I found the prisoner in front of his door. I saw him a cigar. His right hand in his pants pocket. I asked him what did he shoot the man for. He made no reply. I asked I told him to take his hand out of his pocket. I said where is the pistol. he said in the store.

I took him into the store and went behind the cigar stands. He took it and handed it to me.

I took him into the liquor store then to see if any one could recognize him.

A Friend Bernard Cucklin & I were standing in the centre of the saloon when Holbrook came in alone and went up to the bar and called for a drink by himself - After that he went out of the saloon returning in about 5 minutes alone when he came in the 2nd time he spoke to Cucklin and asked him to drink and he also asked me to drink.

As we were taking our drink. Cucklin made a remark to him saying ain't you very foolish to be fighting with James over that woman. Holbrook said that McCagney was jealous of him - calling him Jimmy - on account of this woman marking a couple of sheets for my bed.

Holbro was leaning with his back to a post. Two rows of wine boxes were near the post. I stood alongside of Holbro and Bernard Cucklin stood next to me and Mr Cagney stood next and to the right of Cucklin we were in a line.

On being asked by Mr Cagney to drink we stepped out. Then Mr Cagney saw Holbro. He then said Oh! I didn't see you.

Holbro raised his hand with his open palms out and said keep away from me I don't want to have anything to do with you.

Mr Cagney then walked up to Holbro and faced him and said you are a sucker. With respect to the horse. I'll take down your pants and fuck you.
