Officer Stanton who came to my assistance was left by me in charge of the body. I asked in a general way who shot the man. I got no reply. I suspected it was the man in the cigar store. I went to the cigar store where I had put the man & woman out. I found the prisoner in front of his door. I saw him a cigar. His right hand in his pants pocket. I asked him what did he shoot the man for. He made no reply. I asked I told him to take his hand out of his pocket. I said where is the pistol he said in the store.

I took him into the store and went behind the cigar stand. He took it and handed it to me.

I took him into the liquor store then to see if any one could recognize him.

at bet 10 $\frac{1}{2}$  & 11 P.M. Nov 17 - 1880 -

A Friend Bernard Concklin & I were  
standing in the centre of the saloon

Then Mc Cagney came in through the side <sup>door</sup> on 29<sup>th</sup> St. and asked Cucklin & I to have something to drink with him.

I told him we are drinking with Holbro.

Holbro was leaning with his back to a post. Two rows of wine boxes were near the post. I stood alongside of Holbro and Bernard Cucklin stood next to me and Mc Cagney stood next and to the right of Cucklin we were in a line.

On being asked by Mc Cagney to drink we stepped out. Then Mc Cagney saw Holbro. He then said Oh I didn't see you.

Holbro raised his hand with his open palms out and said keep away from me I don't want to have anything to do with you.

Mc Cagney then walked up to Holbro and faced him and said you are a sucker. With respect to the house I'll take down your pants and fuck you.

Mr Burns said "This must be stopped

Cinklin in trying to get out stumbled and fell on the floor I left him there. I did not see any wound on McLagney after the 1<sup>st</sup> shot was fired he was near me and I could see his face.

When Officer McCabill came up I went after him into the saloon. I saw deceased lying on the floor near the door - he was lying on his left side the side of his face was towards me. I went out the Officer went out and into the cigar store.

I went back into the saloon and the Officer returned with Koltmork who was smoking a cigar.

Philip E. Loulin M.D. being sworn says on November 18<sup>th</sup> 1880. I made an Autopsy on the body of deceased James A. McQuagney and found.

A Contused wound nearly circular in shape and three-quarters of an inch in diameter immediately over the Anterior Superior Spine process of the Illium right side.

I also found a bullet wound of right cheek close to the right alae of the nose: the wound was round and one-third of an inch in diameter.

The cheeks, nose and right eye were spotted with burnt gun-powder.

The bullet wound extended through the right side of Superior Maxillary bone - directly upwards - comminuting the bone. The bullet remained and was found immediately outside the cranial cavity.

It had produced a Compound Commuted Fracture of the Anterior wall of the Middle Fosse right side of skull. (base of sphenoid bone).

The Cerebrum Cerebellum Medulla Oblongata & Spinal cord were found congested and bloody serum was found in both Lateral Ventricles.

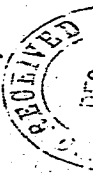
