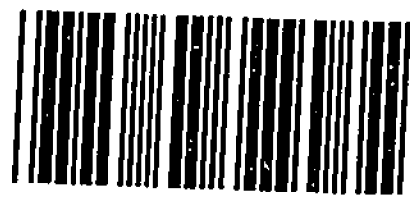

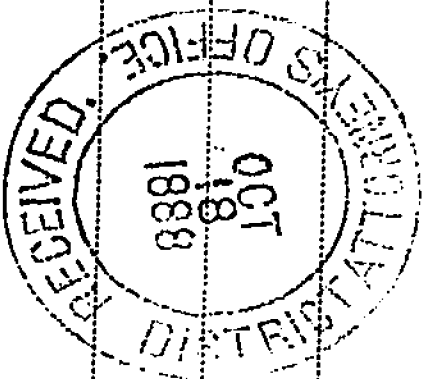

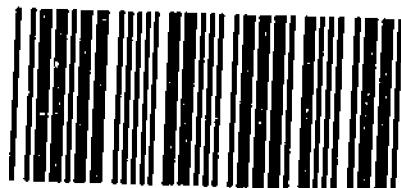

(By Mr Howe):

Q Now, are you quite sure that you have told all the
times that you saw this man as you say?

A Yes sir.

Q That it is seven times and not three as you first
said?

A No sir.

Q Was not it 8 or 9 or 10 or 11 times?

A No sir.

Q Only seven?

A Yes sir.

Q That you are positive about?

A Yes sir.

Q And you say that ^{you} you have never seen him at times
or places other than those you have just mentioned?

A Yes sir.

Q That is so?

A Yes sir.

Q When you first saw him as you say, at Mrs. Miller's, in
the kitchen, what made you call him Frank?

A I didn't call him Frank the first time I went there.

Q When did you first call him Frank?

A The third time I went there. The last time.

Q The third time?

A Yes sir; the last time.

Q How came you to call him Frank?

A He told me his name was Frank.

Q He told you his name was Frank?

A Yes ^{or} sir.

Q And you just told us that he had'nt told you his other
name, - he only said his name was Frank?

A Yes sir.

Q You have just ~~just~~ said that to-day, have'nt you?

A Yes sir.

Q And he never told you what his other name was?

Q (By the Court): Did he ever tell you his name was Yale?

A Yes sir.

Q (By Mr Howe): When?

A The third time I was there.

Q What? At the time that he told you his name was Frank?

A Yes sir.

Q Now just think what you have said to-day to these gentlemen. It is important. Did'nt you say to-day-a few minutes since- that you called him Frank and that you did'nt know him by any other name? Is that true?

A I did'nt know him by any other name the first two times I went there. The last---

Q Now---

Q (By the Court): Let her answer.

MR.HOWE: Certainly, your Honor. Go on.

A (continued): But the last time I came there I asked him what was his name, and he said Frank Yale.

Q (By Mr Howe): That was the third time

A Yes sir.

Q And did'nt you tell ¹⁰⁰ the jurors that you first knew him by the name of Frank and not by the name of Yale?

A I don't remember.

Q You don't remember? That is highly important.

A No sir.

Q And that was the third time you say that you saw him that he told you his name was Frank Yale?

A Yes sir.

Q Do you know Mrs. Ida Rieger? I don't know that I pronounce it correctly- it is a German name. Will you bring her in Mr. Moss? Perhaps the name is not so pronounced.

Q (By the Court): Do you know a Mrs. Rieger?

A Yes sir.

Q (By Mr. Howe): You do know her?

A Yes sir.

Q You call her Rieger?

A Yes sir.

Q Then you need not bring her in Mr. Moss. You live at No 514 East 17th Street. Do you not?

A Yes sir.

Q (By the Court): Is that Mrs. Rieger?

MR.HOWE: Yes sir.

THE WITNESS: Yes sir. That is her.

Q (By Mr Howe): Do you remember Mrs. Rieger lighting some matches and seeing you having ^{Conne-}~~communication~~ tion with ^a~~the~~ man on the floor of the hallway there?

A No sir.

Q Is that true?

A Yes sir.

Q (By the Court): Where?

MR.HOWE: At this house, 514 East 17th Street.

Q (By Mr Howe): You lived in the same house with Mrs. Rieger, at 514 East 17th Street?

A Yes sir.

Q That is not so?

A No sir.

Q Did 'nt you have ^{Conne-}~~communication~~ with anybody in that house?

A No sir.

Q Never?

A No sir.

Q How many men have you had ^{Conne-}~~communication~~ with, altogether?

6

Objected to, if the enquiry refers to prior to March 1888, or the time at which this alleged offence is said to have taken place.

THE COURT: I will allow it. It goes to her credibility.

Q (BY Mr. Howe): How many men altogether have you had ^{Conne} communication with?

THE COURT: Just think it over.

THE WITNESS: About twelve or thirteen times.

Q (By The Court): Including the seven times, ^{whatever} or ~~different~~ intercourse, you had with this man?

A Yes sir.

MR. HOWE: Officer Kennedy of the Eighteenth Precinct will be called.

Q (By the Court): Do you know an officer by the name of Kennedy?

A I don't think I do, Your Honor.

Q (By the Court): Bring him in then, Mr. Howe. Perhaps she will remember him when she sees him. Do you recognize that officer?

A Yes sir.

Q (By Mr. Howe): Kennedy, please come forward. Did you say

to that officer, when he was patrolling in the street,
"How is your cock?"

A No sir.

Q Never used language of that kind to him?

A No sir.

Q Were you in the habit of walking the streets late
at night?

A No sir.

Q Do you know Sophie Wilkins?

A Yes sir.

Q Did she have you arrested for calling her a whore and
bitch?

A Yes sir.

Q Did you call her a whore and bitch?

A No sir.

Q It was untrue?

A Yes sir .

Q You never used such language?

A No sir.

Q Do you know a man by the name of Newmann?

A Yes sir.

Q How many times did you have ^{Conner} communication with him?

THE COURT: What is the first name?

Q (By Mr. Howe): I have not the first name. How many times did you have ~~communication~~ ^{some} communication with Newmann?

A Twice.

Q Do you know a man by the name of Gardiner?

A Yes sir.

Q How many times did you have ~~communication~~ ^{some} communication with him?

A I don't know any body of such a name as that.

Q I asked you, and ask you again, if you know any body by the name of Gardiner?

A I know the detective, Mr. Gardiner, that is all.

Q I ask you do you know any one by the name of Gardiner?

A I know that detective, and that is all.

Q Did you ever have ~~communication~~ ^{some} communication with Gardiner?

A No sir

Q Never?

A No sir.

Q Now, you have told us, if your story is true, that you screamed when you were on the bed. Is that so?

A ^{Yes, sir.} ~~That is so?~~

Q You say that, when this man, who, you say, was the prisoner, the defendant, got into the room that he ~~had~~ ^{took} his

pants off first. ^{Is that what you said?}

A Yes sir.

Q And then he got on to the bed, did he? Am I correct?

A No sir; he didn't get on the bed; he took off his pants first, and then his coat.

Q When he got into the room, the first thing which he did was to take his pants off?

A Yes sir.

Q Where were you then?

A I was laying on the bed?

Q As you say you were laying on the bed when he took his pants off?

A Yes sir.

Q Where was he?

A He was in the bedroom.

Q Standing up?

A Yes sir.

Q What did you do when you saw him take his pants off?

A I tried to get up and he would not let me.

Q Well, he held you down - did he hold you down?

A When I got up, he fired me down again.

Q Now which is it. You tell the jury that you tried to get up, and he would not let you, and, when you got up

he put you down again?

A When I got up, he put me down again?

Q You did get up?

A Yes sir.

Q And he had hold of you and threw you down again?

A yes, sir.

Q And, at that time, he had his pants off?

A Yes, sir.

Q And then did you lie down on the bed ?

A Yes sir.

Q And, in answer to the question put by the learned Judge, you stated, a minute since, that you were lying on the bed, crying, whilst he ^{took} ~~had~~ off his coat and vest?

A Yes sir.

Q Is that so?

A Yes sir.

Q And then you didn't try to get up again?

A No sir.

Q You saw him take off his coat and vest afterwards?

A Yes sir.

Q His pants off first?

A Yes sir.

Q And, then, what was the next thing he did when he had taken his coat and pants off?

A He got on the bed then.

Q He got on the bed?

A Yes sir.

Q Had you your clothes on at that time?

A No sir.

Q Had he torn off your dress first?

A Yes sir.

Q Tore it off, did he?

A Yes sir.

Q What sort of a sack was ^{it} you wore?

A It was a jersey.

Q And ^{he} ~~who~~ tore it off?

A He tore the buttons off of it.

Q When you first got into the bedroom?

A When I got into the bedroom?

Q Yes. In the bedroom?

A Yes sir.

Q That was before he threw you on to the bed?

A Yes sir.

Q Oh, yes. And what else did he do ^{to} ~~for~~ you, before he threw on on the bed?

A He tore off my petticoat and drawers.

Q Tore them off?

A Yes sir.

Q Violently?

A Yes sir.

Q And also tore your drawers off?

Q What? Tore them so that they ^{came off in pieces} ~~gave you~~ or the buttons ^{off}.

Will you also inform the Governor of any other matters having a bearing upon this case which have come to your knowledge since conviction?

It is particularly requested that each letter of inquiry from the Executive Chamber should be separately answered.

Q And how long have you occupied that position?

A Since 1873.

THE COURT: I will allow him to answer that question yes or no.

(Objection).

A. Yes sir.

THE COURT: Now it would be time for you to object when he puts in another question.

Q (By Mr. Howe): Do you know what a lottery policy is?

A. Yes sir.

Q Do you know what is commonly known as a lottery policy?

A. Yes sir.

Q Will you state to the jury what is commonly known as a lottery policy?

MR. HOWE: Objected to as incompetent and immaterial. Commonly known as a burglary or rape. You might

(Exception).

(Question repeated by stenographer).

A It is the record or token or sign of numbers bet in certain lotteries by which the holder or the purchaser of that paper becomes entitled to a share of a distribution in a lottery. There are various forms. There are various plays in what is commonly known and called a lottery policy.

MR. HOWE: I object to this. It is going beyond the question which your Honor admitted.

Q (By Mr. Jerome): Have you completed your answer?

Q Go on and complete it then.

MR. HOWE: I object to what the witness has
just stated.

Q (By the Court): What is the record or token made on?

(Objected to.)

(Allowed.)

(The latter part of the answer is stricken out.)

Q (By the Court): It may be a card--a blank card?

Q Yes sir, with the numbers written upon it.

Q Either by the dealer or the customer?

A Yes sir.

Q Is that right?

A Yes sir.

Q And it might be on an ordinary piece of paper?

A Yes sir.

Q On a blank piece of paper?

A Yes sir.

Q (By Mr. Jerome): Does it take any other forms than those

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you have mentioned?

A There are different forms of a policy--that is, different forms--there is a capital saddle, station numbers four-number gigs and combinations, and they are recorded in the same manner and are the same thing in substance, but there are different odds on the different plays.

Q I refer to what is commonly known as a lottery policy?

A It is the record or sign or token of a play made.

(The latter part of the answer stricken out as irresponsible upon motion of Mr. Howe.)

Q Then, as I understand it from your testimony your definition of a lottery policy is the voucher for a wager made on the result of a lottery.

MR. HOWE: He did not say that.

Your understanding is not the witness' testimony.

MR. JEROME: I was trying to get at it.

THE COURT: Your objection is to the manner in which he is trying to get at it?

R. HOWE: Yes sir.

MR. JEROME: I withdraw the question. I ask you what--to define again--what is commonly known as a lottery policy.

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MR. HOWE: I object on the ground that it has already been answered.

THE COURT: He has already said that it is a record or token of numbers showing that a bet has been made in a certain lottery, that may entitle a person to a winning in a certain lottery, and may be on a piece of paper.

Q (By Mr. Jerome): What rights does the possession of a lottery policy confer?

(Objected to as incompetent and immaterial).

THE COURT: He has stated that. He says that it entitles the holder to a chance in a drawing of a lottery. He has already said that.

Q (By Mr. Jerome): What do you mean by the expression: "results of a lottery"?

A There are in policy certain numbers drawn out of 78. Sometimes the scale is 12 and sometimes 13 or 14.

MR. HOWE: I wish to interpose an objection. We have heard nothing about the numbers being drawn out of 78 or anything else.

MR. JEROME: Mr. Dodell testified to that.

MR. HOWE: No sir.

THE COURT: Look out, Mr. Jerome you will get BEARD & LEWIS, Stenographers, 280 Broadway, New York.

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Mr. Howe very indignant.

MR. HOWE: Never sir. In very many cases which I have had the honor to try before your Honor in which expert testimony has been called and in some of which the learned gentleman who is present here today, and whose attainments are certainly not excelled in criminal courts, appeared, it was settled that an expert could only testify upon a hypothetical question embodying all the testimony in a case, and the District Attorney in this case is going out of the record here and that is the ground of my objection. He has called this witness as an expert as to what he called policy playing. He has called him as some kind of an expert at all events, and my objection is this, sir--that the question put to this witness and the answer which he is about to give--the question involves something that was not brought out in the evidence, and is not on the record, and of course the answer^{to} it would be equally foreign. Now that is the objection.

THE COURT: I think I will sustain your objection on that. Now one moment, let us see if I can get a little more from this witness.

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He has already stated that he has a knowledge of policies and lotteries. Can you tell us what a "hit" means? We have had some evidence on that subject.

A When the numbers bet by the player have come out in a drawing of numbers in the class in which he has made the bet.

Q Can you tell us what a gig is.

Q What is that?

A A gig is three or four numbers bet that it will come out in the drawing which is of a scale--whether it be 12 or 13 or 14 numbers that are drawn between one and seventy-eight. Whether it is played in the morning or afternoon it is dependant on a supposed drawing that is sent out to each dealer in policies from the policy headquarters.

Q And a saddle?

A There are two kinds. A saddle which means two numbers may come out in the thirteen drawn. If the two numbers come out--come out, then the party wins. A capital saddle--

Q That is the two numbers that he holds?

A Yes sir. He holds two numbers between 1 and 78 inclusive.

Q A capital saddle--

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saddb in this case yet.

THE COURT: I think so. Go on.

A It is a bet that the two numbers selected shall come out in the first three numbers, in the first second or third station.

Q (By Mr. Jerome): Mr. James H. Bedell has testified on the stand that he went to 180 Broadway and that he there gave to the defendant, Leonard J. Emerson, a sum of money as a bet on the drawing of a lottery, that Mr. Emerson copied these numbers onto another piece of paper and returned to him a slip of paper with the numbers that he had written down--the play, as he said--returned his paper to him. What is such a paper commonly known as?

(Objected to as incompetent.)

THE COURT: I do not think I will allow it. I think you have got the evidence already.

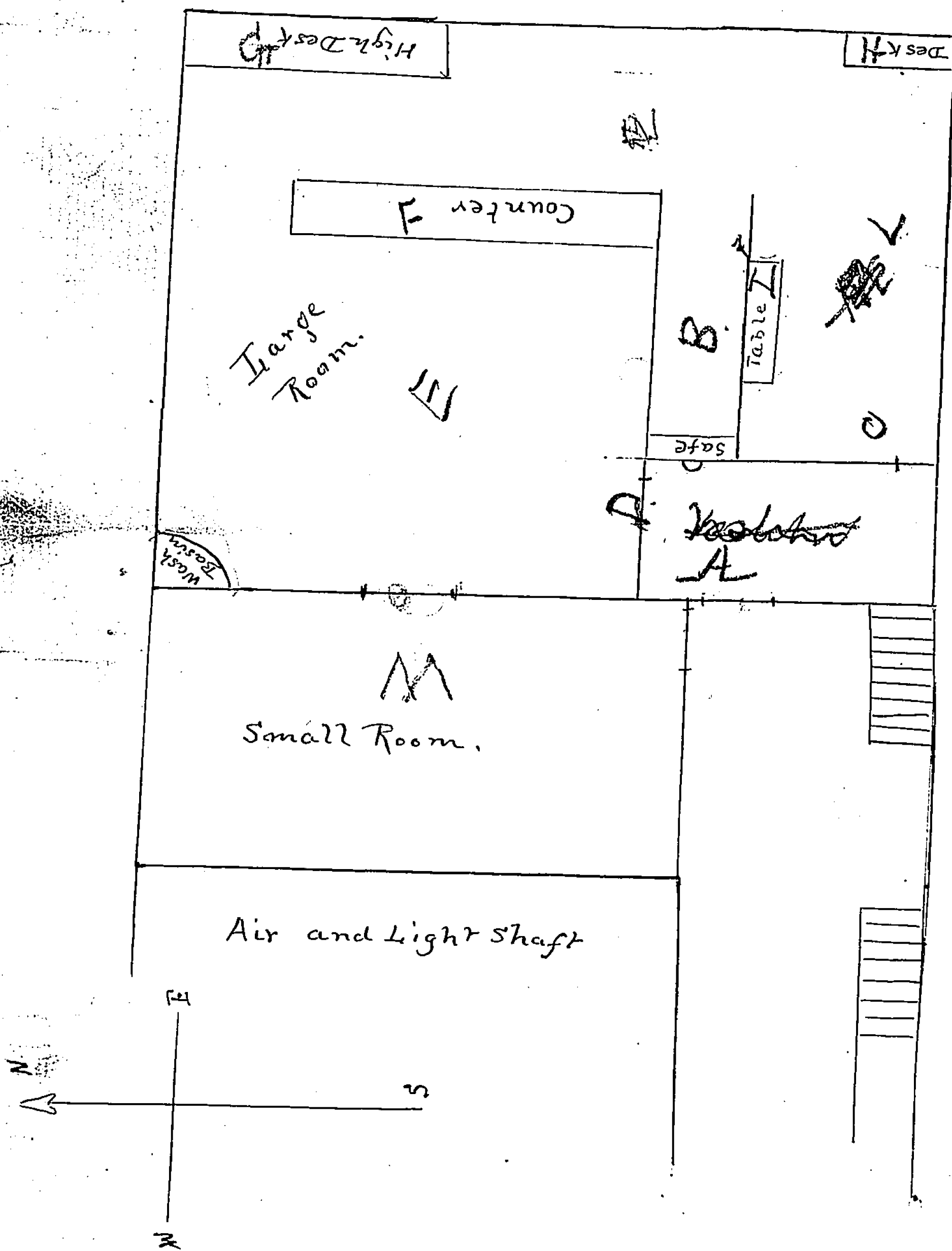

B R I E F .

On an indictment for keeping a common gambling house, the following instructions were held proper:

" If the jury believed from the evidence, beyond a reasonable doubt, that the room in question was a common gambling house, as charged in the indictment, and that the defendant was present, and in any way or manner aided, abetted or assisted in keeping, operating and running such gambling room, as charged in the indictment, then the jury should find the defendant guilty, although he was not the actual owner or proprietor thereof.

Stephens vs Peo. 67 Ill. p.587.

" The statute forbade the keeping of a room to be used or occupied for gambling, or permitting the same to be so used or occupied. The proof showed that on several occasions the accused had permitted property to be gambled for in his room. Held:

" That to bring the defendant within the statute the room need not have been principally used for gambling, and that it was sufficient if he had occasionally permitted gambling therein.

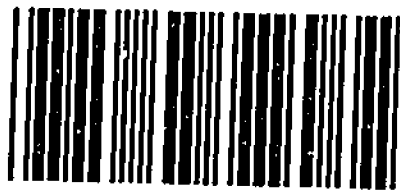

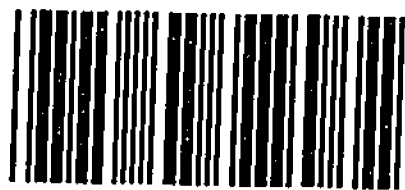

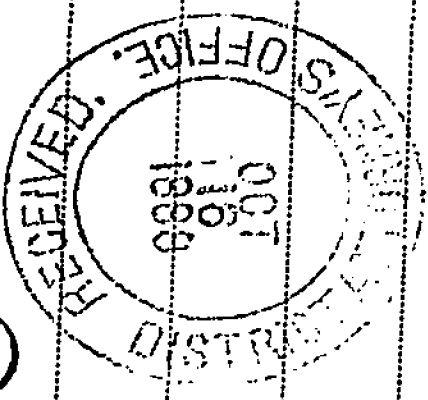
