My dear Sir:

About six years ago I was introduced to you by Mr. Chas. Sweeney of Teft, Weller & Co., as one of the reliable men to organize the Second Assembly District Business Men's Republican organization of the City and County of New York, and did my work subject to the orders and programme given at that time by our Leaders of which you was the principal one, and as the enterprise did not meet with any great success. 

Dear Sir:

It is a matter of common report that Col. Michael C. Murphy and his friends are engaged in an effort to secure his retention or re-appointment as Excise Commissioner. Believing that it is your plan to appoint only fit men to office and assuming that you will welcome information touching the fitness of any applicant I take the liberty of submitting a statement of facts which, in my opinion, should preclude the possibility of Col. Murphy's continuance in the office he now holds.

During the past summer one Sarah Goodman, wife of Joseph Goodman, sold to Richard Bergmann the two saloons then located at 61 Pike Street and 242 Broome Street. Mr. Bergmann paid for them in cash and credit not less than \$5,000. Soon after the sale Mr. Bergmann made an application to the Board of Excise for the transfer of the licenses to himself, but at this point he was met by an objection on the part of the Goodmans. They had re-

2

pented of their bargain and wished to retain the saloons, but they did not even offer a return of the consideration . Their first step was to bring an action against Bergmann in the Court of Common Pleas asking for an injunction to restrain him from dealing with the saloons . The injunction was refused by Judge Bischoff and Bergmann was declared to be the owner of the property. Next the Goodmans refused to vacate either of the premises and they were in consequence lawfully dispossessed from both. Then the Goodmans unlawfully re-took possession of the premises in the nighttime . They were arrested therefor , held by Police Justice Simms in heavy bail and finally they surrendered possession to Bergmann but refused to give him the licenses . All this took place between July 1 and August 29.

On the latter date I, as attorney for Mr.Bergmann , made an application to the Board of Excise , for the cancellation of the licenses held by the Goodmans and the re-issuance of others in their stead to Bergmann . After three adjournments which were granted for no good reason and against my will the matter came on for a long hearing on September 18, before Commissioners Murphy and Dalton . Mr. Bergmann testified to all of the facts stated above and no testimony whatever was offered on behalf of the Goodmans. At the conclusion of the hearing Col. Murphy requested of Commissioner Dalton that the matter be left

in his(Murphy's) hands, and this was done, Commissioner Dalton at the same time signifying his readiness to grant Mr. Bergman's application . A few days later the Counsel to the Board wrote and filed an opinion in favor of granting the application.

Under these circumstances I reasonably expected a speedy settlement of the matter in favor of my client. In this, however, I was disappointed . Almost every day from the 18th of September until the 1st of November , about six weeks, either Mr. Bergmann or someone from my office visited the Excise Board to learn if the matter had been decided , only to receive a negative. During all this time Col. Murphy was receiving behind closed doors Goodman and his friends (consisting of the remarkable coterie who have made the Essex Market Court and the East Side notorious) , listening to their alternate promises and threats of political friendship or enmity and pusillanimously delaying the performance of his official duty . At last Mr. Bergmann after a loss of not less than \$1000 in rents , wages and profits , and tired out by the seemingly indefinite and unlawful postponement of his rights , was compelled to pay the Goodmans a further and large sum of money to obtain what he had previously and honestly bought and paid for. Then their oppositions were withdrawn and the licenses were issued to Bergmann.

*

I know of no language Mr. Mayor , strong enough to fitly condemn the action of Col. Murphy in this matter . At the solicitation of shabby politicians and yielding to sinister influences , in violation of his oath ofn office, in disregard of the statute , the evidence of every rule of decency he outraged the rights and destroyed the business opportunities of an honest and reputable citizen who had asked only honest official action at his hands .

In conclusion, Mr. Mayor, I wish to say that during his ~~unconscious~~ tenure of office Col. Murphy, an unconscionable politician , has habitually used his powers as Commissioner of Excise as a means of political coercion , and has for political purposes played shuttlecock with the business interests and property rights of those who were compelled to submit their controversies to the arbitrament of the Board of Excise. If continued in office he will continue his pernicious practices to the disgrace of New York and to the loss and damage of her ~~liquor~~ liquor dealing citizens .

I therefore earnestly protest against his retention or re-appointment and I beg leave to subscribe myself






