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BY MR. STERN:

Just for the purpose of identifying everybody in the room; my name is Herbert Stern I'm an assistant district attorney in the Homicide Bureau, New York County. This is Mr. Joseph Renda who's operating the stenograph machine, he's also employed by the District Attorney's Office. Sir, would you state your name?

MR. BEAVERS: Charles T. Beavers, 209 West 125th Street, attorney for Mr. Johnson.

Q What is your name?

A Thomas Johnson.

MR. STERN: What is your name, sir?

DETECTIVE: John Keeley, Manhattan Homicide Squad.

MR. STERN: What is your name?

DETECTIVE: Ferdinand Cavallaro, 34th Squad.

Q Mr. Johnson, I understand that you didn't want to speak with anyone in authority until such a time as your lawyer was present; is that correct, sir?

A Yes.

Q Now, Mr. Beavers is here and I understand you've had an opportunity to confer with him; is that true? Did you have an opportunity to speak with him?

A Yes, I have spoke with him.

Q Now, in the presence of your attorney I'd like to ask you certain questions concerning the fatal shooting of Malcolm X, more particularly the shooting took place on February 21st, 1965, that was a Sunday. Do you recall where you were that Sunday?

MR. BEAVERS: On advice of counsel my client refuses to answer any questions other than giving his name and address.

MR. STERN: Would you mind if he would say that rather than you?

MR. BEAVERS: On advice of counsel you refuse to answer any questions on the grounds that it might incriminate you. Go ahead and say it.

A On advice of counsel I refuse to answer any questions on the grounds it might tend to incriminate me.

Q Now Mr. Johnson, you understand that you have a right to an attorney and you do not have to speak to us if you don't want to; you understand that?



A Right.

Q However, you also have a right if you feel there is some information that you have that may exonerate you or maybe help the police in ascertaining your innocence. You have a perfect right to speak also; you understand that, don't you?

A (No response)

Q Would you please answer so the record can be clear?

A Yes --.

MR. BEAVERS: You refuse to answer any questions on the grounds it may tend to incriminate you, that's the only answer you gave at this point.

Q I'm not arguing with you, I'm not arguing with your attorney but in the end able counsel can give you advice as he see fit and in the end it's you that will have to determine for yourself whether or not your answers were in fact incriminating you, whether or not you want to give the authorities information which can be useful in ascertaining your innocence; you understand that? Do you understand what I am saying anyway?

A (No response)

Q In other words, if your information will help establish your innocence --I'm sorry, I didn't hear you.

MR. BEAVERS: I was talking to him.

A He was talking to me.

Q Your attorney has advised you of your rights. You have a right to your attorney's advice. In the end it's

your decision to make. I don't think your attorney would object to that statement. Do you understand what I am saying?

A (Witness nodding head.)

Q Your shaking your head affirmative. Now, is there any information you have now as to where you were at that time or any information as to your innocence that you care to give us?

MR. BEAVERS: Refuse to answer.

Q It's your decision to make.

A I refuse to answer on the grounds it may tend to incriminate me.

MR. BEAVERS: Might tend to incriminate him. He's taking the 5th.

MR. STERN: In other words, you fear that his answers to those questions might tend to incriminate --.

A Yes.

MR. STERN: Thank you very much.

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BY MR. STERN:

Q For the record my name is Herbert Stern, I'm an assistant district attorney assigned to the Homicide Bureau of New York County District Attorney's Office. The man operating the machine is also employed by the District Attorney's Office, his name is Joseph Renda. This is Detective Confrey of the Homicide Squad. Sir, what is your name?

MR. BEAVERS: Charles T. Beavers, 209 West 125th Street.

Q What is your name?

A Etta Johnson.

Q How do you spell it?

A E-T-T-A-

Q And your last name?

A J-O-H-N-S-O-N-.

MR. BEAVERS: She refuses to answer any questions on advice of counsel. Is she under arrest?

MR. STERN: Of course not.

MR. BEAVERS: She refuses to answer any questions on advice of counsel.

MR. STERN: Mr. Beavers, are you representing Mrs. Johnson?

MR. BEAVERS: At this moment I'm representing her.

MR. STERN: You understand she's not being accused of any crime. There is no finger of accusation pointed against her. Well, I repeat to you as the man in charge of the investigation for the District Attorney's Office do you still say you advise her not to answer any questions?

MR. BEAVERS: On advice of counsel she refuses to answer any questions.

MR. STERN: Even though she's only a witness?

MR. BEAVERS: Under any circumstances she refuses to answer any questions.

MR. STERN: Including her address?

MR. BEAVERS: Yes. On advice of counsel she refuses to answer any questions.

MR. STERN: For the record, at this time I'm now serving Mrs. Johnson, Etta Johnson, who refuses to give her address, I am now serving her with a Grand Jury Subpoena to attend the Grand Jury session, hearing the case of People vs. John Doe, tomorrow the 4th of March, before the number 3rd Grand Jury. As I say this Grand Jury is presently

inquiring into the case against John Doe et al,  
investigating into the fatal shooting of Malcolm  
X. The subpoena is dated in the presence of her  
attorney. On the record, I am not serving her  
a subpoena.

MR. BEAVERS: Accept it.

(Witness accepts subpoena)

MR. STERN: Will she attend?

MR. BEAVERS: That's a decision she'll have to  
make at the proper time.

MR. STERN: Thank you.

BY MR. STERN:

Q What is your name, please?

A Edda Johnson.

Q Now, Mrs. Johnson, are you the wife  
to Thomas L5X Johnson?

A Yes, I am.

Q Where do you reside?

A 932 Bronx Park South.

Q Now, Mrs. Johnson, I show you a  
photograph, Grand Jury Exhibit Number 1, and I ask you  
is this a photograph of your husband?

A Yes, it is.

Q Now, Mrs. Johnson, I direct your attention  
to February 21, 1965, and I ask you where you were on  
that date?

A I refuse to answer on the advice of counsel as my  
answer may tend to incriminate me.

Q Now, you are claiming your Fifth  
Amendment privilege against self-incrimination in regard

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to that question?

A Yes, sir.

Q You understand that the grand jury is not investigating any complaint against you and that you are not the target of any investigation?

A Yes, sir.

Q But you claim that the answer to that question would incriminate you; is that correct?

A Yes.

MR. STERN: Mrs. Johnson, I am going to ask that you step out of the room and when you do I will ask the grand jury to confer immunity on you. The grand jury is presently considering a charge of homicide and conspiracy to commit homicide. Under our Penal Law this grand jury, through its foreman, has the power to grant immunity to you by directing you to answer questions. If he does direct you to answer the question, does confer immunity upon you, nothing that you can say can be used against you because

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you could not be prosecuted; do you understand that?

THE WITNESS: I don't quite understand that.

Q In other words, if you are granted immunity by this grand jury you would be immune from prosecution. You could not be prosecuted.

A Right.

Q Under those circumstances your answers could not incriminate you.

A Right.

MR. STERN: Please step out for a minute.

(The witness left the grand jury room.)

MR. STERN: I now ask the grand jury to consider conferring immunity upon this witness.

(Whereupon, Mr. Stern and the stenographer left the grand jury room.)  
and returned shortly thereafter with the witness.)

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THE FOREMAN: You understand that  
you are still under oath?

THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.

Q Now, Mrs. Johnson, I ask you once more,  
where were you on February 21, 1965?

A I refuse to answer on the advice of counsel as my  
answer may tend to incriminate me.

MR. STERN: Mr. Foreman, I ask you  
to please direct the witness to answer that  
question.

THE FOREMAN: Mrs. Johnson, the  
grand jury directs you to answer the  
District Attorney's question with the  
understanding that you are granted immunity  
in so doing.

Q You understand, Mrs. Johnson, just for  
the sake of the record, that you now have immunity,

that anything you say can't possibly be used against you?

A I refuse to answer on the advice of counsel as my  
answer may tend to incriminate me.

Q But you do understand everything that

Johnson

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I and the foreman said; do you not, you understand the words?

A Yes, sir.

Q You understand the concept, don't you?

A Yes.

Q You still, however, refuse to answer?

A I refuse to answer on the advice of counsel as my answer may tend to incriminate me.

Q You understand that if you continue with your refusal you will be brought before the Supreme Court Judge who has convened this grand jury and that you are liable to be prosecuted for contempt for refusing to answer; do you understand?

A I understand.

MR. STERN: Thank you.

(Whereupon, the witness, Mr. Stern,

THE FOREMAN:      Please sit down.

BY MR. STERN :

Q    What is your name, ma'am?

A    Etta Johnson.

Q    Now, Mrs. Johnson, you understand that  
the Judge has directed you to answer all the lawful  
questions of this grand jury, is that correct?

A    Right.

Q    Mrs. Johnson, I direct your attention  
to -- withdrawn.

Where do you live, Mrs. Johnson?

A    932 Bronx Park South.

Q    And who do you live there with?

I  
A    Who do ~~you~~ live with?

Q    Yes.

A    My family, my -- which consists of three girls, and  
one boy, my husband and -- my husband.

Q    Anybody else live there with you?

A    Live there?      No, just my immediate family live there.

Johnson

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Q Are you legally married to the man  
you refer to as your husband, Mr. Johnson?

A Yes, I ma legally married.

Q By whom were you married?

A By whom?

Q Yes, ma'am.

A I don't remember.

Q Was it by a minister?

A By a minister.

Q And in which county were you married?

A Bronx.

Q And in other words a certificate of  
marrige is on file in your name and Mr. Johnson's  
name in the Bronx County, is that correct?

A Right.

Q Now, I direct your attention to February  
21, 1965, on that date, did you remain home all day  
long?

A Yes, sir.

Q Did there ever come a time when you  
left your house that day?

A Not at all.

Q From morning until dark when you woke up in the morning until you went to bed at night you were in your house all day long; is that correct?

A I was home all day.

Q And who else was home with you, or who else was in your house on that day?

A My family.

Q Would you please list who was there?

A What you want me to say?

Q I just want you to say -- I want to ask you on February 21, 1965, during the daytime, did anybody come into your house?

A Come to my house?

Q Yes.

A Yes, sir.

Q Who came to your house?

A Friends.

Q What are the names of these friends?

A Muriel and Edward Long.

Q Spell that please.

A Muriel, Muriel -- Edward 4X Long.

Q Long?

Johnson

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A Husband and wife.

Q Where do they live?

A 932 Bronx Park South.

Q And what time did they come to your house?

A I don't know.

Q You have no idea?

A Time was no factor that day, I really don't know.

Q You have no time when they arrived?

A No, I don't.

Q Could have been the evening for all you know, correct?

A I don't know the time.

Q It could have been dark outside?

A No, it was not dark, but I don't know the time.

Q And how long did they stay?

A I don't know that either.

Q And when they were in your house, was your husband at home at that time?

A I claim privilege communication between husband and wife.

Q I want to advise you of this, Mrs.

Johnson

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Johnson, the law is quite clear, when there were other parties present other than a husband and wife, no privilege could possibly exist. I want to advise you also that privilege can not possibly exist where other parties were present, there could be no confidential privilege at all. Now, you understand that the Judge has told you to answer all these questions, and you understand that you can be held in contempt of this grand jury and summarily returned to the district attorney -- to the Woman's House of Detention.

A Yes, I do.

Q Now, at the time Mr. and Mrs. Long came to your house, was your husband at home?

A I claim privilege communication between husband and wife because we stand as one.

Q At any time did -- at any time during February 21, 1965, did your husband leave your house?

A I claim privilege communication between husband and wife because we stand as one.

Q Did there ever come a time on February 21, 1965 that any other people, other than Mr. and



Mrs. Long came to your house?

A You have to rephrase that. You mean came in my apartment, long at my window, or came to my door, what do you mean to say?

Q Well, start at -- did Mrs. and Mr. Long come inside your apartment?

A Indeed they did.

Q Did any other people come inside your apartment?

A Inside my door, inside to my living room?

Q You understand what an apartment is, ma'am.

A Yes.

Q That's all the rooms you have.

A They can come into -- to the door and still be at my apartment.

Q Did anybody come to your apartment, in your apartment or into your apartment other than Mrs. and Mr. Long?

A No.

Q Did anybody else ring your bell or knock on your window other than Mr. and Mrs. Long?

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A No, sir.

Q Did you have any conversation, on the telephone or in person --

A I don't have --

Q Just a second, please let me finish the question. -- with any other person other than your immediate family or Mr. and Mrs. Long on that date?

A Yes.

Q With whom did you have a -- such a conversation?

A With my mother.

Q Was that on the telephone?

A No.

Q Was that in person?

A Yes.

Q Does she live at home?

A No, she does not live at my apartment.

Q Was she there that day?

A She was visiting.

Q Now, you remember I asked you whether there were any other people present?

A You said did any other people come, but she was there before that date.

Q When did she arrive at your apartment?

A Let me see. I think it was Friday -- Thursday or Friday of that week.

Q And she stayed throughout the week and was there?

A She was -- she is there until now.

Q She is still there?

A Yes.

Q And she was present in your apartment all day on Sunday?

A Of course.

Q Did there come a time while she was present that your husband left the apartment that day?

A I claim privilege communication between husband and wife.

Q Did you see your husband in conversation on that day with any person other than Mr. and Mrs. Long, your mother, yourself and your children?

A I claim privilege communication between husband and wife. And I state I did not say that my husband

A I claim privilege communication between husband and wife.

BY MR. STERN:

Q Now, Mrs. Johnson, do you understand you're  
still testifying under your affirmation?

A Yes.

Q Mrs. Johnson, once again, I direct your  
attention to February 21, 1965. Did there come a time  
during that day when your husband left the apartment?

A Yes, sir.

Q And approximately what time was it that he  
left?

A It was after dinner; it was after sundown and it had  
turned dark.

Q And is there any particular way that you  
remember that?

A Yes.

Q And how is that?

A After dinner we usually have ice cream on Sunday and my  
husband and my daughter went to get ice cream.

Q In other words, he left -- the time that he

left, he left with your daughter?

A Right.

Q And how long after that did he return?

A Oh, about 20 minutes.

Q During the day, on February 21st, did there ever come a time that he left the apartment?

A Not at all.

Q Stayed home all the time?

A All day in pajamas.

Q In his pajamas?

A Right.

Q Was he ill that day?

A No.

Q He just got into his clothing to buy the ice cream; is that correct?

A Right.

Q And during this period of time that he was at home in pajamas your mother was there you say?

A Right.

Q And where does your mother live, ma'am?

A Where does she live?

Q Right.



A At the time she was staying at 982 with a sister of mine.

Q Where is she staying right now?

A Right now at my house visiting because I have to be here and I cannot be at two places at one time.

Q And what is your mother's name?

A Carmelita Simmons.

Q Now, other than yourself, your mother, your husband and your children, nobody else was in your home on that day; is that correct?

A I did not say that. I said friends visit that day.

Q You say -- you said that friends came that --

A Friends came that day.

Q Who were the friends that came that day?

A Muriel X Long and Edward 4X Long.

Q Where do they live?

A 932 Bronx Park South, apartment 1F.

Q What time was it that they came to your apartment?

A Well, I don't know exactly what time. Like I said before the time was no big thing that day for me because this is a day of leisure for us.

Q At what time in the morning, the afternoon or evening?

A Early afternoon when the husband arrived, which the wife was at work, and she came straight from work to my house.

Q So the husband arrived first and then the wife arrived; is that correct?

A Right.

Q And then your best estimate, what time would that be about?

A I really couldn't tell you. I know early afternoon.

Q Would that be 1:00, 2:00, 3:00?

A I don't know.

Q Could it have been 4:00 o'clock?

A Well, the wife had to arrive at my house after 4:00.

Q And the husband, how much before the wife did he arrive?

A Well, I couldn't really say. It was conversation, during conversation, it's no time, you can talk for hours or hour without even thinking of the time. So I really couldn't say.

Q It was after 4:00 that Mrs. Long arrived; is

that right?

A Yes.

Q Did anybody else come to your house that day?

A No.

Q Did you receive any telephone calls that day?

A No. I do not have a phone.

Q Do not have a phone?

A Right.

Q How long did Mr. and Mrs. Long stay?

A Well, being that they live in the same building, Mrs. Long left, I don't know, in the evening. Let me see.

It was late evening and she went downstairs to make some kind of sandwich or something and said that she would be back and he stayed.

Q Then what happened?

A Then we just talked and then they went home and we went to bed.

Q Did they have ice cream with you?

A She took the ice cream home with her; yes.

Q Do you mean when they both left?

A She took a plate of ice cream when she went home.

Q Downstairs with her?

A Downstairs with her, for her to eat downstairs. I don't know whether it was for her or --

Q Her husband stayed upstairs; is that correct?

A He could have eaten it at a later date.

Q In other words --

A At a later hour. I don't know exactly what time. They don't have a freezer that they could put the ice cream.

When he wanted it later on.

Q In other words, just --

A I gave her the ice cream in a plate and she took it, that's all.

Q And she took it downstairs; is that correct?

A Right.

Q And her husband stayed upstairs with you?

A Right.

Q But neither of them ate any ice cream up in your house; right?

A No; he ate something else.

Q And did you, your husband and children have ice cream that night?

A Yes.

Q That was the ice cream that Mr. Johnson had brought back; is that right?

A Right.

Q And do you know where he had to go to buy the ice cream?

A I think the place is on -- it's four blocks from me.

Q Do you know the name of the store?

A No, I do not know the name of the store.

Q Where is it located?

A It's on 180th Street, about two blocks after the -- Southern Boulevard. It's a place that has "Bryan's Ice Cream" on it, a luncheonette.

Q Now, Mrs. Johnson, I like to show you these two photographs and I ask you if you recognize either of the men portrayed in those photographs?

A Yes. I recognize Norman Butler right here, Norman --

Q You are indicating Grand Jury Exhibit 3.

Do you recognize the other photograph?

A I seen that in the papers.

Q But other than that, have you ever met the man?

A Never in my life.



Q Now, has Norman 3X Butler ever been to your home?

A Not to 932 Bronx Park South; no.

Q Has he been to another home?

A When I was living at 1041 Bryant Avenue. He visit when my husband were convalescing from rheumatic fever.

Q And when he came there, was he with his wife or alone?

A He was alone.

Q Has there ever come a time when you, your husband, had visited the home of Mr. and Mrs. Butler?

A No.

MR. STERN: Are there any questions from the grand jury?

Q How was your husband dressed when Mr. Long first came to your apartment?

A Mr. Long first came? My husband had on pajamas and then when his wife arrived, he got his robe.

Q I'm sorry, I can't hear you.

A When his wife arrived he got his robe out of the closet and put it on due to respect.

Q Because she was a woman?



A Right.

Q After that he put on his clothing to go down for ice cream; is that right?

A Right.

Q And about how long after Mrs. Long arrived did he do that?

A I don't know. We just had the television on. I don't know. Maybe we was talking while the television was on, playing with the children, I really don't know. I know she arrived after work which were approximately would be somewhere after 4:30, but he did arrive early afternoon.

Q When was the first time you learned that Malcolm X had been shot; when, what time?

A I don't know because time was --

Q Did you hear it during the day that day?

A What do you mean "during the day"? It was during the day that I heard it on the radio.

Q You did hear it on the radio?

A During the day. What time during the day, I don't know.

Q After you heard it, was there any conversation about it between yourself, your husband and Mr. or

Mrs. Long?

A We were all surprised.

Q All surprised?

A This was the conversation, surprised.

Q "That's awful"?

A Something like that, what happened to him.

Q That's all the conversation, just surprised about it?

A Anything else I really wouldn't remember at this point.

MR. STERN: Are there any other questions? Thank you very much.
