Indictment for assault in the first degree.

Thomas Mulligan sworn and examined.

Where do you live? No. 76 Sandford Street, Brooklyn.

What is your business? Engineer at 334 East 45th Street between First and Second Avenues in this city, I work at a brewery. Tell us whether or not you met this defendant Egan on the 3th of November last? yes. Where did you meet him? 38th Street and First Avenue, I was on my way home, I live in Brooklyn. What time of day was it? About a quarter past six. Under what circumstances did you meet him and who else was there when you met him? His wife, I met his wife first, I was standing on the street talking to her and he came up and said, "this is nice, isn't it?" I says, "what is that?" He said, "you talking to her." I said, "why, I did not think there was any harm about that." He says "where did you have her the night of the Brewers picnic?" I says, "I had her in Thurd Avenue and had something to eat." He said, "did not you have her in a house in 27th Street and Madison Avenue?" I says, "no", and he said. "she says Oh yes you did"; so I says, "that will do me with you " I went out in the street to take a car to the ferry and I got shot by Micheal Egan.

Cross Examined. How long have you known the Defendant Egan? A couple of years I guess, I was not a fellow-workman with him. How did you come to know him? He has been working around the place where I have been working a little. When did you first meet his wife?

Last August, I believe. Where did you meet her? Passing the engine room where I work, she was alone and she bowed to me, I was looking out of the window. Had you ever seen her before? No; she stood talking to me when she passed up and down there; I did not know then that she was the wife of Micheal Egan but she told me afterwards that she was. You told her that you knew Micheal Egan did you? Yes, I believe I did, I parted with her then, she used to pass there every day pretty much, I did not out to speak to her. When did you go to her house first? It was one Saturday I believe; I did not tell her that I came to see her husband, she asked me to go, I did not know that her husband was out, I guess it was six o'clock I went there, when I was going home from work, I do not know that he goes home at five o'clock. Was it not two o'clock in the afternoon when you went there? No; nothing took place there at that time. How long did you stay there? Probably half an hour. In her room, was her child there? Yes. When did you next see her? I saw her pretty much every day. Has not her husband told you and sent word to you time and time again to keep away from his wife? No, he told me once that I should kick her away if I found her around there. Did not your boss say to you that if you did not keep away from Egan's wife and leave her alone, you would lose your job, or anything to that effect? No, he ever told me anything of the kind, he never spoke to me about it. On the night of the Brewers Ball I took her to a house in 27th Street and had connection with her. I am a married man; this was not after he told me to keep away from his wife, I do not suppose I

ever spoke twice to him in my life, I have no children and have been married five years, I could not say whether Egan knows my wife or not, I do not think so. You knew all the time that you were seducing this married woman and that she was the wife of your friend? Yes. I was about to take the horse car when I was shot I did not make a punch at him. I did not see the pistol that has been produced in Court here in the defendant's hand. Did he make any threat against you? He told me he would fix me. How long before you left the gutter was that? Just a minute or half a minute. Was anybody else standing around that corner? I did not see anybody but his wife. Did you ever make any arrangements with this woman to go around to your place of business? No, I was on night work for five nights in the week and she would be around there. Where does she live? She lives in 40th Street between First and Second Avenues and my place is 44th Street between First and Second Avenues, four blocks away. How old is this woman? That I could not say, about eighteen or nineteen I never took her to any house of improper character except the one occasion in a house in 27th Street on the night of the ball. How long had you known her then? A month or so. Did you see a pistol in this man's hand? Yes, after I got shot I turned around, the bullet hit me in the back, it hurt me, it went through here (pointing) and it is resting in my breast now.

Bernard Mularchy sworn and examined.

I am connected with the 21st precinct police of this city, I did not arrest the defendant, he came to the Station House and gave himself up after the complaint had

been lodged, he came the next morning. I was not there, I met them coming down from the Station House on the way to the hospital to have the prisoner identified by the complainant, the complainant at that time was in Bellevue Hospital. I asked the defendant how he came to shoot him and he said he had seduced his wife, he said first he was flirting with her. The officers who were with me went searching around the next morning near where the shooting occurred and found the pistol, Officer Hennelly. I was in the Hospital and present at the identification. Did you have any further conversation with the defendant? I asked him how he came to shoot the complainant and he said that he done it in self-defence, that the complainant tried to "strike him when she accused him of flirting with his wife. He did not tell me at that time what he did with the pistol but at another time he said that he throw it away after the shooting, he said he threw it in the lumber, I showed him this pistol and he identified it as the one with which he did the shooting..

Helena Lubecksworn and examined for the Defence, testified: I live at 342 East 40th Street and am Egan's mother-in-law, he married my daughter, she is home pretty near four weeks with a cancer, she has one child pretty nearly three years old, a boy. I know Mulligan from coming to see my daughter a couple of times. I was janitor at that time of two houses and one time at about seven o'clock in the morning when I was sweeping the sidewalk he walked into the front room, I asked my daughter who that man was and she said the engineer at

Mr. Opperman's Brewery, I did not know what he came for.

On another occasion on Sunday morning, my daughter sleeps in the same bed with me, I woke up and I heard a voice in the front room, I asked my daughter who was there and she said Mulligan, I laid down again and in about half an hour after I woke up and I found my son-in-law at the foot of my bed looking toward the first bed-room where Mulligan and my daughter were sitting together on two chairs. Egan went into the front room and talked to Mulligan and said, "did I not tell you often not to follow my wife any more." He said, "I did not think it was any harm to come here, I had to tell her something." Then Mulligan went out, this was about a month before the shooting. Mulligan told me "he had no wife, that his wife died five weeks ago and that he lived with her sister in Brooklyn. My daughter is not here, she is sick in bed.

Cross Examined. Mulligan is the only man that I ever saw in those rooms with my daughter. Egan did not go out with Mulligan, Mulligan went out of the front room, Mr. Egan looked in the window as he came in, Egan did not do anything to Mulligan, he only talked to him. My son-in-law is out on bail, I am a widow, my husband is dead three years.

Helen Seifert sworn.

I am the first cousin of Egan's wife, I know Mulligan only by seeing him waiting for Mrs. Egan and me when we came home from work, he waited for her almost every evening, she worked with me a couple of months, Mulligan used to work evenings, I walked away home.

Cross Examined. I worked in the cigar factory at 402 East 64th Street, we used to meet Mulligan between 40th and 42nd Streets on First Avenue, I live with my aunt 342 East 40th Street. My cousin would meet him two or three times every week in the evenings. Did you on your way home ever pass the brewery of Mr. Opperman? No. How many blocks below East 40th Street was it? Two blocks. In order to get down by that brewery you had to go two blocks out of your way. We did not go down to the brewery we passed 40th and 42nd Streets where this man used to wait for us in the evening and he would be waiting there while we come down. You say that it was the nights that he was at work? Yes. How do you know anything about whether he was doing night work or not, how did you find that out? My cousin told me. And that was only on the nights that he was on night duty that he met you there, is that right, the three times that you refer to? Yes. How long was your cousin working with you in 402 East 64th Street? About three months, she did not work steadily there, she worked off and on. What at, stripping tobacco. Yes, the same thing as I did, she would see him three times regularly every week. You do not know anything about the times she saw him when you were not there? No. I mean to say that I was with my cousin three times in one week in the evening when she met Mulligan and these meetings lasted every week.

Frederick Opperman, Jr. sworn.

Mulligan worked for me, I know Egan; I recollect him coming to me and asking me to tell Mulligan to leave his wife alone, to keep away from his wife, this was about a month

before the shooting, I did not tell Mulligan so but I told my chief engineer who is over Mulligan.

The Court struck out the evidence of this witness.

Otto G. Fuch sworn. I am a plumber at 239 East 42nd Street and know ~~him~~ about nine years, he worked steadily for me and he has a first class character for peaceableness and quietness.

The Jury rendered a verdict of guilty of assault in the third degree with a recommendation to mercy
