Three days after I sent a my Saleslady for the hat and word was sent that hat was not for it. I received the accompanying envelope & letter in it on Dec 14/80. My wife addressed the letter directed to Capt C. F. Isleton and posted it and Detective O'Connor of Central Office saw deft receive & sign accompanying receipt for it.

(Now here) did wilfully and unlawfully and with intent to extort from this deponent the sum of ~~two hundred and fifty~~ <sup>twenty five hundred</sup> dollars wrote to this deponent the annexed communication therein threatening to communicate and publish to deponent's wife certain allegations contained therein disadvantageous to the personal reputation and business of this deponent. To wit: that he the accused had been informed of visits made by deponent to the wife of the accused and of certain alleged abuse made of a little girl alleged to be in deponent's employ. Of each of which the accused demanded of this deponent in satisfaction the sum of ~~two hundred and fifty~~ <sup>twenty five hundred</sup> dollars. All this in violation of the statute made and offence known as blackmail.

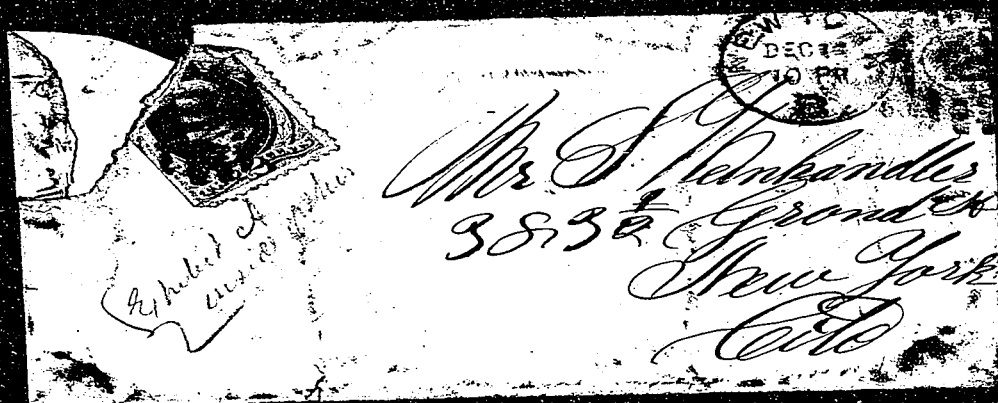

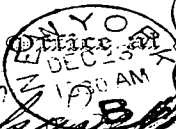

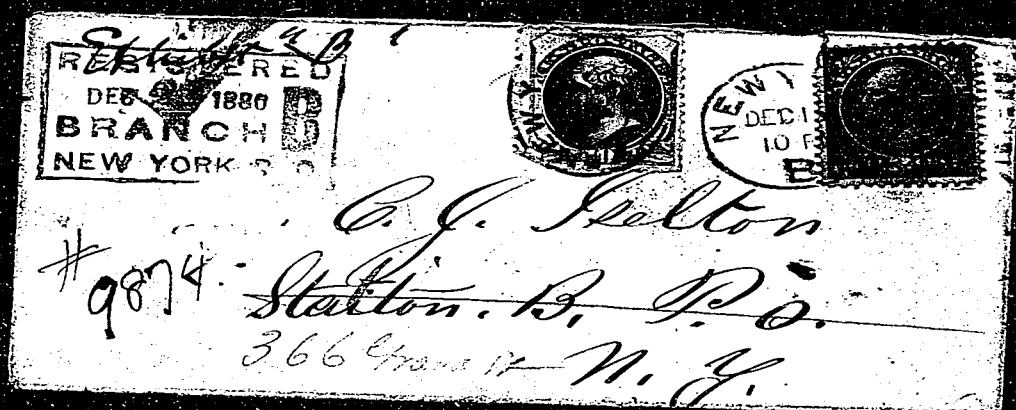
