The ^{Superintendent} ~~principal~~ of the schools had declared that forty ^{is} ~~was~~ the lowest number that should be taught in one class, but in all the lower classes in both schools there were sixty children and over; and I have myself seen in No. 54 sixty-three, and I

think in one case sixty-seven, children actually in attendance in one class room. Some of these were sitting three together at a desk intended for two, and some were sitting in chairs, without desks, around the side of the room; but with all this crowding there were still children who could not be admitted. By autumn, owing to the immense increase of population in the meantime, hundreds of children could not find places in the schools. Classes were doubled up, so that children who should have been receiving education the whole school day were taught only half the day, a thing bad for both teachers and scholars, and even then some hundreds of children (I cannot give you the precise number at the present moment) could not obtain admission.

The condition grows worse every day, for new buildings

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are constantly being erected and hundreds of families are moving into this district.

Now, is it necessary that we should wait for long and tedious condemnation proceedings? Is it not worth while to secure some site at once and proceed to build without a moment's delay? Even if it should cost a little more to build in this manner, is it not worth doing? If business men were doing this for their own use and advantage, one school, if not two, would be erected and ready for use by next autumn. I beg that your Honor will do what you can to help our children.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION:-

The Committee on By-Laws and Legislation to which was referred the communication of Mr. Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller, dated February 1, 1897, with power to adopt a form of certificate certifying that the provisions of Article 5, Section 9 of the Constitution of the State of New York had been fully complied with in so far as the same were applicable to the employees of the Board of Education, herewith present their report.

Your Committee have conferred with the Board of Civil Service, and with the Corporation Counsel, in reference to the proper application of the principles contained in the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, dated January 13, 1897, as affecting the employees of the Board of Education.

The conclusion of your Committee is that all appointments and promotions of principals and teachers are properly made by the Board of School Superintendents under the rules and by-laws of the Board of Education, and that the examinations and eligible list by means of which the appointments and promotions of principals and teachers are made, are in full compliance with the requirements of the constitution as to appointments and promotions in the Civil Service of the State as applied to our principals and teachers.

In regard to appointments and reappointments of employees other than principals and teachers which have been made since the first day of June, 1896, your Committee has received from the Clerk of the Board a list of such appointments

and reappointments, a copy of which is herewith submitted.

Your Committee has also received from the Clerk of the Board and the Superintendent of School Buildings a statement of the examinations to which the applicants for these various offices have been subjected before appointment, and, in the opinion of your Committee, these examinations in the case of all candidates for offices which under the constitution are subject to Civil Service examination, complied with the requirements of the constitution. At the time these appointments were made the Civil Service Board had not acted in the premises, and while the examinations referred to were therefore not conducted by that Board, they were nevertheless examinations for the purpose of ascertaining the merit and fitness of the candidates.

Your Committee has accordingly adopted the following form of certificate:-

"The Committee of By-Laws and Legislation do hereby certify that all the appointments and promotions of officers and subordinates of the Board of Education provided for in Section 3, Chapter 387 of the laws of 1896, and of principals and teachers in the schools, and for whose appointment and promotion provision is made in such act, have been made in accordance with the provisions of Act 5, Section 9 of the Constitution of the State of New York.

We do further certify that all persons named in the accompanying pay rolls who have been appointed subsequent to the taking effect of the Civil Service regulations, have been duly appointed in conformity with the requirements of those regulations and

that all civil service regulations applicable to the persons and positions named on said pay-roll have been duly complied with."

The foregoing certificate duly executed by the Committee has been affixed to the recapitulation^{of} the principals' and teachers' pay rolls and to the respective pay rolls of all other Departments of the Board of education .

As under the conclusion reached by the Corporation Counsel the Board of Education will continue to act in respect to appointments and promotions of principals and teachers as a Civil Service Board, it will be necessary that the same certificate shall continue to be affixed to future pay rolls. There appears, however, to be no occasion for requiring its repeated execution by the members of the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation as its execution by the Committee ordinarily charged with the certification of the pay rolls will answer the same purpose.

The conclusion reached by the Corporation Counsel in relation to all the employees of the Board except teachers and principals is that these employees are subject to classification and examination by the City Civil Service Board. In accordance with that conclusion that Board adopted a resolution on the 2nd of February, 1897, recommending to the Mayor that the classification of the civil service of the City of New York be amended by adding thereto "the Board of Education" and classifying therein all the positions held under the Board of Education except principals and teachers.

Your Committee has carefully examined the pro-

posed classification and recommends the approval of the same with the following exception.

In our opinion the Superintendent of School Buildings and the Assistant Superintendents should be taken from Schedule "D" and Schedule "F" respectively, and classed under Schedule "A". The Supervisors of special branches who have been omitted accidentally from the classification should also be classed under Schedule "A". In all other respects we recommend the approval of the classification proposed by the Civil Service Commission to the Mayor.

Under the regulations of the Civil Service Commission Schedule "A" includes all positions not subject to competitive or other examinations.

It is the opinion of this Committee that better officers will be obtained for the positions of Assistant Superintendents, Supervisors of special branches and Superintendent of School Buildings, by classing these officers in Schedule "A", and subjecting all applicants to an examination of their record, general reputation and personal capacity, to be conducted by a Committee of this Board, then would be the result if these candidates were required to submit to a competitive Civil Service examination resulting in their taking rank on an eligible list. Our reasons for this conclusion are stated at length in the communication from the Committee to the Hon. Evart P. Wheeler, Chairman of the Civil Service Commission, dated February 8, 1897, a copy of which is herewith submitted.

In conclusion your Committee submits for adoption the following resolution:

1st. That the form of certificate adopted by the Committee on By Laws and Legislation in the foregoing report be approved, and that the ^{appropriate} Committee ~~on~~ when certifying the pay rolls be, and the same are hereby, authorized to affix the said Civil Service certificate to the said pay rolls, or a recapitulation thereof, on receiving proof satisfactory to the said Committee that the facts therein stated are true.

2nd. That it is the judgment of this Board that the offices of City Superintendent, Assistant Superintendents, Supervisor of special branches and Superintendent of School Buildings, should under the constitution and the law be classed as not subject to competitive or other examination, and should therefore be classed by the Civil Service Board, under Schedule "A", and that in all other respects the classification proposed by the Civil Service Commission for the City of New York be, and the same is hereby, approved.

3rd. That the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation be authorized on behalf of the Board of Education to request his Honor, the Mayor, to classify the said offices of City Superintendent, Assistant Superintendents, Supervisor of Special Branches and Superintendent of School Buildings, under Schedule "A" of the classification of the Civil Service Board of the City of New York applicable to the Board of Education.

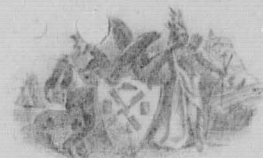

WHEREAS, The women teachers of the public schools of the City of New York, who number nearly 4,000 of the aggregate number of 4,327 teachers employed in the public schools, have presented to the Legislature of the State a petition asking for the enactment of a law that shall provide for a material increase of their compensation as such teachers: and

WHEREAS, It is apparent from careful investigations made that the women teachers are the most poorly paid of the employees of the City Government, while the character and quality of their work is not cheap, light, nor of trifling moment; but, on the contrary, is of inestimable value and importance, because it relates to the training, culture and character of the 200,000 children now under said teachers' immediate care and to their gradual development from childhood to manhood and womanhood: and

WHEREAS, The quality and high character of the work done by the women teachers is constant, exacting, perplexing and exhaustive (as it often is) and comes within the personal observation and knowledge of the Inspectors of the Public Schools, in the course of their official duties: therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the "Association of Inspectors of Common Schools" of the City of New York, in justice to and for the best interests of the public schools, with respect to the well being of the pupils as well as the teachers, demand that said petition be favorably considered and acted upon by the Legislature.

Replying further to your letter of the 16th inst., relating to the proposition of purchasing the Columbia College property as a site for the purpose of the College of the City of New York, and also to the use of part of the Cooper Union property for the purpose of a manual training high school, I am directed by the Board of Education to say:

That by reason of the probable extension of terminal facilities of the New York Central and Hudson River Road, together with the proximity of the tracks, and also on account of the alterations that would be made necessary in order to provide properly for carrying on the work, the purchase of said property is undesirable. Furthermore, the Board of Trustees of the College of the City of New York had already proceeded too far in the acquirement of a site in the extreme upper part of the City to make possible the consideration of other sites.

With reference to the Cooper Union proposition: While there has been no formal declaration with reference to your suggestion, nevertheless there seem to be reasons that are quite controlling as to why we should not occupy this property. 



The Board has been asked to approve these bills and order their payment.

As the charges for the special counsel, \$1500. in each case, are three times as large as similar allowances made at the same time and in similar proceedings to other counsel, the Board of Education has declined to approve the bills of Mr. Thomas Allison without satisfactory proof that the charges for special counsel are reasonable.

It appears from an examination of the proceedings for the taxation of these costs and expenses that the same were taxed without any proof of the services rendered other than the certificate of the

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
