Kate Peralizheim sworn. I live 123 West 28th St.
I saw the defendant Byrne on the 10th of December, I saw
three men on the corner of 57th Street and 7th Avenue in
this city at two o'clock in the afternoon, I had about
sixty dollars in my purse and my purse in my hand, Tooley
came up back of me and knocked my hand and snatched the
purse out of it, I would not like to say surely that Too-
ley was one of three boys I saw at the corner, I did not
look at him going down for they were all back of me but I
saw the boy that took my purse, Byrne was with another boy
when I turned round, I have not seen my pocket-book since.
I had Tooley arrested, he ran, the other boys stood on the
corner while he passed, they did nothing and I went up and
spoke to them. Byrne was there at the time, I told them
that they were accomplices because the boy touched them
almost, they did not try to stop him, the taller boy said
that he would go and catch him and he ran away and did not
come back any more, Byrne did not do anything except he
stood in a crowd, the policeman came along and there was
quite a number of people around but nobody seemed to do
anything much; the lady that was with me and myself were
advised by some gentleman to go down to the police station
and describe the boys, which we did, I saw Byrne next at
the police station on Sunday about four o'clock in the
afternoon.

0735

Byrne was not with Tooley when he snatched my pocket-book
he did not run away, I spoke to him.

John E. Lavless sworn. I am an officer of the
23rd precinct and arrested Byrne on December 10th going
down 9th Avenue about half past seven in the evening on
the complaint of the last witness, I asked him about the
taking of the pocket-book and he and Tooley whom I arrested
at the same time, denied it, I searched Tooley and found
on him \$7.52, a pawn ticket and a collar button, I searched
Byrne and found on him \$12.33, a laundry ticket, an old
watch and chain and two two cent postage stamps. While
patrolling my post up Broadway I saw Byrne, Tooley and man-
other one that I did not know, they walked up together and
were standing quietly and walked away, I went up to the
Manhattan Rink and I saw the crowd and the lady had went
down to the Station House, Detective Reilly came up and
said there had been a robbery,, I asked Reilly the descrip-
tion of the three boys and they answered the description
exactly of the three whom I saw; the captain told me to put
on my citizen's clothes and go out, I went with Detective
Reilly and we got these two, Reilly went after the other
one but did not succeed in getting him. The robbery took
place at two o'clock and they were arrested at half past
seven together, they both denied all knowledge of it.

Kate Feralizheim recalled. The sixty dollars
were all five and ten dollar bills and I had some small
change, I had two or three flat permits, an order for the
theater on a piece of paper and I had a box of French lip

salve and two two cent postage stamps and two or three little foreign coins.

The Case for the Defence.

William Tooley sworn. I live 430 West 56th Street which is about five blocks from the corner I was standing at with the other two boys, Byrne was standing on the corner talking to me when this lady passed by, the third boy was named McCormick, this was about two o'clock in the afternoon on 57th Street and Broadway. Byrne came along and I says to him hello and asked him where he was going? He said he was going up the avenue and he stood there talking to me for a while, I saw this lady pass, she came across Broadway, she did not see me nor anyone else, I followed her up and when she was near 7th Avenue, three-quarters of a block from Broadway I took her pocket-book out of her hand; she identified me by a blue coat, Detective Reilly said if I stood my trial he would give me fifteen years or know the reason why. There was another lady with her, I did not tell these two boys what I was going to do. We were standing five minutes on the corner before the ladies came along, I have used the contents of the pocket-book since I have been confined in the Tombs, I was searched in the Station House but all my money was not taken, they found seven dollars in my pantspocket and I had the rest of it in a coat pocket, inside, I had the bills and the two postage stamps, the pocket-book contained fifty-eight dollars, I used the postage stamps in the Tombs, I sent letters to a lady friend of mine in East 56th Street, Miss Donohue. I didnot give any of the contents of that pocket-book to Byrne, I saw him again

0737

that night about eight o'clock and asked him to have a drink and on the way down we were arrested. He asked me what I done it for, I told him it was none of his business I stole a pocket-book, we were both arrested together, corner of 5th Street and 9th Avenue, I swear that Byrne knew nothing of what I was going to do that afternoon, he is innocent of it, I have pleaded guilty to this charge.

Cross Examined. Byrne was three-quarters of a block from me when I took the pocket-book, I bought shirts and underclothing with some of the money, I have never stolen a pocket-book before, I have known Byrne by sight three weeks, I don't know where he got the money that was in his pocket.

David McMullen sworn. I reside 313 West 37th Street, am a decorative painter, know Byrne about four years, he and his father have worked for me and as far as I know he is a good, industrious boy, I never heard of his being arrested.

Cornelius Ford sworn. I reside 437 West 34th Street am a house and sign painter and know Byrne for five years, he has been in my employ and I found him faithful and industrious, I never knew of his being arrested.

William Hepburn sworn. I reside 339 West 43rd St. and am a house painter, I know Byrne four or five years, he has been in my employ and was industrious and faithful, I do not know of his being arrested before.

0738

Patrick H. Byrne sworn! I live at 338 Seventh Avenue and am a grainer, my son is the defendant and he worked for a couple of weeks previous to his arrest, I always found him strictly honest, I had him arrested once because he was keeping company I did not like, the charge was for taking five cents from a boy, he might have been arrested more than once but he was never convicted of anything in his life.

Water J. Byrne sworn. I reside 303 West 49th Street and am a brother of the defendant, he has been in my employ and his character has been first class in every particular, he was working a couple of weeks previous to his arrest, I believe it was the day that he was arrested I paid him fifteen dollars for seven and a half days work, about nine o'clock in the morning at 303 West 49th Street.

Cross Examined. I should say my brother was arrested twice, the policeman in the precinct was prejudiced against him. It was through me that my father gave information to the police about him, we wanted him to keep his nose to the grindstone, we wanted to get all the work out of the boy, my father made the charge of taking five cents from a boy, my brother was never convicted of anything in his life, he had free access to the best houses in New York when we were working in them, where he had to be honest or he could not work.

J. Harry Byrne sworn. I am a brother of the defendant and was present in my brother's house on the 19th of December when fifteen dollars was paid to him and

0739

twenty to me about half past nine in the morning.

Cross Examined. I do not know what he did with the fifteen dollars. My brother and I went to Cooperstown in this state we were from the 25th of August to the 3d of October, I know he had occasion to write home during the time he was absent, I remember of his buying eight or nine postage stamps, he returned shortly before me to New York.

William Byrne sworn and examined. I am seventeen years old, on this day in question I met Tooley and another boy on 57th Street and Broadway, Tooley asked me where I was going, I told him no place in particular that I had to go down to the house after a while to get some tools. Then he walked away and I stood talking to this other boy. and I saw him run in ; when he got down to me I asked him what was the matter and he kept on running right past me and the other boy ran after him; the lady came down and asked me and asked the crowd if they knew who that boy was, nobody told her who he was. That night I met him in a dance at 54th Street and 9th Avenue and asked him what made him do anything like that while I was around? He asked me to have a drink and when we were walking down to the corner the officer arrested us. That morning I was paid fifteen dollars by my brother and had \$12.30 cents on me when I was arrested, the postage stamps that were found in my pocket I bought when I was in Cooperstown, I bought eight and wrote home four or five times, I returned to the city about the 5th of September, Tooley and I had no conversation before we parted about robbing the lady, he did not say to me that he intended to do it and I did not know

0740

he intended to do anything of the kind, I received none of the proceeds of the robbery and was never convicted of any crime in my life.

Cross Examined. I spent over two dollars in a liquor store and paid a bar-keeper sixty cents that I owed him. I was arrested once on a charge of burglary and as I knew nothing at all about it I was discharged.

Mary Byrne sworn. I am the sister of the defendant and keep house for my father at 822 Seventh Avenue, I remember my brother being at the house on the morning of the 19th of December. When he worked for my brother he paid his board and when he worked for my father he did not.

John E. Lawless recalled. By Counsel. officer, did you approach me out by the stair-case and did you say to me, "I guess we will get that young fellow off?" No sir.

Stephen S. Blake and Thomas J. Sullivan, counsel for the prisoner, both testified that the officer said to them on the stair-case, "we ought to get him off" or "we will get him off".

The Jury rendered a verdict of guilty of grand larceny in the second degree.

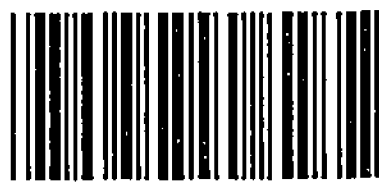
