At a meeting of your Committee on Pavements held on June 11th 1913 the following resolutions were passed:

"WHEREAS, This Committee, appointed during October 1911, has made two reports, dated respectively in March 1912 and in December 1912 which have been duly submitted to His Honor, the Mayor, and

WHEREAS, with the approval of His Honor, the Mayor, the bills proposed by this Committee in its report were duly introduced at the last session of the Legislature but without action being taken thereon, and

WHEREAS, These reports and their recommendations for action in the judgment of the Committee consummate the task which it was appointed to undertake, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that this Committee does hereby express its thanks to His Honor, the Mayor, for its appointment and for the opportunity of endeavoring to promote the welfare of the city in the matter of pavements; and further


RESOLVED, that said Committee hereby resigns and that the Secretary be instructed to transmit to His Honor, the Mayor, a copy of these resolutions with the request that such resignation be accepted and that the discharge of the Committee be confirmed."

The bills which we introduced in Albany had a hearing but they were opposed by representatives of four of the Borough Presidents and the Committee thought it best not to report them.

Your Committee think they have done something towards improving the pavements of the City but not as much as they had hoped.





Sir:-

I hereby resign from the Board of Managers of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, which resignation will take effect immediately.

Four vacancies have existed in the Board for a very long time and you have refused to fill them or any of them, although the law specifically required you to fill three of them in the month of January last. I called this matter to your attention by letter dated February 8th, 1913, and the excuse you gave for refusing to obey the law was that you were having the "institution investigated".

This of course was no excuse at all, as you very well knew. Any normal mind can see, and therefore you saw, that there is no connection between the two, since you were at liberty to appoint any one you might choose.

However, your investigation is now over. The report of the investigators, a copy of which I have, has been in your hands for a week and yet you have neglected to fill the vacancies on

the Board.

Because of your deliberate refusal to act, the regular meeting for April went over for want of a quorum, and important committee work is hampered and neglected. I favor an abolition of the school under proper conditions, but think this result should be accomplished in an orderly and businesslike way - not through a course of executive inaction and neglect of duty.

You have shown yourself indifferent to the interests of the School and hostile and unfair to its managers in the above way and in countless other ways and I will not, therefore, be further responsible for the School under your administration of the City's business.


